Purpose

To fulfill the statutory mandate to review its regulations governing the Virginia Organ and Tissue Donor Registry and to protect the citizens of the Commonwealth, the Board of Health seeks to begin a review of proposed amendments to the Virginia Donor Registry, formerly referred to as the Virginia Organ and Tissue Donor Registry. The goals of the Board are to enhance the clarity of the regulations and to achieve improvements that will be reasonable, prudent and will not impose an unnecessary burden on users of the Virginia Donor Registry or the public.

The state legal basis for this action is § 32.1-292.2 of the Code of Virginia. This statute provides the authority for the State Board of Health, in consultation with the Virginia Transplant Council, to promulgate regulations necessary to create, compile, maintain, modify as necessary, and administer the Virginia

Donor Registry. The imperative form of the verb "shall" is used in §32.1-292.2, making the Board's authority to regulate mandatory rather than discretionary.

Need

The current regulations were the first to be promulgated under statutory authority granted by the 2000 Session of the Virginia General Assembly and have been in effect since March 27, 2002 without amendment. The passing of more than five years since the initial promulgation and the Board's and the Virginia Transplant Council's experience with the current regulations lead the Board to conclude that it is an appropriate time to consider amendments that will bring clarity and improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the Virginia Donor Registry.

Substance

Amend 12VAC5-475-10 thru 12VAC5-475-90 to change references to the Virginia Organ and Tissue Donor Registry to the "Virginia Donor Registry" as determined by 2006 General Assembly amendments to §§ 32.1-292.2 and 32.1-297.1 of the Code of Virginia and to replace references to § 32.1-290, which was repealed by the 2007 General Assembly, with references to the *Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift Act* (§ 32.1-291 et seq.)

12VAC5-475-10 Definitions. Amend definitions of "Document of gift" to reference the donor registration form available on the save7lives.org website.

12VAC5-475-10 Definitions. Amend definitions to clarify that the Virginia Transplant Council has responsibility for creating, compiling, maintaining, and modifying the Virginia Donor Registry.

12VAC5-475-10 Definitions. Amend definitions to include "save7lives.org" as the official website that provides information on organ and tissue donation and provides a registration form to indicate a willingness to donate.

VAC5-475-40 Access. Clarify data requirements to require that the Virginia Transplant Council shall maintain and annually report the following information to the Board: (1) the number of unique individuals registered in the Donor Registry; (2) the number of recovered organ donors; (3) the number of recovered who were identified through the Registry; (4) the number of recovered tissue donors; (5) the number of recovered tissue donors; (7) the number of recovered eye/cornea donors identified through the Registry; (8) the number of recovered organ, tissue, eye/cornea donors that were family initiated.

12VAC5-475-50 Registry membership. Amend to include that designees may assist individuals who complete a signed application and that persons may indicate their willingness to donate by completing the Donor Registration form available on the save7lives.org website.

12VAC5-475-60. Data to be recorded. Eliminate the recording of the telephone number in the Registry. Also eliminates the reference to the Registry Form (VTC 1) which has been replaced by registration via the web site save7lives.org (see proposed amendments to 12VAC5-475-50).

Alternatives

As a part of a periodic review, the department worked closely with the Virginia Transplant Council to determine if any amendments were needed to make the regulation consistent with current practices of administering and accessing the Virginia Donor Registry. The Board of Health, in conjunction with the Virginia Transplant Council, will consider alternative requirements and confirm that the proposed amendments to the existing regulations will simplify current regulations to be less burdensome, while also continuing to fulfill the Board's statutory mandate to protect the citizens of the Commonwealth.

The Board of Health, in conjunction with the Virginia Transplant Council, will use the participatory approach to develop and/or refine the proposed amendments to the regulations and may appoint committees composed of Board members, Virginia Transplant Council members, and non-members.

The goals of the Board include developing amendments that will not negatively impact (1) the authority and rights of parents in the education, nurturing, and supervision of their children, (2) the economic self-sufficiency, self-pride, and the assumption of responsibility for oneself, one's spouse, and one's children and/or elderly parents, (3) the marital commitment, and (4) disposal family income.

No comments were received from the public during the recent periodic review. However during the review, the Virginia Transplant Council worked closely with the Virginia Department of Health to review the regulations and develop amendments that enhance the clarity of the regulations and achieve improvements that will be reasonable, prudent and will not impose an unnecessary burden on users of the Virginia Donor Registry or the public.

This regulation is necessary to administer the Virginia Donor Registry which will protect the public health, safety and welfare. The proposed regulation amendments to the existing regulations will simplify current regulations to be less burdensome, while also continuing to fulfill the Board's statutory mandate to protect the citizens of the Commonwealth by regulating the implementation of the Virginia Donor Registry.

As a result of this periodic review, it has been determined that (1) this regulation is necessary to administer the Virginia Donor Registry which will protect the public health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the Commonwealth. (2) The proposed amendments to the regulations will reduce complexity by clarifying current practices of the Virginia Donor Registry. (3) This regulation does not appear to overlap, duplicate, or conflict with federal or state law or regulations. (4) This regulation has been in effect since March 27, 2002. Since the regulation was first enacted, the use of web technology has increased significantly. As a result a new web site, save7lives.org, has been developed and is now a mechanism for donor registration. The last Periodic Review public comment period closed on November 11, 2007.
