The Board for Barbers and Cosmetology (Board) has extended the reduction in application, renewal, and reinstatement fees for all licenses through August 31, 2020, in order to reduce an accumulated surplus in its budget and to remain in compliance with the Callahan Act.

At the close of each biennium, the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation is required by Va. Code § 54.1-113 (Callahan Act) to review each board's financial position to determine whether fees need to be adjusted to ensure that revenues are sufficient, but not excessive, to cover the board's operating expenses. Reductions in fees are needed to bring revenues and cash balances to an appropriate amount, allowing the Board to continue gradually using its accumulated cash to support ongoing operations, and will result in a decrease in the Board's cash balance and Callahan Act position.
