

Economic Impact Analysis Virginia Department of Planning and Budget

22 VAC 15-20 – Child Day-Care Council General Procedures and Information for Licensure July 30, 2003

The Department of Planning and Budget (DPB) has analyzed the economic impact of this proposed regulation in accordance with Section 2.2-4007.G of the Administrative Process Act and Executive Order Number 21 (02). Section 2.2-4007.G requires that such economic impact analyses include, but need not be limited to, the projected number of businesses or other entities to whom the regulation would apply, the identity of any localities and types of businesses or other entities particularly affected, the projected number of persons and employment positions to be affected, the projected costs to affected businesses or entities to implement or comply with the regulation, and the impact on the use and value of private property. The analysis presented below represents DPB's best estimate of these economic impacts.

Summary of the Proposed Regulation

The proposed regulations will repeal the duplicative regulations addressing the general procedures and information for licensure of the child day centers approved by the Department of Social Services.

Estimated Economic Impact

These regulations contain general licensure rules applicable to child day centers that are licensed by the Department of Social Services. Currently, there are two sets of identical regulations one promulgated by the Child Day-Care Council (22-VAC-15-20) and one promulgated by the Board of Social Services (22-VAC-40-80). Following a memorandum from the Office of the Attorney General indicating that the Child Day-Care Council could, but was not required to promulgate separate general procedures regulation, the council proposes to repeal its general procedures regulations. This proposed action will eliminate duplicative regulations addressing the general procedures and information for licensure of the child day centers approved by the Department of Social Services, but an identical set of regulations will remain in

effect elsewhere. Thus, the proposed repeal of these regulations is not expected to produce any significant economic effect.

Businesses and Entities Affected

These regulations apply to 2,586 child day centers.

Localities Particularly Affected

The proposed regulations are not anticipated to affect any locality more than others.

Projected Impact on Employment

No significant effect on employment is expected.

Effects on the Use and Value of Private Property

No significant effect on the use and value of private property is expected.
