The Board of Education currently has three sets of regulations governing textbooks and one set of regulations governing instructional materials. The regulations governing textbooks are: *Regulations Governing Textbook Adoption State Level* (8 VAC 20-220), *Regulations Governing Textbook Adoption Local Level* (8 VAC 20-230), and *Regulations Governing Textbook Fund Management and Handling on Local Level* (8 VAC 20-270). The regulations governing instructional materials are: *Regulations Governing Instructional Materials – Selection and Utilization by Local School Boards* (8 VAC 20-170).

All of these regulations were adopted on or before September 1, 1980, have not been amended since that time and are out of date. The NOIRA to repeal the three regulations governing textbooks and include provisions regarding textbooks into the proposed *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions* was published on July 7, 2008. The proposal to repeal the *Regulations Governing Instructional Materials — Selection and Utilization by Local School Boards* (8 VAC 20-170), and include provisions regarding instructional materials into the proposed *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions* was included in the NOIRA that was published proposing the *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions*, 8VAC20-720 et seq.

The proposed regulation sections regarding textbooks and instructional materials were approved by the Virginia Board of Education at its July 23, 2009 meeting and were published in the Virginia Register of Regulations on May 24, 2010. A public comment period was held from May 24, 2010 through July 26, 2010. These final regulations were approved by the Board of Education at its September 23, 2010 meeting.

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During the 2008 General Assembly, three bills were passed that impact the purchasing and provision of textbooks for Virginia's public school students. These bills were HB 137, patroned by Delegate Chris Peace, HB 354, patroned by Delegate Mark Cole, and SB 356, patroned by Senator John Watkins. HB 137 and SB 356 are identical and were proposed by the Department of Education. HB 354 is identical, with the addition of a provision making it possible for any private school within a school division to purchase textbooks from the local school board's contract with a publisher. These bills took effect on July 1, 2008.

During the 2010 General Assembly, there was one bill that passed that addressed textbooks. HB 709, patroned by Delegate Chris Peace, permits the purchase of hard-copy print textbooks, electronic textbooks, and hard-copy print textbooks with electronic files. The legislation clarifies that school divisions have the authority to purchase any of these three forms. This bill took effect on July 1, 2010.

The proposed regulation sections incorporate provisions from the three current Board of Education regulations as well as capturing the requirements of HB 137 (2008), HB 354 (2008), SB 356 (2008), and HB 709 (2010) regarding textbook purchasing. These provisions relate to the approval of textbooks, basal textbooks, contracts with textbook publishers, and the selection of instructional materials by local school divisions.

In addition, § 22.1-242 of the *Code of Virginia* requires the Board's regulations to include distribution of textbooks. The current regulations do not address this topic. The proposed regulations would take language from § 22.1-243 of the *Code*, to require local school boards to provide, free of charge, textbooks required for courses of instruction for each child attending public schools.

Finally, a number of provisions that are unnecessary, outdated, or are no longer required by the *Code of Virginia* are deleted.

The Virginia Board of Education will consider for adoption final proposed regulation sections as additions to 8 VAC 20-720, *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions*, at its meeting on September 23, 2010.

Section 22.1-16 of the *Code of Virginia* provides that "The Board of Education may adopt bylaws for its own governance and promulgate such regulations as may be necessary to carry out its powers and duties and the provisions of this title."

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Section 22.1-242 of the *Code of Virginia*, effective July 1, 2008, requires the Board of Education to "adopt regulations governing (i) the purchase of textbooks approved by it for use in the public schools directly from the publishers by school boards and (ii) the distribution of such textbooks for the use by children attending public schools in Virginia.

Additionally, § 22.1-38 of the *Code* permits local school boards to use textbooks not approved by the Board of Education so long as the school board selects the books in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Board.

Purpose

The purpose of this proposal is to repeal the four current regulations and add to the *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions*, 8 VAC 20-720, by creating sections governing instructional materials and textbooks. The current regulations governing instructional materials and textbooks will be repealed simultaneously with the adoption of the addition to the new *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions*. These new sections will not become effective until after the *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions* become final.

As noted earlier, the proposed regulation sections will capture the requirements of HB 137 (2008), HB 354 (2008), SB 356 (2008), and HB 709 (2010) regarding textbook purchasing. These provisions relate to the approval of textbooks, basal textbooks, contacts with textbook publishers, and the selection of instructional materials by local school divisions. In addition, a number of provisions that are unnecessary, outdated, or are no longer required by the *Code of Virginia* are deleted. The goal of this proposal is to have regulations that comport with the *Code of Virginia* requirements governing textbooks and other statutes, such as the *Virginia Procurement Act*, while providing local school divisions and school boards more flexibility in the selection and purchasing of textbooks and instructional materials.

The proposed sections include provisions related to the approval of textbooks, basal textbooks, contracts with textbook publishers, the distribution of textbooks and consumable materials, and the selection of instructional materials by local school divisions. In addition, a number of provisions that are unnecessary, outdated, or are no longer required by the *Code of Virginia* are deleted.

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Section 22.1-242 of the *Code of Virginia*, effective July 1, 2008, requires the Board of Education to "adopt regulations governing (i) the purchase of textbooks approved by it for use in the public schools directly from the publishers by school boards and (ii) the distribution of such textbooks for the use by children attending public schools in Virginia. Additionally, § 22.1-38 of the *Code* permits local school boards to use textbooks not approved by the Board of Education so long as the school board selects the books in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Board. Therefore, the Board of Education must adopt these regulations in order to properly address the issue of textbooks and instructional materials.

This proposal is beneficial to the public as well as local school divisions in that the provisions will be upto-date and will provide local school divisions with more flexibility without having a negative impact on the provision of educational services. The requirements regarding instructional materials and textbooks will be added to the *Regulations Governing Local School Boards and School Divisions* once they are final thus making them a part of one regulation with current regulatory requirements. This will eliminate the need to consult four separate regulations making it easier for school divisions to determine applicable requirements. Additionally, the regulations regarding textbooks that have been placed into the one section will provide the requirements for today's educational programs and more directly reflect current business practices.

Written comments could be provided to the Department of Education by mail, e-mail or fax. Public comments could also be provided

at public hearings held on June 3, 2010 in Marion, or on June 10, 2010 in Alexandria, Chesapeake or Richmond. Additionally, time was always set aside at the Virginia Board of Education's regular meetings for public comment. However, in spite of these efforts, no public comments were received following the publication of the proposed regulation and notification of the public comment period.

Therefore, these requirements were shipments received; the selling of textbooks to unnecessary, and in some cases, did not comply with the Virginia Public Procurement students; transfers between funds; reports and payments to publishers: unsold textbooks; books for resale; responsibility for the placement of books in specific schools; audits and preservation of records; fire insurance on textbooks: retail sales of textbooks; and the issuance of warrants between board meetings.

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Regulatory flexibility analysis

This agency does not regulate small businesses. The only businesses that should be affected, in any way, by these regulatory amendments are book publishers and it is anticipated that the impact will be positive in that it will streamline the procurement process for Board-approved textbooks.
