The Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy is revising one section of 4VAC25-130, Coal Surface Mining Reclamation Regulations. The revision to 4VAC25-130-777.17 will increase the permit fee for coal surface mining from \$12.00 to \$26.00 per acre for the total permitted acreage, and the annual anniversary fee from \$6.00 to \$13.00 per acre disturbed. The revision will make the Virginia regulation consistent with the underlying Virginia statute, § 45.1-235, amended in 2003.
