This Fast-Track regulatory action updates the agency name from the Department for the Visually Handicapped (DVH) to the Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired (DBVI), revises relevant Code of Virginia, Virginia Administrative Code, and federal law citations, and updates definitions.

The Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired is taking action to amend 22VAC45-100 (Regulations Governing DeafBlind Services) using the Fast-Track option on November 8, 2019.

Executive Order 14 (as amended, July 16, 2018) requires that executive branch agencies consider, review, and promulgate regulations annually. As part of the required review, DBVI staff determined that this regulation is grossly outdated. The last time DBVI amended the regulation was in 2002.

The proposed changes to 22 VAC45-100 are noncontroversial. There are no additional costs incurred by DBVI and existing DeafBlind services are not changed. Individuals who are blind, vision impaired, or deafblind will be unharmed. Additionally, the fast-track option is appropriate because the revisions are not substantive.

DBVI is the agency promulgating this regulatory action. Statutory Authority comes from § 51.5-65 of the Code of Virginia, which identifies the functions, duties, and powers of the DBVI Commissioner to adopt regulations to carry out the applicable provisions of the chapter.

DBVI proposes to amend 22 VAC45-100. The goal is to change the agency name from the outdated Department for the Visually Handicapped to the current Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired; it is critical that citizens know and can identify the name of the agency in order to access DeafBlind Services.

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The current regulation contains obsolete language and definitions; revisions modernize definitions to incorporate people first language and remove definitions that reference repealed Code of Virginia sections or old terminology.

Code of Virginia, Virginia Administrative Code, and federal law citations are brought up to date to reflect current regulations ensuring that constituents are able to determine the source of regulatory authority.

There are no viable alternatives to this regulatory change. DBVI is the agency charged with the provision of services to citizens who are deafblind. Small businesses are not impacted by the changes in this regulation.

DBVI is the primary agency providing services to persons who are deafblind and subsequently, did not conduct an analysis of alternative regulatory methods. The population of citizens who are deafblind is very small and requires unique and specialized services provided by DBVI. Small businesses are unlikely to be influenced by regulations governing services to individuals who are deafblind.
