The current regulation related to firearms purchases does not hold dealers accountable who continuously violate the legal requirements for purchase of firearms. The changes recommended by the Virginia State Police relate to sanctions for violations by dealers who violate the legal requirements for firearms and the appeals process related to these sanctions.

This amendment provides sanctions for dealers who violate regulations regarding firearms purchases, and provides an appeals process for those dealers. The sanctions are progressive in five steps and are described in the attached regulation under 6 VAC 20-130-110.

## **Alternatives**

Without sanctions, dealers who violate the law regarding purchase of firearms are jeopardizing public safety. Experience has shown the Virginia State Police that such dealers will continue to operate without regard for the law as long as they are permitted to do so. There are no other alternatives.

## Family Impact Statement
