(The State EMS Advisory Board meeting was called to order at 1:01 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by the Board and the gallery. A quorum was present and the Board's agenda commenced as follows:)

MR. CRITZER: And if you'd just remain standing for a moment for a moment of silence for our fallen brothers and sisters in Public Safety. Thank you.

Just a reminder to all Board members, please make sure that you use your microphone and speak clearly into it for the recording and so the folks in the back of the room can hear you.

You should have received by email a copy of the May 4th meeting minutes. Are there any additions or corrections to those minutes? Hearing none, we'll approve those by consent.

You should also have before you the agenda for today's meeting. Are there any items you would like to add to the agenda or is it approved as -- as submitted? Hearing none, we'll approve it by consent.

So my report's very brief. I'll just repeat what I said last meeting. This -- here I am again. The appointments have not yet been made.

We have talked with the Secretary of the Commonwealth's Office. And I reached out again to her this afternoon because we understand that some of the constituent organizations that are due for appointment or re-appointment have not been contacted by them yet to submit nominees.

So I reached out to the Director of Appointments as early as this afternoon to ask them to provide us a list of organizations which have not submitted appoint -- nominees.

And then we will reach out to them to make sure that you do that expeditiously. Once she's received all those, then the appointments will be made.

Those of you that are not eligible for appointment, you continue to serve until your replacement has been appointed. So you might or might not be back in November. But I would suspect

before then the appointments will be made. 1 In that, again, as I said last month, I want 2 3 to thank all of you and the folks that preceded you for your support over the last 4 5 seven years. It's been an honor to serve on 6 7 this Board and to chair this Board. I think we've made a lot of progress in the last 8 9 seven years. And I look forward to 10 continuing to work with the Board through my 11 position on the Board of Health. So thank 12 each one of you. And those of you that are 13 14 rotating off, thank you for your service. I believe the Office has some 15 recognition for you at a later point in the 16 17 meeting. But thank you all very, very much for your support. Next would be the vice-18 chair's report, Mr. Parker. 19 20 MR. PARKER: No report at this 21 time. 22 23 Deputy Commissioner 24 MR. CRITZER: Kim Allan. 25

MS. ALLAN: Hi, good afternoon, 1 everyone. I don't have anything specific to 2 3 report other than just give you a quick update on the recruitment for the Deputy 4 5 Commissioner position. That is actively underway. 6 And as recent as this week, I -- I did hear 7 from our Commissioner that there may be some 8 9 viable candidates now in the pool. So I'm hopeful that they will 10 be moving forward shortly with interviews. 11 And potentially at the next Board meeting 12 13 here, may -- we may have a new Deputy Commissioner. 14 15 MR. CRITZER: Thank you very much. 16 17 And just so you'll know, apparently there's a tote board running around on how fast we 18 can get this meeting over with. 19 So we'll see how well we can 20 do and I need to know where I fall in that. 21 But anyway -- next is Office of EMS report. 22 Scott Winston. 23 24 MR. WINSTON: All right. Thank 25

you, Gary. As you notice, I'm -- I'm not Gary Brown. Gary's finishing up a -- a well-deserved vacation and actually flying into Dulles in about an hour.

So I -- I told him he better call in when he lands so he can participate in this meeting. Otherwise, this will be the first meeting in 38 years that he has missed of the Advisory Board.

I'll get us started. And I
have -- I have a few things to share with
you all. We do have a quarterly report that
we submit to the Advisory Board members.
That has been posted on the Office of EMS
web site.

I believe it was posted at least a week ago. And under the home page of the Office of EMS web site under the other EMS programs and links, if you'll click on EMS Advisory Board Committees and Meetings, you'll find the quarterly reports from our -- our -- that we've submitted to the Advisory Board. I'm going to call on several members of the OEMS staff to provide you some updates in particular areas. And

what I'd like to do is to start with a[n] update on personnel and some news about some changes to our office arrangements. And I'll call Adam Harrell to come to the mic and give you an update on those items.

MR. HARRELL: Good afternoon, everyone. First off, I wanted to provide you some personnel updates for the Office. We've had quite a few vacancies.

So to start with, in the Division of Educational Development, we had the position that Chuck Faison previously held, the Education Specialist role. We have extended an offer to an individual.

I can not release their name as of yet. They have verbally accepted. We are pending their background results, but we hope to be able to release that to the EMS community next week.

In -- let's see, there are quite a few. In the new division, the Division of Community Health and Technical Resources, the EMS system planner role. We have extended a verbal offer to an

individual who has preliminarily accepted.

Again, at this point, I can not release who they -- who they are. But we're hoping that that announcement will be forthcoming as well.

In the Division of
Administration and Finance, we have two
fiscal technician positions that were
vacant. Both of those have been offered and
filled.

We have one individual who will be starting on August the 10th. Her name is Faye Hunt. She has been working with not only Office of EMS, but VDH as a contract employee for the last 12 months.

The other individual who'll be joining us from another State agency later in the month of August. Amanda Davis's previous position, the grants manager role, has been in recruitment.

We have screened the applicants for that position. Interviews are scheduled in two weeks. As you were informed at the last Advisory Board meeting, in the Division of Emergency Operations,

Winnie Pennington retired. We posted for her position. We have screened and held first round interviews for that position. Second round interviews are scheduled in two weeks.

Let's see, educational development, there were a few wage positions that were open -- the CTS examiners. One of those was a CTS examiner supervisor. That position was advertised, internal only.

And we have screened, interviewed and offered that position as well. That individual will be announced probably next week as well. We will be beginning roaming interviews in the month of August.

We have 10 CTS examiner positions vacant throughout the State. The interview team will be conducting those interviews in the specific regions in which there are vacancies.

As for the operational changes within the Office of EMS, as we probably informed you over a year ago, we've been looking at relocation and remodel of the

Office of EMS. Currently in Technology 1 Park, where we currently reside, we occupy 2 3 to parcels in that -- that office park, 1001 that houses Educational Development, 4 5 Regulation and Compliance, the Assistant Director and the Division of Community 6 Health and Technical Resources. 7 And then we also occupy 1041 8 9 which are the remaining divisions. We have been in negotiations and evaluating that 10 location for business need. We will be 11 remaining in Technology Park in Glen Allen. 12 But we will be terminating the 13 14 lease at 1001 and turning that space over to 15 the Virginia Department of Fire Programs. We will, in turn, be taking over their 16 location adjacent to 1041 and building out 17 that space in addition to some vacant, 18 adjoining space to the 1041 office. 19 20 So you'll be able to come visit the Office of EMS in a single 21 location, early 2109. If there are no 22 questions, that's all I have, Mr. Chair. 23 24 Thank you, Adam. MR. WINSTON: I'd 25

next like to ask Karen to step up to the mic and give us an update on the 39th Annual EMS Symposium.

MS. OWENS: So first I'm going -oh, God, that's really loud. Sorry. First
I'm going to turn to Adam and ask you to
look at the screen to see the video that
we've got.

(At this time, the Board and gallery viewed the video on the upcoming Annual Symposium.)

MS. OWENS: So for those of you who are unaware, registration for attendees is now open and online. So we ask that you make sure you share that with your providers.

Also, along with registration, the other thing that is open is that we are actively pursuing sponsorship for this year's Symposium. We use our sponsors and appreciate our sponsors. Because of them, we get as much as we can growth-wise and the ability to provide some great education and

bring in some of these instructors. We do have sponsorship packets available, but it's also on the web site.

And if you know of anybody who's interested, you know, we just ask that you share with them the ability and the opportunity to be a sponsor for the event.

And Scott, you have some additional information.

MR. WINSTON: Thank you, Karen. I do want to add a couple of items. The -- as Karen said, the registration opened on Tuesday, the 31st. And it will be open through the October 5th.

Individuals who are recognized as members of the Advisory Board, at that time, will be provided one night's lodging in order to attend the next Advisory Board meeting that's scheduled on the 7th of November, which is a Wednesday.

Which will be early on into the Symposium week. If you choose to stay on, we can talk about assisting you in maybe securing rooms in our block to allow you to

-- to lodge at the hotel. There won't be any charge -- it'll be free to members of the -- the Board.

We do ask that you download the application that's online and complete that and submit it, either electronically or scan it by email to Irene Hamilton. And Irene will enter in your registration.

I'd hold off for a few weeks until we know -- unless that you're sure that you're going to be re-appointed or your -- your time for re-appointment hasn't come up.

And once you're aware of that then you can submit it -- you application -- registration. We will have a number of committee meetings that are held in conjunction with Symposium as we do every year.

And we will have on the
Saturday night, the 10th of November, the
Governor's EMS Awards banquet and ceremony.
So if you have any questions about
Symposium, please see Irene or even speak
with myself. Next, I'd like to ask Debbie

Akers to come up to the mic and Debbie will 1 2 give you an update on our EMS Scholarship 3 program. 4 5 MS. AKERS: Good afternoon, everyone. There was a report published in 6 7 your Board report. But I want to give you some updates that have taken place since 8 9 that report. 10 We're happy to report that the Office of Information Management, our OIM 11 Division, has been diligently working on a 12 process that we're very excited about. 13 The 14 scholarship's going to be tied to the provider's portal account. 15 As they register for a class, 16 it's going to check the criteria of their 17 eligibility. You know, are they over 18, 18 are they with a Virginia -- do they have a 19 Virginia address? 20 Is their educator over the 21 16th percentile, has there been no 22 enforcement actions? If all the answers to 23

for the scholarship, once the educator

that are positive and they become eligible

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accepts them into the program, in their portal they'll be able to have a flag that says, you're not eligible for a scholarship. Would you like to apply?

There's two steps to that.

When they click the button that yes, I'd like to apply, it will ask them, do you want to apply as an individual or would you like your agency to fund it through a grant process?

We're going to be funding both individual scholarships and grants. Many agencies are willing to sponsor their students or their providers into these programs.

But it has been a financial hardship since the EMS Training Funds program changed in 2016. That money will then be allocated, the scholarship will open up.

They'll be able to sign the contract and move forward. Or the agency can say, yes, I'm going to accept them.

Should the agency, for some reason, say I don't want to accept them, then it'll put

the scholarship back to the provider to say, your agency isn't willing to sponsor you.

But you can apply individually. Some agencies are hesitant to accept that responsibility.

So we're offered that as an option as well. The contract will have two requirements. They must certify within two years of the course end date.

And they must affiliate with a Virginia EMS agency and provide a minimum of one year's service to the Commonwealth.

We're excited about this process.

Any student enrolling in a program that begins on or after August 1st of this year will be able -- will be eligible to apply for this scholarship. We hope to have the system up and running by September 1st.

But anyone that is enrolling now and being accepted into the program can let their programs know that they have applied for a scholarship and are anticipating it being funded. They'll know whether they can answer those questions

positively. And the great thing is they don't have to answer them. Our system's going to do that for them. That's the great thing about what our OM -- OIM Division has designed.

We're excited about it. We think it's going to move forward well. And we're happy that we're going to be able to finally get funding back into the hands of the students and the educators. Any questions? Thank you very much.

MR. WINSTON: Thank you, Debbie.
We'd like to update you on the status of the recognition of EMS personnel licensure interstate compact. The Commission was formed after the 10th state adopted REPLICA.

And their first meeting was in October of last year in Oklahoma City.

Since that time, we've added a number of other states.

And we're currently up to 16 states that have adopted REPLICA. And the most recent states to adopt them are Nebraska, Missouri and New Hampshire. We

don't have -- we have several states that border Virginia. Kentucky and West Virginia that are currently introducing legislation in their legislative session to adopt REPLICA.

We have another state that's considering it, but hasn't taken any formal steps. And then another state currently is -- doesn't meet the eligibility requirements to participate.

It'll take a little bit longer for them to -- to introduce that legislation into their state. But it is moving along. There will be a national coordinated database that will accompany this REPLICA that will help and assist in sharing information, certification and compliance.

And disciplinary information across state lines for members of -- of REPLICA. So it's going to be a very useful tool in helping providers in the day-to-day movement across state borders that currently there's -- there's no mechanism to recognize. At this point, it's my pleasure to recognize individuals who have served --

or serving on this Board and who will be rotating off the Board because they are no longer eligible for re-appointment. They've served two consecutive three-year terms.

And by -- by rule, they have to come off the Advisory Board for a term of three years before they could consider to re-enter serving on the Board.

But before I get to that, I would like to take care of some outstanding housekeeping that we just, for various reasons, weren't able to take are of.

And this has to do with a proclamation that was penned by the -Governor MacAuliffe recognizing Samuel
Bartle, MD, as a member of the State EMS
Advisory Board to serve a term of three
years commencing July 1st, 2017, and ending
June 30, 2020.

And Sam, I'd like you to come forward and like to give you a proclamation signed by the Governor and a[n] EMS Advisory Board pin. And our apologies for the delay in getting it to you. Okay. At this point, I'd like to issue on behalf of the Office of

EMS some certificates of recognition for individuals who are currently serving on the Board who are not eligible to be re-appointed.

The first individual is Byron Andrews. Byron is -- served a total of 12 years on the Board in two different stints. And we, again, appreciate your participation on our Board.

The next individual is

Mr. Chip Decker. Chip has served a total of

12 years on the Advisory Board and, again,

we appreciate your participation and hard

work on this committee.

All right. Next I'd like to recognize Jason Jenkins. Jason has served a term of -- a total of six years. And Jason is representing the Virginia Chapter of the International Association of Firefighters.

Next, Cheryl Lawson. Cheryl has served a total of 10 years on the Board. And she's representing the Peninsulas EMS Council. Our next recipient is, unfortunately, not here and that's our vice-chair, Genemarie McGee. And she has served

a total of 12 years on the Board. And she 1 represents the Tidewater EMS Council. 2 3 Mr. Danny Wildman. Danny has served a total of six years on the Board. And he's 4 5 representing the Virginia Ambulance Association. 6 7 And last but not least, Mr. Gary Critzer. Gary has served for chair 8 9 for the last seven years. And he's served a total of 13 years on the Advisory Board 10 representing the Central Shenandoah EMS 11 Council. Thank you. 12 At this point, I'd like to 13 turn to Chris Parker. And he has a request 14 15 to make of the Board. 16 MR. PARKER: At this time, I would 17 like to make a motion that the Board approve 18 19 a resolution from the Office of EMS 20 recognizing Gary Critzer for his many years of service to the Advisory Board. 21 22 BOARD MEMBER: Motion. 23 24 MR. PARKER: Motion. Second? 25

BOARD MEMBER: Second. 1 2 MR. PARKER: All in favor? 3 4 5 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 6 7 MR. PARKER: Any opposed? 8 9 MR. WINSTON: All right. I have the resolution here in my hand. 10 11 MR. CRITZER: How convenient. 12 13 We wouldn't have MR. WINSTON: 14 15 taken this leap of faith if it were anyone else but you. But we felt confident and 16 17 certain that the -- the Board would approve our request for a resolution on behalf of 18 19 the Office of EMS and the EMS Advisory Board 20 to recognize Gary's involvement and stellar work in leading this Board for the last 21 seven years. And for a total of 13 years of 22 his life, he has been here in Richmond 23

participating on the Board. And we are

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the system. And I'd like to read this very quickly. It might take a few minutes, but I think it's worth for you to listen to what this gentleman's accomplished. And it's a certificate of recognition by the EMS Advisory Board.

And by virtue of the authority vested by the State Emergency Medical Services Advisory Board of the Commonwealth of Virginia, and the Virginia Office of Emergency Medical Services, there is hereby officially recognized Gary P. Critzer.

Whereas Gary P. Critzer, NRP, CC EMT-P, has dedicated more than four decades of service to the emergency medical services field, as a volunteer and career professional.

He has represented EMS interests throughout the Commonwealth by serving at the local, regional and State levels to help improve Virginia's EMS system.

And where Critzer has been recognized for over 40 years of service in the involvement of EMS in Virginia, since

1975, he has held various roles including paramedic, officer, president, captain, first and second lieutenant, training and communication sergeant and life member of the Waynesboro First Aid Crew.

He created improvements in EMS communications regionally and served on the State EMS Communication subcommittee as a member since 1995, and chair from 2003 to 2008, and 2011 to 2017.

He strengthened the Central Shenandoah EMS Council while serving as its president of the board of directors and enhancing educational opportunities for both instructors and providers while sharing his experiences and perspective on various Board and committees.

And whereas in November 2007, Governor Timothy Kaine honored Critzer for the Governor's EMS Award for Excellence in EMS.

This award is the highest level of recognition issued by the Commonwealth of Virginia to EMS personnel.

And whereas Critzer was -- has managed

numerous commitments effortlessly while serving as the director of the Waynesboro Department of Emergency Management and EMS, and simultaneously campaigning for improvements in the Virginia EMS system to assist providers in maintaining the high quality of pre-hospital patient care provided in their communities.

And whereas therefore, Critzer extensive career in EMS, he has served in positions at the local, regional and State level including serving as a member and chair of the State EMS Advisory Board from 2002 to 2008 and serving a second term for 201 to 2018.

He was a member, first and second vice-president and president of the Virginia Association of Governmental EMS Administrators from 2012 to 2018.

And most recently is serving as the EMS representative for the State Board of Health. Therefore, be it resolved that the State EMS Advisory Board and the Virginia Office of EMS hereby commends and honors Gary P. Critzer, National Registry

paramedic, critical care EMT-P, for his 1 commitment and contributions to Virginia's 2 3 EMS system, and for his service to protect the health and promote the well being of all 4 5 people in Virginia. 6 7 MR. CRITZER: Thank you. Thank you very much. I'm very humbled. And it's been 8 9 a pleasure and an honor to serve with each one of you. Thank you. 10 11 MR. WINSTON: Mr. Chair, that 12 concludes the Office of EMS report. 13 14 MR. CRITZER: 15 Thank you,

> Mr. Winston. Next would be Amanda Lavin, Assistant Attorney General. Did Amanda make it today? I don't see her. No.

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So next then would be the Board of Health EMS Representative report, which you get to hear me again. So I've got this 30-minute presentation on shellfish sanitation. If you could spool it up. I promised somebody I would do that before this ended. No. In all seriousness, the

Board met in June on June 7th. One of the large parts of the agenda and one of the decisions we made is that we will be reviewing the abortion clinic regulations again. So that process has just started.

The other thing that I think is important for you to note that effects our system. If you've noticed in the media over the last few days, the Governor announced at a press release that the Emergency Department Care Coordination Project has kicked off that will tie our emergency departments across the Commonwealth together.

We're one of the first in the nation to accomplish that, to be able to share pertinent patient information in a very timely manner.

And hopefully provide great improvement in -- especially in patients that are transferred or seen at multiple hospitals, in expediting their care and providing the right care. So some really big things going on at that level. The Board will meet again on the 13th of

September at the Perimeter Center. Those 1 meetings are open to the public. If you're 2 interested in the health of Virginia, it --3 the Board of Health covers a vast array of 4 5 topics. You're certainly encouraged to 6 attend and -- and learn about the work of 7 8 the Board, which is the overseeing Board for 9 this Board. So encourage you to 10 participate. Any questions? Okay. Hearing 11 none, we'll move then into the Standing 12 Committee reports. The first is the 13 Executive Committee. We have not met since 14 15 our last workshop. And based on when the 16 17 appointments are made, then I'm assuming there will be another Executive workshop 18 19 established. So we'll move on then to Financial Assistance Review Committee. 20 21 Thank you, 22 MR. DILLARD: Mr. Chairman, Board members. I'm Kevin 23 Dillard. I'm the new chair of the Financial 24

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Assistance Review Committee. The Office of

EMS awarded 80 grants during the spring cycle, July the 1st, in the amount of \$3,969,417.00. 44% of the RSAF requests were awarded.

Nasal naloxone grant cycle ended June the 1st. Re-stocking ended June the 30th. There will be no more special initiatives, but agencies can apply for this under RSAF.

We did hold our spring tour on June the 7th and 7th in the Rappahannock EMS Council area. And we welcomed two new committee members, and I'd like to introduce them at this time.

Joe Trigg -- if you'd stand up
-- from Western EMS Council, and J. C.
Bolling from Southwest EMS Council. So
welcome to both of them. Our next FARC tour
will be December 7th and 8th.

And we're going to be meeting in the Southwest EMS Council region. And we're working on gathering equipment to display at the Symposium for their 40th anniversary of FARC. And at this time, I'd like to ask Dan Norville to come up and be

recognized. Dan. So Dan Norville is coming off the committee. He has served six years with the Financial Assistance Review Committee.

So on behalf of the Virginia
Office of EMS and the Financial Assistance
Review Committee, we'd like to officially
thank you, Dan.

MR. NORVILLE: Thank you.

MR. DILLARD: And then one final presentation. I'd like to ask Gary Dalton if he would come up. And this is a posthumous recognition of Karen Wagner. And I'd like to read the resolution.

This is from the Virginia

Office of EMS, Virginia Department of

Health. By virtue of the authority vested

by the Virginia Department of Health, the

Office of Emergency Medical Services does

hereby officially recognize Karen D. Wagner.

Whereas Karen D. Wagner was a dedicated

member of the Woodstock Volunteer Rescue

Squad since 1982, and was honored by the

squad as life member -- 1982 -- and then honored in '92 as a life member. During her time there, she served in various leadership roles including vice-president, secretary, training lieutenant, infectious disease officer and serving on the bylaws committee.

Karen also served at the local government level as chair and secretary of the Shenandoah County Fire and Rescue
Association and EMS Safety Committee.

And whereas Karen was
extremely active in the Virginia Association
of Volunteer Rescue Squads for more than
three decades and served as the VAVRS
president, vice-president, secretary, life
line editor as well as in numerous district
offices including district vice-president.

During her time at the State

Rescue College, she served in various roles
including chair, staff instructor, Virginia

EMT instructor and EVOC instructor.

In 2003, she was elected as a VAVRS life member and inducted into the Virginia Life Saving and Rescue Hall of Fame in 2018. And whereas Karen was commended by

Virginia Mark Obenshain for more than 35 years of service to the Commonwealth. She was also appointed to serve in Virginia State EMS Advisory Board for eight years and served as chairwoman of the State EMS Advisory Board for four years.

She was the first all volunteer provider to hold this position. And whereas Karen served at the State level on various committees and programs, including serving as a member of the State Regulation and Policy Committee, and as chairwoman of the Financial Assistance and Review Committee beginning July 1, 2012.

In 2004, she was awarded the Governor's EMS Award for Excellence in EMS, the most prestigious award presented at the State level, and subsequently served on the Governor's EMS award selection committee.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Virginia Department of Health, Office of Emergency Medical Services, hereby memorialize and honor Karen D. Wagner for her incredible contribution to Virginia's volunteer EMS providers and the citizens of

the Commonwealth. Karen was an icon in the
EMS field and her kind spirit,

22	Committee, Mr. Decker.
23	
24	MR. DECKER: Thank you,
25	Mr. Chairman. The Transportation Committee

has not met since the Advisory Board met here last. The next meeting of the Transportation Committee will be for the primary purpose of grading the RSAF vehicle grant, and will be held on October 22nd.

MR. CRITZER: Thank you, sir. Communications Committee, Mr. Korman.

MR. KORMAN: The Communications

Committee met at 0900 hours this morning.

The discussion included about filling some vacancies on the Committee. I will craft a proposal to the Executive Committee for review.

We welcome Thomas Crabbs, who is the Statewide Interoperability
Coordinator within the Governor's Office,
and Shawn Talmadge with Virginia Homeland
Security, who made an introduction to the
Committee on the FirstNet and -- which is a
Statewide contract. And if agencies are
going to use it, they should understand the
capabilities before just going forward. In
June of 2018, the dispatcher of U-Curriculum

[sp] under the Department of Criminal

Justice Services, determine training related
to fire. EMS is beyond the minimum training
requirements for them.

And they felt it was not appropriate to mandate training that should be regulated by other entities, even through PSAPS have advocated for this for over 20 years.

It was discussed that agencies who follow American Heart Association protocols for CPR must adhere to the requirement that by January 31st of 2019, AHA will require the use of an instrumented directive feedback device on mannequins for all AHA courses that teach adult CPR.

Good song. Ken Crumpler with Office of EMS is working with a work group under the Communications Committee formed to review and update the Office of EMS PSAP EMD accreditation process to achieve better maintenance of the program. Louis Casata [sp] with Virginia Information Technology Agency continues to move forward with Next Generation 9-1-1 Deployment plans. And now

agencies can apply for grant funding to transition from Legacy to Next Generation systems, now a rolling approval, not just a one-time year process for the funding.

Derek Rubble shared Virginia

APCO's pro-chart report, chiefly advocating

PSAP's employ EMD protocols and dispel myths

with those protocol systems.

Richard Rabeno [sp] shared the FCC is enforcing, citing and fining agencies who make changes to the radio systems without filing an application and getting approval by the FCC.

Second to last, last month

Congressman Chris Collins out of New York

introduced legislation that prevents states

from diverting fees collected from consumers

on their phone bills which are meant to be

used to improve 9-1-1 emergency

communication systems.

This legislation is called the 9-1-1 Fee Integrity Act. And in conclusion, I wish Ken Crumpler, the Office of EMS communications coordinator success in his new position for the Motorcycle Safety

Program coordinator, Highway Safety officer 1 with the Department of Motor Vehicles. 2 3 Thank you, Ken, for your guidance, service and dedication to EMS and especially PSA and 4 5 the 9-1 industry. 6 7 MR. CRITZER: Thank you, Emergency Management Committee, 8 Mr. Korman. 9 Mr. Andrews. 10 MR. ANDREWS: Yes. The Emergency 11 12 Management Committee met yesterday. We have no action items to bring forward, a few 13 informational. In May, the Emergency 14 15 Management Committee set out to the system, to each of the agencies, a survey. 16 17 And this was to help the Committee to identify where it needs to be 18 19 focusing its efforts as far as emergency 20 management, mass casualty or active shooter activities within the -- the Committee. 21 We got a 40% return from the 22 -- the survey, which is a pretty good 23 response rate. Our survey was based upon 24

five pillars which included hospital lines

coordination, mass gathering, high threat,
MCI and highly infectious diseases. So each
of the surveys was really based upon those
core competencies or those core questions.

As a result of that, it became very clear that we still have quite a bit of work to do on the MCI front in the -- in the Commonwealth of Virginia in education and also in the preparatory phase as far as doing exercises and planning is concerned.

So the Committee's going to dive into that section a little bit harder to -- to find out, you know, more details in the -- in the survey. So we're going to work down each of those core pillars until we have all five of them taken care of.

The other thing that we worked on is we did approve the edits to the MCI I module training curriculum. That's centered around the modified -- the -- the Model Uniform Core Criteria for -- for triage, the big debate as far as SALT versus START.

We've taken the position that we're going to provide both in the curriculum. Therefore, each of the plans and/or the areas are fully

aware of both SALT and START. I think really at the end of the day when it comes down to triage, our providers are going to do what they need to do to do their triage.

That's been proven over and over and over and over again. But from an education perspective, to be compliant with MUCC, we need to be able to provide that. So those approvals were made to the program. With that, I'll entertain any questions.

MR. CRITZER: Thank you very much.
Training and Certification Committee,
Mr. Ferguson.

MR. R. J. FERGUSON: The Training and Certification Committee met July 11th at the Office of EMS. We had no actionable items. We did initiate a work group to review the CPS testing process.

And we also test the

competency-based EMT work group to review the TR-90a form for potential revisions or any updates needed. And our next meeting

will be October the 3rd.

MR. CRITZER: Thank you, sir. 1 Workforce Development, Mr. Salazar. 2 3 MR. SALAZAR: The Workforce 4 5 Development Committee met yesterday. There is no action items to bring forward. The 6 7 Officer I program, there was a pilot done at Rescue College. 8 9 The next pilot, and hopefully 10 the last one, will be at Symposium. The goal is to be able to release the program 11 shortly after Symposium time frame. 12 So that'll go hopefully live 13 and then we'll be able to move on to the 14 15 Officer II program. Recruitment and retention, they have a big summit coming up 16 -- recruitment and retention summit on 17 October 8th and 9th. 18 19 It's going to be hosted by the Albemarle Fire and Rescue. More information 20 will be sent out through them. There were 21 discussions held on the challenges that 22 we're facing, both career and volunteer 23 regarding training new providers and also 24

maintaining them. So at the next meeting,

we're going to start looking at some of the challenges and barriers that -- try to work through that.

We'll also be talking about EMS officer credentialing that is starting to become more of a reality at the national level. The next meeting will be at Symposium.

And the Committee work -welcome Mike Watkins from Hanover Fire and
EMS who will be the representative for
VAGEMSA on our committee. Thank you.

MR. CRITZER: Thank you, sir.

Provider Health and Safety, Mr. Wildman.

MR. WILDMAN: Provider Health and Safety met this morning. We have no action items for the Board. The Committee continues to push out health and safety bulletins over social media to raise awareness of those issues for EMS providers across the State. The mental health awareness campaign is still underway and the production of the video will be -- it's

still in the process. And that campaign 1 will be unveiled at the Symposium as well as 2 a video. 3 In the -- in this meeting here 4 5 and in the upcoming meetings going forward, we're going to also going to be addressing 6 7 exposures in the work place and in our industry. 8 9 And how we can develop some 10 quidelines and procedures to be able to handle that cohesively. So we'll be having 11 more of that coming up at our -- at our next 12 meeting, which will be held October 26th at 13 9:00 a.m., at the Office. 14 15 MR. report. But I can go ahead and give the

Trauma System Oversight and Management

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7.

Commonwealth Trauma System plan. As you -- as you are aware, most of the -- the past two years, the TSOMC have been working extensively with the Trauma System Task

Force that you have assigned to address the ACS recommendation for the creation of a trauma system plan for the Commonwealth.

There's been a -- an extensive work on this for the past two years. I'm going to quickly go through this. And this is actually also is in the report.

The trauma system plan was specifically based on the -- the model trauma system planning and evaluation plan by the -- by HRSA.

And specifically, I believe the plan was followed very well for the involvement of a functional, inclusive, comprehensive, integrative plan that addresses the four phases of -- of injury.

From the pre-injury stage, which is best engaging in violence prevention, to the pre-hospital and then to the acute care interphase. And then to the

post-care and rehabilitation. So very extensive process, that's why it took us two years to develop the -- the plan. So the plan was for that to be carried forth.

Initially, there was a stakeholder meeting as everyone knows, 101 system stakeholder participated in -- in the ACS trauma consultation.

Initially, with various pre-hospital providers, trauma surgeons, emergency medicine physicians, neurosurgeons, trauma program managers.

Regional councils
representatives, State agency
representatives of all kind -- OAG, VDOT,
VDH, you know, hospital administration -administrators and medical services
providers on an -- basically to -- including
the Chief Deputy Commissioner for Public
Health and Preparedness, that called forth
by -- by yourself for the creation of this
task force which is where the work is going
to accomplish by seven specific work groups.
Each one presenting the various phases of
injury, administrative, injury and violence

prevention, system evaluation, post-acute 1 rehab, pre-hospital, acute definitive care 2 3 and disaster preparedness. Extensive work, as I mentioned, last time and this time. 4 The work group have met 99 5 times between March 2016 and March 2018. 6 129 individuals contributed to the trauma 7 system plan. 8 I'm reiterating this to kind 9 of put the emphasis how well this was vetted 10 in order for us to come up with integrated 11 plan. So on June 7, the -- the task force 12 presented their final draft at TSOMC. 13 The TSOMC unanimously voted 14 and approved the draft. And now is 15 presenting it as action item to be approved 16 by -- by this Board. And so the -- I 17 believe the plan has been submitted to 18 everybody to review. So this is our --19 20 MR. CRITZER: So coming from a 21 Committee, it requires no second. As --22 before I open it for discussion, I'd just 23

This is a result of the ACS trauma

like to re-emphasize Dr. Aboutanos's

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remarks.

system review that was conducted in 2015 that had over 100 recommendations for our trauma system.

Outcoming from that, as Chair of this Board I appointed a task force underneath of the Trauma System Oversight and Management Committee that also broke out into a number of work groups for all the specifics such as Dr. Aboutanos outlined.

Pre-hospital, injury
prevention, acute care, and so forth to vett
every aspect of the recommendations and to
draft a trauma system plan. They brought
that back last month -- or June, excuse me.

TSOMC approved it. It now comes to you for your consideration and approval. Once you've approved it, that document would then go forward to the State Board of Health for the State Board of Health's approval.

But Dr. Aboutanos is correct.

This -- this plan has been well vetted by every aspect of the EMS system. It's comprehensive, it's inclusive. It will require other steps if the plan is approved.

It calls for some additional committee work, 1 committee structures, etcetera, that would 2 3 require some bylaw changes of this Board. And ultimately, it looks at 4 the composition of this Board and the 5 potential for additional representation. So 6 7 before you today is the consideration of this plan. 8 It was submitted with the 9 10 quarterly report. So the floor is now open for discussion. Is there any discussion? 11 12 WILDMAN: How does this plan 13 14 how does the plan currently address the 15 make-up of the Board is it -- as it's addressed in the plan? 16 Is there -- is there an 17 outlier of that, how it's being proposed 18 19 now? Or is it something that's going to be addressed in a future revision or --20 21 MR. CRITZER: Of the Advisory Board 22 itself? 23 24 MR. WILDMAN: 25 Yes.

MR. CRITZER: Yes. Eventually, it 1 will require review of this Board, an 2 inclusion of additional representation on 3 this Board to capture some of the other 4 aspects, such as injury prevention and 5 rehabilitation. 6 7 It will also open up the opportunity for this Board and it certainly 8 9 will be beyond me. It'll be at the new Chair and the will of this group as to how 10 you address that. 11 Whether it's through a work 12 group or a retreat of this Board to talk 13 about the -- the structure of this Board as 14 15 a whole. Whether you want to add seats, 16 17 replace seats, etcetera, but that'll be up to the will of this Board. But that will 18 require legislative action. 19 20 Okay. So just to be 21 MR. WILDMAN: clear, voting on the plan doesn't 22 necessarily put the momentum of changing --23 24 MR. CRITZER: Voting on the plan 25

adopts the plan. The second phase would be to look at the committee structure of the Board, which is achieved through the bylaws of this Board, which you have control over. It basically encompasses adding additional committee structure to the already -- under TSOMC.

It would add much of the same committee structure that was part of the task force to insure that we have adequate representation for all of trauma care in Virginia.

Once those bylaws were changed and that committee structure became formalized, then you could begin work on the legislative piece for the Board itself.

Which will take some time and some work through Legislative and Planning. So no, this doesn't put any -- it -- it starts the process.

But it doesn't make it happen today. Other comments or questions?

Hearing none, all those in favor of the -- did you have a question?

BOARD MEMBER: Yes. Just off of Dan's question. I know the recommendation is for six additional positions on the Board. So by voting on it, are those six additional positions they are recommending moving forward, or is that another discussion to be had at another point in time?

MR. CRITZER: That's a discussion that this Board will have to have. Again, through whether it's through Legislative and Planning recommendations, through a work session of this Board -- or a retreat -- as to how you want to achieve that.

BOARD MEMBER: All right.

MR. CRITZER: It will be up to this
Board to put that plan together and move it
through the legislative process. And
there's a lot of options. There's adding
seats. There could be looking at the
current composition and determining if the
-- if the current make-up is adequate or it

needs to be restructured. That'll be up to 1 this Board to make that recommendation. 2 3 This is -- this is accepting what their recommendations are. 4 5 Then you will have to work through that piece. Other questions? 6 7 Hearing none, all those in favor of adopting the trauma plan signify by saying aye. 8 9 10 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 11 12 MR. CRITZER: Any opposed, like The motion carries. All right. 13 sign. Anything else, Dr. Aboutanos? 14 15 DR. ABOUTANOS: No, thank you. 16 17 That concludes my report. 18 MR. CRITZER: I will be giving out, 19 20 in a few minutes -- I quess we can actually do it now since we're on trauma system. 21 will require you to look at your bylaws and 22 to consider some changes. Basically in the 23 -- the biggest changes for this Board to 24 consider in the bylaws is to add another --25

we currently have four coordinators on the Executive Committee. We currently have administrative, infrastructure, professional development and patient care coordinator.

This would call for us to add a trauma system coordinator. So a fifth member of the Executive Committee. And then all of the committee structure underneath of that individual, which pretty much mirrors the -- the work -- the task force committee structure that was developed.

So Cam -- I asked her to work on some draft language for your bylaws. And I will start this around in both directions -- just take that stack. And this is for you to take and review and consider.

It can't be acted on today.

It's for you to review and think about. It will be discussed at your next Advisory

Board meeting in November for -- and potentially could be acted upon at that time. What would be very important is if you have suggestions, questions, changes to this draft, please make those in writing to Cam no later than 30 days in advance of the

November meeting. So October 1st, 2nd, 3rd, somewhere in there. Whatever -- in early October, make sure that you have any suggestions, comments, questions, changes to Cam in writing by no later than that -- than early October.

Because any changes to this document need to be in front of you 10 days in advance of the November meeting in order for you to act on it in November.

If you act on it in November, whatever you act on would then be adopted. And you could appoint the formal committee structure to -- to continue the work of this group and continue it moving forward.

This work group was -- was appointed by myself as allowed by the bylaws. And I've -- I have been asked and have agreed that we will keep that work group going until which time you make the appropriate bylaw changes so that things don't fall behind the wayside in the meanwhile. There's a lot of work to be done. And -- and we need to keep that forward momentum that's been established.

So please review them, pose any questions, 1 suggestions, changes to Cam. But please do 2 it in writing via email. 3 And make sure you do that 4 5 before the -- early October so that there's adequate time to appropriately incorporate 6 7 any changes or suggestions so it can be out to you 10 days prior to your November 8 9 meeting.
