Table 1a: Costs and Benefits of the Proposed Changes (Primary Option)

Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly (Act) requires the Board of Agriculture and Consumer Services (Board) to adopt a regulation governing the keeping of dogs and cats by a pet shop and establishes specific provisions this regulation must include. As mandated by the Act, the proposed regulation requires a regulated person or facility to register with the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS) and pay a fee of \$250 annually. This regulation also establishes standards of adequate care, exercise, feed, shelter, space, treatment, water, proper cleaning, and lighting. This regulation requires at least one unannounced inspection by the State Animal Welfare Inspector annually. Finally, the regulation establishes remedies for each finding of noncompliance in a given inspection.

Direct and Indirect Costs: Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires that each pet shop pay a registration fee annually of \$250. There are an estimated maximum of 20 pet shops in the Commonwealth that will be subject to this annual registration fee. All of these pet shops will need to consult with a veterinarian when developing certain protocols, and some veterinarians may charge for this consultation. While most pet shops have the infrastructure to be compliant with the regulations, some may need to make minimal investment to come into compliance. There is no data or methodology with which the agency can determine what investments might be needed for the approximately 20 firms to comply with this new regulation.

Direct and Indirect Benefits: Chapter 1284 of the 2020 Acts of Assembly requires that each pet shop pay a registration fee annually of \$250 to the department. The agency estimates there are a maximum of 20 pet shops in the Commonwealth, resulting in an estimated total benefit to the department in registration fee revenue of \$5,000 annually. There are no monetizable indirect benefits associated with this regulation. However, the general welfare of the public is protected when regulations are promulgated in compliance with statutory requirements. The goal of the statutory and regulatory requirements is to standardize welfare requirements for dogs and cats sold by retail pet shops.
