Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly (Act) requires the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services (Board) to adopt a regulation governing the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop. The Act establishes the specific provisions that this regulation must include. As mandated by the Act, the proposed regulation must require a regulated person or facility to register with the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS). This regulation must also establish standards of adequate care, exercise, feed, shelter, space, treatment, water, proper cleaning, and lighting. This regulation must require at least one unannounced inspection by the State Animal Welfare Inspector annually. Finally, the regulation must establish remedies for each finding of noncompliance in a given inspection.

The Board approved the final language for 2 VAC 5-105, Regulations Pertaining to Pet Shops Selling Dogs or Cats, on May 18, 2023.

Section 3.2-109 of the Code of Virginia (Code) establishes the Board as a policy board.

Section 3.2-6501.1 of the Code, which was established by Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly, requires the Board to adopt a regulation for the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop.

Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires the Board to adopt a regulation for the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop. The general welfare of the public is protected when regulations are promulgated in compliance with statutory requirements. The goal of the statutory and regulatory requirements is to standardize welfare requirements for dogs and cats sold by retail pet shops.

Substance

Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires the Board to adopt a regulation governing the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop and establishes the specific provisions that this regulation must include. The Act requires that the regulation require a regulated person or facility to register with VDACS. The regulation must also establish standards of adequate care, exercise, feed, shelter, space, treatment, water, proper cleaning, and lighting. The regulation must require at least one unannounced inspection by the State Animal Welfare Inspector annually. Finally, the regulation must establish remedies for each finding of noncompliance in a given inspection.

The Board amended the proposed text of Section 30 to include a limitation that no pet shop shall employ a person convicted of animal cruelty pursuant to Section 3.2-6570 of the Code. The Board also amended the proposed text of Section 40 to require each pet shop to develop protocols for veterinary care, infection and disease control, and care of medically managed animals or neonates. The amendments also eliminate the qualifier "gross" from "repeated violations" under Subsection B of 2 VAC 5-105-60.

Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires the Board to adopt a regulation governing the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop and establishes specific provisions this regulation must include. Identifying potential requirements has proven to be a contentious issue for the interested stakeholders. The regulation will affect pet shops, which will be regulated by VDACS. Certain pet shops that are currently in operation may not be in compliance with the requirements or may incur increased costs in order to come into compliance with the requirements.

The regulation will also affect VDACS, which will be responsible for ensuring compliance with the requirements established in the new regulation. Once this regulation becomes effective, a VDACS inspector will inspect all pet shops for compliance with Virginia's Comprehensive Animal Care Laws and this regulation.
