The Department has indicated that it will no longer approve Duquenois-Levine field tests for use for this purpose because they cannot distinguish marijuana from industrial hemp. With no amendments to the regulation, there will be no field tests approved by the Department. Manufacturers may lose revenue if unable to obtain approval for their tests or devices.
