The amendments are recommended as a result of a periodic review of Chapter 40. Amendments will: 1) allow the Board to approve an internship in embalming in a government facility or accredited educational institution; and 2) change reporting requirements for internships from 10 days to 14 days.

On April 23, 2013, the Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers amended 18VAC65-40-10 et seq., Regulations for the Funeral Service Intern Program.

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18VAC65-20-10 et seq., Regulations of the Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers are promulgated by the Board of the Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers under the general authority of Title 54.1, Chapter 24 of the Code of Virginia.

Chapter 24 establishes the general powers and duties of health regulatory boards including the responsibility to promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act which are reasonable and necessary for the administration of a regulatory program.

### § 54.1-2400 -General powers and duties of health regulatory boards

The general powers and duties of health regulatory boards shall be:

...

6. To promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 9-6.14:1 et seq.) which are reasonable and necessary to administer effectively the regulatory system. Such regulations shall not conflict with the purposes and intent of this chapter or of Chapter 1 (§ 54.1-100 et seq.) and Chapter 25 (§ 54.1-2500 et seq.) of this title. ...

#### Specific authority for the Board is found in:

### § 54.1-2803. Specific powers and duties of Board.

In addition to the general powers and duties conferred in this subtitle, the Board shall have the following specific powers and duties to:

- 1. Establish standards of service and practice for the funeral service profession in the Commonwealth.
- 2. Regulate and inspect funeral service establishments, their operation and licenses.
- 3. Require licensees and funeral service interns to submit all information relevant to their practice or business.
- 4. Enforce the relevant regulations of the Board of Health.
- 5. Enforce local ordinances relating to funeral service establishments.
- 6. Advise the Department of Health Professions of any training appropriate for inspectors serving as the Board's agents.
- 7. Establish, supervise, regulate and control, in accordance with the law, programs for funeral service interns.
- 8. Establish standards for and approve schools of mortuary science or funeral service.
- 9. Regulate preneed funeral contracts and preneed funeral trust accounts as prescribed by this chapter, including, but not limited to, the authority to prescribe preneed contract forms, disclosure requirements and disclosure forms and to require reasonable bonds to insure performance of preneed contracts.
- 10. Inspect crematories and their operations.

#### § 54.1-2804. Licensing authority.

The Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers is authorized to determine the qualifications to enable any person to engage in the practice of funeral service, preneed funeral planning, funeral directing, embalming and the operation of a funeral service establishment.

The overall purpose of the amended regulation is ease of compliance with requirements for funeral internship programs. Less restrictive regulations for training in embalming and for filing reports with the Board will result in a modest decrease in the regulatory burden without any associated risk of harm to the public. The Board will continue to have the ability to monitor compliance and enforce regulations that protect the public health and safety in training of interns for funeral licensure.

Consideration of the proposed rule has been during a regularly scheduled board meeting, and to the extent possible, all notifications would be done electronically to minimize the cost. There are no on-going expenditures for the agency related to amendments to regulations.

Funeral service interns - 141 There are 426 funeral service establishments but the number that currently have interns in not specified. While many are small businesses, some are owned by large, national corporations. The Board does not license by type, so it does not have an estimate of the number that are small businesses.

There are no costs for amendments to regulations.

There are no viable alternatives to the proposed changes that meet the essential purpose, since requirements for funeral service internship programs are set in current regulations.

- (1) The Notice of Periodic Review was published in the *Register of Regulations*, posted on Townhall and sent to the PPG list for the Board. Comment was requested from November 5, 2012 to December 5, 2012. There were no comments.
- (2) The regulation is necessary for public protection since the Board has a statutory mandate to "Establish, supervise, regulate and control, in accordance with the law, programs for funeral service interns." It has been reviewed for clarity and amended for ease of understanding.
- (3) The regulation for licensure is mandated by Chapter 28 of Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia.
- (4) The agency has not received complaints or comments; it does not overlap or duplicate other law or regulation.
- (5) Amendments to this chapter have been promulgated  $\underline{6}$  times from 2003 to 2012 to update or eliminate unnecessary requirements.

Current section number	Current requirement	Proposed change, intent, rationale, and likely impact of proposed requirements
10	Sets out the definitions of words and terms used in regulation	An amendment to "training site" is necessary for the expansion of qualified sites for training in embalming as proposed in section 220.
90	Sets out requirements for renewal of registration of an internship	Currently, regulations require the intern to notify the Board of any changes in name, address, employment or supervisor. There is no timeframe given for the notification, so it is presumed to be immediate notification. The proposed change would specify notification within 14 days, which is consistent with other requirements for notification for funeral service providers.
220	Sets out qualifications for a training site	Currently, all approved training in an internship program must occur within a licensed funeral establishment. Increasingly, it is difficult to obtain adequate training in embalming because more people are choosing cremation. Interns can receive excellent training in embalming at the state anatomical program or at an educational institution, such as John Tyler Community College, that has a funeral services curriculum. Additionally, the amendment will allow the Board to approved embalming training obtained in the military through mortuary affairs as partial completion of an internship program by veterans. Amendments to regulations will allow the board to approve an internship at one of those institutions or agencies to receive all or a portion of the embalming training.
250	Sets out requirements for supervision	The addition of "facility or institution" will allow a supervisor to qualify to provide training if he is employed by an educational institution or a state facility rather than a funeral establishment.
320	Sets out the requirements for reports on the internship	Currently, the report that is due at the end of every 1,000 or a partial report must be submitted to the Board within 10 days; the proposed amendment would change the timeframe to reporting within 14 days.

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
