On July 15, 2014, the Board of Nursing adopted an amendment to 18VAC90-20-10 et seq., Regulations Governing the Practice of Nursing.

1. To establish the qualifications for registration, certification, licensure or the issuance of a multistate licensure privilege in accordance with the applicable law which are necessary to ensure competence and integrity to engage in the regulated professions...

6. To promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 9-6.14:1 et seq.) which are reasonable and necessary to administer effectively the regulatory system...

12. To issue inactive licenses or certificates and promulgate regulations to carry out such purpose. Such regulations shall include, but not be limited to, the qualifications, renewal fees, and conditions for reactivation of licenses or certificates.

In April of 2014, a petition for rulemaking was received requesting that the Board consider amending the section on continuing competency requirements to accept CE hours approved by a federal or state government agency. Currently, subsection B of section 221 lists 12 organizations or entities that may recognize or approve continuing competency hours. Encouraging nurses who work for a government agency to take advantage of learning opportunities that relate to the practice of nursing within the context of their work at the agency may improve their effectiveness in protecting the health and safety of citizens of the Commonwealth.

Of those in state government, many of those are associated with hospitals or academic institutions which are already listed as approved providers/endorsers of continuing education.

	In her petition, the nurse noted that other state agencies, such as VDH, DBHDS, DCJS and DSS, offer or endorse courses that relate to her practice as a nurse providing services to citizens of the Commonwealth through those agencies. For example, courses in suicide intervention skills and substance abuse are important to her work in mental health. The Board concurred that other federal and state government agencies should be able to provide or endorse continuing education. Subsection A specified that all such courses or continuing competency activities must be directly related to the practice of nursing, so the courses approved by a government agency would be acceptable within that context.
