The promulgating agency is the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation ("DPOR").

Section 54.1-201(5) of the Code of Virginia gives regulatory boards under the authority of DPOR to promulgate regulations. It provides, in part, for the power and duty "[t]o promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) necessary to assure continued competency, to prevent deceptive or misleading practices by practitioners and to effectively administer the regulatory system administered by the regulatory board."

Section 54.1-831 of the Code of Virginia, pertaining to the regulation of boxing, martial arts, and wrestling events grants the Director of DPOR with the powers and duties of a regulatory board as contained in § 54.1-201.

Similarly, § 54.1-1802.1 of the Code of Virginia, pertaining to the regulation of polygraph examiners grants the Director of DPOR with the powers and duties of a regulatory board as contained in § 54.1-201.

Further, § 2.2-4007.02 of the Code of Virginia provides, in part:

A. Public participation guidelines for soliciting the input of interested parties in the formation and development of its regulations shall be developed, adopted, and used by each agency pursuant to the provisions of this chapter. The guidelines shall set out any methods for the identification and notification of interested parties and any specific means of seeking input from interested persons or groups that the agency intends to use in addition to the Notice of Intended Regulatory Action. The guidelines shall set out a general policy for the use of standing or ad hoc advisory panels and consultation with groups and individuals registering interest in working with the agency. Such policy shall address the circumstances in which the agency considers the panels or consultation appropriate and intends to make use of the panels or consultation.

DPOR's public participation guidelines mirror DPB's model public participation guidelines. The guidelines, having the status of a regulation, are necessary to promote public involvement in the development, amendment or repeal of regulations. Further, the regulation is clearly written and understandable.

On November 30, 2023, the Director of DPOR made the decision to retain this regulation "as is" without any change.

The regulation continues to mirror the model public participation guidelines from DPB.

1) There is a continued need for this regulation because it promotes public involvement in the development, amendment or repeal of the regulations of DPOR. 2) DPOR did not receive any comments or complaints during the public comment period. 3) The regulation is not complex. 4) The regulation does not overlap, duplicate or conflict with any other federal or state laws or regulations. 5) The regulation was last evaluated in 2019 and it does not rely on technology, economic conditions, or any other factors due to the nature of public participation. This regulation outlines Virginia Regulatory Town Hall as the mechanism for notification, registration and meeting procedures for public participation. DPOR determined there was no effect to the economic impact of small businesses as this regulation promotes public involvement in the development, amendment or repeal of the regulations of DPOR.
