MINUTES

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3 The State Board of Elections board meeting was held on Monday, May 21, 2018. 4 The meeting was held in Senate Room 3 in the Virginia State Capitol in Richmond,

5 Virginia.

> In attendance: James Alcorn, Chairman; Clara Belle Wheeler, Vice Chair; and Singleton McAllister, Secretary represented the State Board of Elections ("The Board"). On behalf of the Department of Elections ("ELECT") was Christopher E. "Chris" Piper, Commissioner. In attendance, representing the Office of the Attorney General ("OAG"), was Anna Birkenheier, Assistant Attorney General. Chairman Alcorn called the meeting

to order at 10:38 AM.

The first order of business was to approve the minutes from the April 25, 2018 meeting. Secretary McAllister moved the Board approve the minutes as presented for the April 25, 2018 meeting. Chairman Alcorn seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

The next order of business was the Commissioner's report, presented by Commissioner Piper. The Commissioner reminded the Board that the last day to register to vote in the June 12 primary was May 21, and said there was a statewide senate primary for the Republican party and some congressional primaries; there would be some dual primaries in a number of localities, but ELECT and local staff were prepared. Commissioner Piper discussed meeting with continuity of operations partners to discuss and prepare communication and possible threats for the upcoming election day.

Commissioner Piper addressed the post-election audits the Board approved during the April 25 meeting. The post-election audits, requested by Prince William County and the City of Norfolk, were to take place following the May 1 election; but after the May 1 election, ELECT discovered issues that would have prevented successful audits. The Commissioner noted that Prince William County wanted to run four different types of audits on four different precincts. §24.2-671.1, subsection C, required, however, that the margin between the top two candidates for each office on the ballot exceeds 10 percent. In three of the four precincts Prince William County planned to audit, that was not the case.

Virginia Code also requires that the statutory period of time after an election during which

a recount may be requested must expire before an audit can be conducted. For both Prince William County and the City of Norfolk, the time to request a recount had not expired before the planned audit. Commissioner Piper stated ELECT reviewed the procedures provided by the localities and believed the procedures required additional work before use. Both Prince William County and the City of Norfolk agreed to plan their post-election audits to review the results of the June primary in July, and would work with ELECT staff to be fully prepared. Commissioner Piper informed the Board that after July 1, ELECT would have a report for the Board on the procedures and results of the audit.

The Commissioner introduced James Heo, the Confidential Policy Advisor at ELECT, who started on May 1, 2018. Mr. Heo's primary responsibility would be to work with Information Services to provide communication both internally and externally on their activities, including changes in VERIS, working with policy and other divisions, and communications with the elections community as a whole. Mr. Heo would also take the lead on the post-election audit reviews, and assist in developing procedures for the Board to consider. The Commissioner introduced Tammy Alexander, a former Petersburg Electoral Board ("EB") member, who joined ELECT as the new Campaign Finance Program Analyst. Ms. Alexander began as an electoral board member in 2010, and the Commissioner shared that Ms. Alexander's experience working with candidates on campaign finance would be helpful to ELECT, in addition to the campaign finance work already done by Risé Miller. Vice Chair Wheeler said Ms. Alexander's experience as an EB member would bring a new perspective to the Department.

Commissioner Piper addressed recent news articles relating to the issue of misassigned and misplaced voters. The Commissioner said that ELECT would prepare a Powerpoint presentation for the next Board meeting to explain the situation and to cover the work ELECT has done so far. Commissioner Piper noted that while many lessons had been learned, much work remains to be done in this area; the Commissioner also said that ELECT was working with localities to address the issue. Chairman Alcorn said that the Washington Post identified a number of mis-assigned voters, and asked if the paper sent ELECT lists of other voters who were similarly mis-assigned. The Chairman recalled that a list was sent to ELECT's previous administration, but that the list may have been lost during the transition of administrations. Commissioner Piper stated that ELECT did its

own review, including a thorough review of all congressional districts as the priority due to the upcoming elections. Because ELECT was conducting an ongoing review, along with localities conducting reviews of their own, the number of possibly mis-assigned voters was constantly changing. Commissioner Piper thanked ELECT staff and localities for the work done.

Chairman Alcorn suggested ELECT contact the Washington Post to see if they have a list of mis-assigned and misidentified voters that could help with the process. Vice Chair Wheeler noted after a meeting with the previous Commissioner of ELECT, Edgardo Cortés, that Mr. Cortés stated ELECT knew of many mis-assigned voters but did not fix the issue. Vice Chair Wheeler stated that ELECT knew of the mis-assigned voters issue for two years, and referenced a bill in the recent legislative session that would have required localities to work with ELECT to be sure their districts were accurate and that voters were properly assigned. Chairman Alcorn mentioned the work that Commissioner Piper said was being done to remedy the situation currently, and acknowledged the enormity of the project. The Vice Chair offered the Board's assistance to ELECT and the localities in the undertaking. Commissioner Piper assured the Board a more in-depth update at the next meeting, and said that ELECT would continue to work with legislators and localities on solutions.

The Commissioner informed the Board that Friday, May 18, was Matthew Davis's last day as ELECT's Chief Information Officer. The Commissioner commended Mr. Davis's work in the eight years he worked for the Department, notably the enormous improvements in the Virginia Election and Registration Information System ("VERIS"). Secretary McAllister thanked Mr. Davis for the hard work that's been done, and asked that ELECT move quickly to fill the position in his absence. Commissioner Piper assured the Board that ELECT was working closely with the Department of Human Resource Management ("DHRM"), the Governor's office, and the Virginia Information Technology Agency ("VITA"), to find a successor in an expedited manner.

Commissioner Piper then updated the Board on issues that arose in mid-April, when ELECT learned that the City of Hopewell General Registrar (GR) had resigned and that the Hopewell electoral board had not identified a replacement general registrar. ELECT worked closely to ensure that operations continued in the GR's absence; the Department

contacted former James City County GR, AJ Cole, asking that he serve as temporary Deputy GR so that operations would continue until the EB appointed a full-time GR. Commissioner Piper also mentioned that the City of Galax used Kaspersky software. The Department of Homeland Security had previously identified Kaspersky software as a threat, so ELECT worked with the locality to remove and replace the software.

Chairman Alcorn asked the Commissioner if there were any updates on the Virginia Elections Benchmark Index Workgroup, a workgroup which the Board formed during the April 25, 2018 Board meeting. Commissioner Piper informed the Board that the first meeting of the Workgroup would take place on June 25, 2018, at 5 PM, following annual training. The Commissioner said the members of the Workgroup had been identified, and that ELECT was in the process of hiring a data analyst, who would serve as the additional staff member in the Workgroup. Commissioner Piper stated the group had experience developing strategic plans, and would conduct a full review of elections to create benchmarks for the entire elections community.

Vice Chair Wheeler revisited the topic of Hopewell, noting the amount of work that went into remedying the situation. The Vice Chair underscored the serious nature of the problem, and the importance for EBs to appoint GRs well in advance of a transition. Vice Chair Wheeler discussed the lack of background checks in hiring processes, noting particularly that background checks are not required for local elections officials. The Vice Chair noted that these local elections staff have access to VERIS, and therefore have access to the name, date of birth, address, and social security number for all registered Virginians. The Vice Chair suggested ELECT and the Board examine how people are hired for these roles, and create and maintain a list of former GRs that would be willing to work in a locality during an emergency. Chairman Alcorn mentioned that the GREB Handbook used to have a section that gave advice and best practices regarding hiring general registrars. Commissioner Piper noted that section was still in the Handbook, and also mentioned that the Handbook was being updated with a target release date of June 1. The revised Handbook would be improved in terms of usability and information, and was sent to different localities for feedback. The Commissioner also said all liaisons at ELECT were Virginia Registered Election Official (VREO) certified, and receive additional training to assist and train new GRs. Commissioner Piper discussed the idea of a web-access training

in the web learning management system that newly appointed GR and EB members could access and complete. The Benchmark Index Workgroup would focus on what training would be needed throughout the year so all the crucial training could extend beyond annual training. Vice Chair Wheeler noted the same issue happened in a previous year. The Vice Chair encouraged the idea of additional training, and offered Board support in the efforts.

The next order of business was to review memos regarding Stand By Your Ad ("SBYA") complaints, presented by Arielle A. Schneider, Policy Analyst with ELECT. Ms. Schneider reviewed the first memo, regarding express advocacy. This memo proposed that the Board move to adopt a policy re-defining express advocacy. The proposed definition mirrors the definition of express advocacy as defined in Federal Election Commission ("FEC")'s regulation 11 C.F.R. §100.22, (52 U.S.C. 30101 (17)). Ms. Schneider informed the Board that the FEC's definition was upheld twice in the 10th and 4th circuits as constitutional and consistent with the First Amendment. Ms. Schneider noted that the suggested motion to adopt the revised definition of express advocacy as stated in the working papers must be amended. The original motion suggested that the Board adopt the definition as a policy by majority vote, but due to a consensus by ELECT and the Board that the definition of express advocacy should established through regulation rather than policy, the motion should be amended to provide that the definition be submitted through the regulatory process to become a new regulation. Although the Board enjoys an exemption from the Virginia Administrative Process Act for regulations that related to the conduct of elections, according to a 2014 OAG opinion, any regulations concerning §24.2-9.3 through §24.2-9.5 do not relate to the conduct of elections, and therefore are not exempt from the regulatory process.

Chairman Alcorn discussed the importance of revising the Board's definition of express advocacy, noting the number of hearings in previous years using the current definitions that led to frustration and confusion. The Chairman discussed speaking with the Commissioner about moving forward with redefining express advocacy through the Administrative Process Act (APA), so that the Board can remain transparent and deliberate while also providing consistency for future Boards. Secretary McAllister inquired about the process to do this, and the Chairman said there would need to be public comment, a review from OAG and Governor's office, and a number of other steps before the Board

could change their definition. Ms. Birkenheier said she could give a more thorough explanation to the Board separately if needed. Chairman Alcorn suggested that the proposal put up for public comment include more background about the issue so the public is fully informed of the situation before commenting. Vice Chair Wheeler also suggested emphasizing that the definition was pulled from federal guidelines.

The Chairman moved that the Board submit this revised definition of express advocacy to the public for comment as required by the Virginia Administrative Process Act. Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

The next memo Ms. Schneider covered outlined a proposed policy for the conduct of SBYA hearings. The proposed policy covered how the Board would conduct SBYA hearings. Chairman Alcorn voiced support of the memo. Vice Chair Wheeler asked if the memo had any information on timing and deadlines, noting the issues that arose with the previous administration on timeliness. Ms. Schneider directed the Board to the memo approved by the Board on standard operating procedures for SBYA on March 23, 2018. The March 23 memo outlined that all complaints must be forwarded to the Board within one week of receipt as well as requirements regarding scheduling the hearing. Chairman Alcorn asked Ms. Schneider where she drew the line between operating procedure and policy, and Ms. Schneider replied that operating procedures were written for ELECT staff to follow, whereas the proposed policy provides guidance to the Board on how to standardize SBYA hearings.

Vice Chair Wheeler suggested that language requiring ELECT staff to provide SBYA complaints to the Board within one week of receipt be added to the proposed SBYA Hearings policy. Commissioner Piper noted that adding the ELECT staff requirement to the SBYA Hearings policy may be repetitive but expressed willingness to add it to the policy if the Board wanted it there. Chairman Alcorn requested an offline discussion on the structure of the documents so the Board could focus on the SBYA hearings scheduled for the day. The Chairman asked if holding off approving the memo would affect the hearings, and Ms. Schneider replied it would not. Chairman Alcorn suggested waiting on approval until the changes could be made.

The next order of business was the SBYA hearings. Commissioner Piper directed the Board to the letter in the working papers from the Democratic Party of Virginia (DPVA)

and Republican Party of Virginia (RPVA), wherein both parties asked to withdraw their complaints against Ed Gillespie and Ralph Northam. Chairman Alcorn stated that a request for withdrawal should not factor into the Board's discussion of potential violations. The Chairman added that whether or not the complainant wished to pursue the complaint, a violation could still have happened. Chairman Alcorn stated that campaign finance and Stand by Your Ad laws exist to protect the voter, rather than to protect the candidates. Vice Chair Wheeler added that there could be value in discussing the allegations and making decisions that could act as guidance for others regarding the issue brought up by the complaint. Secretary McAllister agreed, noting it would be in the public interest to hear the complaints regardless of the complainants' requests to withdraw, in order to be transparent about rules, regulations, and policies and to help form a path in decision making for violations in the future. Chairman Alcorn asked Ms. Birkenheier if the law prevented the Board from hearing a complaint if the complainant withdrew, and Ms. Birkenheier said there was not. The Chairman suggested adding the Board's decision to consider the complaints without regard to the withdrawal request, to the operating procedures and proposed policy. Commission Piper agreed.

Chairman Alcorn recommended that complaints against individuals in attendance at the Board meeting be heard first, and Ms. Schneider noted that that practice would conflict with the provisions that were proposed in the previously discussed memo on proposed policies, and on docket for later approval pending changes. The proposed policy stated hearings would be heard in alphabetical order.

The first complaint heard was against Bart Randall for School Board. Ms. Schneider summarized the complaint, noting photographs provided as evidence as well as a letter Mr. Randall sent to ELECT on Sunday, May 20. Ms. Schneider read the letter for the Board; in the letter, Mr. Randall explained that he enlisted the help of a political consultant who did not make him aware of the disclosure requirements: when he was made aware of the requirements, he attempted to add the disclosure to his signs but was unable to find each one; Mr. Randall said he added the disclosure to three signs located at polling places on Election Day. Chairman Alcorn asked the Board if there was a violation, noting he did not see any attempted disclosure in the provided photographic evidence. The Chairman observed that Ms. Schneider recommended a fine of \$400, and asked how staff

counted the number of violations. Ms. Schneider explained the number of violations came from the number of signs reported in the complaint, which included the three polling place signs and one sign in front of the complainant's house.

Chairman Alcorn asked if that fining structure was different from previous Board procedures. Vice Chair Wheeler recalled that the Board decided that in the case of a newspaper ad, mailers, and flyers, an ad was only considered as one violation, regardless of the number of times it was printed. The Vice Chair noted, however, that with yard signs, the candidate would be aware of how many were ordered; therefore, the violations should count per sign. Secretary McAllister recalled similar proceedings. Vice Chair Wheeler said in this case someone notified Mr. Randall of the mistake, and that Mr. Randall tried to rectify it. Chairman Alcorn asked Commissioner Piper how occurrences were counted in the past. The Commissioner stated the only time "per occurrence" was mentioned in the Code was regarding television and radio advertisements, and that there was no solid rule regarding print media. The Commissioner left it up to the Board's discretion how occurrences should count.

Ms. Birkenheier asked how many signs were provided in the evidence, noting that all pictures could be of the same sign. Ms. Schneider said that in Mr. Randall's letter three undisclosed signs were mentioned at the polling places, and that the complainant mentioned the sign in their own yard. Vice Chair Wheeler said normally candidates knew if yard signs were placed at polling places, so asked why the three Mr. Randall mentioned were not changed. Ms. Schneider noted that Mr. Randall said he attempted to provide proper disclosure on Election Day, and said since it was Mr. Randall's first violation, she recommended a \$50 fine for the first violation, doubled to \$100 for the proximity to the election. Therefore, the fine was a first time violation with an apology/explanation from Mr. Randall, doubled due to proximity to the election, with four occurrences, resulting in a \$400 fine. Chairman Alcorn moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Bart Randall in violation of §24.2-956 Stand by Your Ad print media disclosure requirements with regard to four advertisements, and is hereby assessed \$400. Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.*

The next hearing was against Cheryl Turpin for Delegate. Ms. Schneider recommended the Board find a violation because of a failure to properly disclose. Ms.

Schneider noted there was a disclaimer, but the disclaimer was not complete because the advertisement referenced another clearly identified candidate, Rocky Holcomb. §24.2-956.2 provides that "in an advertisement sponsored by a candidate or candidate campaign committee that makes reference to any other clearly identified candidate who is not sponsoring the advertisement, the sponsor shall state whether it is authorized by the candidate not sponsoring the advertisement. The visual legend in the advertisement shall state either "Authorized by [Name of candidate], candidate for [Name of office]" or "Not authorized by any other candidate."" Chairman Alcorn asked for clarification, noting that Delegate Turpin's ad did say "paid for and authorized by Cheryl Turpin for VB." Ms. Schneider clarified, stating that proper disclosure would have included Delegate Turpin's name, rather than the name of her campaign committee. Further, Ms. Schneider noted that advertisements that reference another candidate must also include a second disclosure statement, stating whether the ad was "authorized by any other candidate." Ms. Schneider recommended counting the violation as one occurrence, as only one yard sign was provided as evidence. Because of the proximity to the election, ELECT recommended the fine was doubled; Delegate Turpin also provided a letter, but gave no apology or explanation and did not describe attempts at remediation.

Trevor Southerland, Executive Director for the Virginia House Democrats, spoke on behalf of Delegate Turpin, noting that the evidence provided in the complaint was the front and back of a flyer, rather than a yard sign. Mr. Southerland directed the Board to Delegate Turpin's written response, noting the complaint did not have a code section included in it. Chairman Alcorn mentioned the related memos and description about substantial compliance and asked how that would or would not apply to the complaint. Ms. Schneider mentioned a memo the Board passed in 2015, and noted an ad would be substantially compliant if the disclosure unambiguously conveyed all required information. Chairman Alcorn clarified that the disclosure required the candidate and the office they're running for to be part of the disclaimer. Ms. Schneider agreed, and added that the disclosure must also state "Not authorized by any other candidate." Chairman Alcorn moved subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Cheryl Turpin in violation of §24.2-956 Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure requirements with regard to one advertisement, and is hereby assessed \$200. Vice Chair

Wheeler seconded the motion. Chairman Alcorn stated that the ad in question fell under print media, and that the fine was \$200— \$100 for the violation without apologies or remediation, which was then doubled for being within fourteen days prior to the election. The motion passed unanimously.

The next hearing was against Elizabeth Guzman for Delegate. Ms. Schneider presented the Board with a mailer sent by Delegate Guzman. The mailer did not include the required disclaimer, but Ms. Schneider noted that the violation was a first time offense early in the campaign, and subsequent literature was properly disclosed. Ms. Schneider also said that the violation did not occur within 14 days before an election, and therefore a fine of \$50 would be appropriate for a first time offense with an apology; however, Ms. Schneider also observed that the written statement sent by Delegate Guzman to the Board did not include an apology, giving the Board discretion to fine \$100 as per the penalty schedule provided in the campaign finance summaries. Chairman Alcorn stated he did not see an apology or explanation in Delegate Guzman's letter, and Vice Chair Wheeler agreed. Chairman Alcorn moved subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Elizabeth Guzman in violation of \$24.2-956 Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure requirements with regard to an advertisement, and is hereby assessed \$100. Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion.

An unidentified attendee asked the Board what constituted an apology. Chairman Alcorn explained that the Board asks candidates to take ownership of their actions, admit lessons learned, or something of that matter; it also could include remedial actions that were taken. The motion then passed unanimously.

The next hearing was against Friends of Team Manassas. Ms. Schneider said the Board would find a transcript from the June 27, 2017 Board meeting, provided by Stephen Hersch, the complainant, in their materials. The first mailer Mr. Hersch provided was distributed on an unknown date in 2016, and had no visible disclaimer. Because this mailer constituted as a first violation and was not alleged to be distributed during the 14 days prior to the election, Ms. Schneider recommended a \$100 fine. Chairman Alcorn noted an attempt at disclosure, and Ms. Schneider explained that under print media ad disclosure requirements, an ad referencing a clearly identified individual must disclose whether or not candidates authorized it. Therefore, even though no candidates authorized the ad in this

case, the ad must state as much. Ms. Schneider said there were two different occurrences of this ad, with one of the occurrences happening within 14 days of the election. Ms. Schneider recommended the second occurrence, which would constitute a second violation, be fined \$200 due to its distribution time.

The third complaint was of the same mailer's distribution online. Ms. Schneider said websites fall under print media disclosure requirements, and that one side of the mailer was posted online within 14 days prior to the election date. Ms. Schneider recommended a fine of \$200, as the appropriate fine, as the usual \$100 fine assessed for a second-time violation should be doubled due to its proximity to the election. The fourth complaint pertained to a second mailer, which Mr. Hersh alleged was delivered a week before Halloween in 2017, which was within 14 days of the election. Ms. Schneider recommended a fine of \$200, with the \$100 fine doubled due to its proximity to the election. Vice Chair Wheeler asked for clarification that these fines were appropriate because the challenged advertisements were sponsored by candidates and mentioned clearly identified candidates. Ms. Schneider clarified that Friends of Team Manassas is a non-candidate committee, and that a non-candidate committee must disclose whether an ad is authorized by any candidate if the advertisement clearly references any candidate.

Secretary McAllister asked for clarification on who would be fined in this case, as traditionally the person facing allegations was the candidate. Ms. Schneider explained the political committee, Friends of Team Manassas, would be fined, as a committee governed by §24.2-956.1. Ms. Schneider said it would be difficult to say there was coordination between the committee and a particular candidate, notably as neither ELECT nor the Board have investigatory authority.

The fifth violation was regarding a video on YouTube, which qualified as a print media disclosure requirements because the video was posted on a website. The video was posted on October 14, 2016, which was not within 14 days of the election; although the video remained posted throughout the election, Ms. Schneider recommended a \$100 fine for this video for a second offense, which should not be doubled due to the proximity to the election. The sixth violation was regarding a second video, which was posted on Facebook on October 31, 2016. This violation was considered a second occurrence, and Ms. Schneider recommended a \$200 violation fine—the \$100 violation penalty, doubled

due to the proximity to the election. Before moving forward, Ms. Schneider said the Board may want to reconsider the aggravated penalties that occur in multiple violations as outlined in campaign finance summaries, in case the Board wanted to assess a higher fine for the multiple occurrences. Chairman Alcorn suggested waiting to consider aggravated penalties until all the violations were heard.

The seventh violation was the same video as the sixth violation, but posted to the Team Manassas website on October 31, 2016, which was within the 14 day period prior to the election. Ms. Schneider said she had not seen the Board assess more than a 2nd time violation, so it remained unclear if a second violation constituted a second election in which the violations took place or if it would be defined in another way. Commissioner Piper said a second time violation was if the Board assessed a penalty against a candidate or committee and the candidate or committee then reoffended; in the case of Friends of Team Manassas, however, each item was a first time violation.

Chairman Alcorn asked if there was a SBYA violation conversation in 2017 when the Board first discussed Friends of Team Manassas, or if the conversation only concerned the filing their Statement of Organization. Ms. Schneider informed the Board that the Board had already heard each of these complaints, but held the determination and assessment pending assurance that the information provided was provided to both the complainant and respondent. Chairman Alcorn stated that meant that this is the first time the Board would be giving them feedback, making it reasonable to treat these offenses as first time violations. The Chairman moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Friends of Team Manassas in violation of §24.2-956 Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure requirements with regard to seven advertisements and is hereby assessed \$1,200.* Secretary McAllister seconded the motion.

Stephen Hersch, complainant, then informed the Board that the video on YouTube was still running as of the date of the meeting. Mr. Hersch noted that Friends of Team Manassas received notice of violation in 2017 when the Board first heard the case, and then again in advance of this meeting, and yet the video remained posted. Mr. Hersch also directed the Board to two other videos he provided as evidence in the working papers. Ms. Schneider asked to amend the Chairman's motion to include that the Board found 7 advertisements in violation.

Vice Chair Wheeler expressed concern at the idea of Friends of Team Manassas facing such a fine as a group of organized citizens, as opposed to a committee, and discussed the importance of educating people on more the nuanced rules of campaign finance such as those discussed in this case. Commissioner Piper said ELECT hired Ms. Alexander as a Campaign Finance Program Specialist to travel and train candidates, committees, and campaign committees on campaign finance laws and rules, including Stand By Your Ad. Vice Chair Wheeler stated that she did not know anyone involved in this case, but wanted to ask the Board to consider a lower fine considering the Board was hearing the violations so far from the dates of offense. Mr. Hersch informed the Board that Friends of Team Manassas was created and financed by candidates, not by a group of organized citizens. Mr. Hersch alleged that the treasurer of Friends of Team Manassas was one of the candidates the group supported, and none of the disclosure of who funded the group became apparent until after the election. Mr. Hersch further stated that these candidates started a number of committees, including Friends of Team Manassas and Awareness Manassas (a group the Board heard complaints against in 2017), with the intent to obfuscate information from the public. The motion presented earlier by the Chairman passed unanimously.

The next complaint heard was against Hannah for Hope. Ms. Schneider directed the Board to materials provided by Ms. Risheq to ELECT on May 18, 2018. In the materials, Ms. Risheq made clear that the materials in violation were never intended to be distributed and provided evidence that Ms. Risheq's team gave clear instructions to the printer to include the disclosure, as well as their immediate response upon receiving materials without the disclaimer. Ms. Schneider recommended, given this information, that the fine be no more than \$50. Chairman Alcorn clarified that the original recommendation given by ELECT was for \$100 for a first time offense, but because Ms. Risheq provided an explanation and apology, that Ms. Schneider was amending her recommendation to \$50. Ms. Schneider agreed with the clarification, but explained because that the distribution of the undisclosed materials took place on Election Day, the \$50 fine \$50 for a first violation, should be doubled due to its proximity to the election, but that she recommended a reduced fine of \$50 due to the context Ms. Risheq provided. Chairman Alcorn asked why \$50 was the amount originally fined, stating the original fine

for a first time violation should have been \$100, doubled to \$200. The Chairman then asked if the materials were distributed or not.

Ms. Risheq, present at the meeting, stated that the materials were not authorized for distribution. The undisclosed materials were set aside by the campaign on Election Day, but Ms. Risheq suspected, due to the amount of volunteers going through the campaign office that day, they were accidentally picked up and distributed. Ms. Risheq made clear that whoever distributed them was not authorized to, and that staff did not hand out the undisclosed materials. Vice Chair Wheeler clarified that the materials were in the campaign headquarters, and Ms. Risheq said yes, and recognized the staff should not have kept the ones to be discarded in the office. Ms. Risheq discussed the evidence she provided on May 18, which included a detailed account of communications with the printer; a formal letter sent to the printer that stated that the campaign would not pay for any literature that was printed without the disclosure; an email from Ms. Risheq's manager to the printer; an email with the approved and disclosed literature; other items the campaign used with the proper disclosure; and bank statements proving that Ms. Risheq did not pay for the unused, undisclosed items.

Chairman Alcorn asked that because the campaign did not pay for the undisclosed items that were distributed if the items then met the definition of an expenditure and were therefore subject to SBYA. Ms. Schneider noted there was the contract between Ms. Risheq and the printer, but that both sides breached contract. Ms. Schneider said it could be argued that the materials constituted a contribution of value. Vice Chair Wheeler noted a previous discussion by the Board that if campaigns were not going to use literature, that that literature be sealed up and marked as "do not use." Chairman Alcorn agreed, stating that the fact the campaign did not pay for it does not matter. The Chairman found a violation of print media disclosure requirements, and asked if the materials and letter from Ms. Risheq constituted an explanation. Chairman Alcorn suggested a fine of \$50, considering the materials Ms. Risheq provided. Vice Chair Wheeler stated a lesson learned in getting rid of materials that should not be distributed, and Ms. Risheq explained that she had a staff of two people that did not have time to handle it before Election Day. Chairman Alcorn moved subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Hannah Risheq in violation of §24.2-956 Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure

requirements with regard to an advertisement and is hereby assessed \$50. Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion. Chairman Alcorn voted yea, Vice Chair Wheeler voted yea, and Secretary McAllister did not vote, as she was absent from the room, and the motion carried 2 to 0.

Chairman Alcorn moved *the Board recess to reconvene at 1:00 PM*. Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion. The Board recessed at 12:45 PM and reconvened at 1:08 PM.

The next complaint heard was against the National Right to Work Committee. Ms. Schneider provided the Board with pages 1 and 3 of a 4-page letter, and stated based off these parts of the letter that ELECT received, there was no violation of Stand By Your Ad. Ms. Birkenheier asked if ELECT received pages 2 and 4, and Ms. Schneider confirmed they did not. Chairman Alcorn moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find the National Right to Work committee not in violation of Virginia's campaign finance Stand By Your Ad laws.* Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

The next complaints heard were against Ned Gallaway. Ms. Schneider said there were two complaints against the Gallaway campaign; one was from an individual who reported 8 signs, along with photographic evidence, and the other was from Mr. Gallway, who self-reported a total of 48 signs without disclosure. Mr. Gallway's complaint explained the steps taken to try and fix the situation with the signs that could be found. Ms. Schneider said that a recommended fine was not provided because the evidence was of yard signs, and with the number of reported signs and with the violation happening within 14 days of the election, the maximum penalty could not exceed \$2,500. Secretary McAllister asked what Ms. Schneider's recommendation would be, and Ms. Schneider suggested fining Mr. Gallaway for the signs provided with photographic evidence, but not for those that Mr. Gallaway self-reported, so as not to discourage candidates from selfreporting. Ms. Schneider recommended an \$800 penalty, with a \$50 fine for the first time violation with remediation attempts, doubled due to the proximity to the election, for each of the 8 signs reported by the other complainant. Chairman Alcorn moved subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Ned Gallaway in violation of §24.2-956 Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure requirements with regard

to 8 advertisements, and is hereby assessed \$800. Secretary McAllister seconded the motion.

Ned Gallaway, respondent, spoke and clarified that his campaign ordered 50 signs in total. Mr. Gallaway was running unopposed; however, upon hearing that a write-in candidate was mounting a campaign, Mr. Gallaway ordered signs to have a name presence at the polls and the signs were displayed on Election Day only. Upon realizing the lack of disclaimer, Mr. Gallaway stated the campaign wrote the disclosure statement upon labels and added them on the undisclosed signs they could find. Mr. Gallaway agreed with the Vice Chair's point about improving education for candidates, and said any policies that could outline what were best practices for candidates would be helpful. When Mr. Gallaway realized the violation, he submitted a formal complaint against himself stating the violation and actions taken to remedy the situation. Vice Chair Wheeler noted Mr. Gallaway attempted to fix the signs, and that the signs were only displayed on Election Day. Ms. Schneider apologized for not including Mr. Gallaway's self-reported complaint in the working papers; the complaint included the remediation actions, which constitutes an apology by Board standards. Vice Chair Wheeler asked if the Board would consider reducing the fine. Chairman Alcorn agreed there should be some credit given for selfreporting, and asked Ms. Birkenheier, as counsel to the Board, for advice. Secretary McAllister asked if the Board had any discretion in the matter.

Commissioner Piper noted the Board had full discetion, with the knowledge that the Board tends to act on precedent so the decision made during today's meeting would be binding on or persuasive for the Board when deciding subsequent cases with similar issues or facts. The Commissioner stated in his time working with the Department in campaign finance matters that he could not recall another candidate self-reporting, and commended Mr. Gallaway for doing so. Ms. Schneider informed the Board that there was another instance of self-reporting, to be heard later in the meeting. Vice Chair Wheeler acknowledged that Mr. Gallaway self-reported, but noted that ELECT received another complaint about a possible violation by Mr. Gallaway on Election Day. Secretary McAllister acknowledged the Commissioner's comments regarding setting precedents for subsequent rulings and suggested lowering the fine to \$400, given that Mr. Gallaway self-reported and attempted remediation. Both the Vice Chair and Chairman agreed. The

Secretary suggested an amendment to the Chairman's motion to substitute the penalty of \$800 to \$400, and Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the amendment. The motion passed unanimously.

The next complaints heard were against Pulaski Citizens for an Informed Community. Ms. Schneider began by outlining the undisclosed yard signs, as well as the newspaper ads; ELECT also received additional information regarding advertisements, with additional photographs submitted as evidence. Chairman Alcorn reviewed the recommendations, asking if ELECT was recommending a \$600 penalty. Ms. Schneider confirmed they were, but noted the Board could exercise discretion in regards to the number of signs allegedly in violation. Ms. Schneider counted four non-compliant signs. Chairman Alcorn asked if Pulaski Citizens were a registered local committee, as the advertisements appeared to be in regards to a referendum. Chairman Alcorn asked if referendums and referendum committees were within the scope of SBYA. Ms. Schneider noted that §24.2-955 discussed the scope of disclosure requirements, including an individual who incurs expenses only with respect to a referendum; however, it was unclear who Pulaski Citizens for an Informed Community was funded by. Ms. Birkenheier asked Ms. Schneider if all the signs and advertisements were paid for by the respondent, and Ms. Schneider was unsure given the evidence provided to ELECT. Chairman Alcorn asked if ads related to referendums were exempt from SBYA. Commissioner Piper noted that referendum committees are not subject to SBYA, but individuals are. As Pulaski Citizens was not a registered political committee, the Commissioner was unsure if the ads met disclosure requirements. The Commissioner also directed the Board to the newspaper ad with a sample ballot, and asked if that would have to be referred to the Commonwealth's Attorney. Ms. Schneider agreed, given the sample ballot and the uncertainty regarding the responsibility behind the signs.

A representative from Pulaski Citizens for Education spoke and informed the Board that her committee provided ELECT with the cost for full page ads like the ones that Pulaski Citizens for an Informed Community placed. The representative stated that with the number of ads, and with the cost of placing the ads, the cost of the ads overall would exceed a value of \$1,000, which meets the criteria for being required to form a committee. Pulaski Citizens for Education did report as much to the Commonwealth's Attorney, and

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was unsure who else to direct the complaint to, considering Pulaski Citizens for an Informed Community failed to form a referendum committee. Ms. Birkenheier asked the representative when the violations occurred and when the complaint was filed with ELECT. The representative stated the violations and complaint were submitted in September of 2017. Ms. Birkenheier asked the Board if it would like the pass by the complaint for the day until more information was available. Chairman Alcorn suggested the Board have a discussion on the scope of referendum committees, but agreed with passing the subject by for the day.

The representative further informed the Board that the central issue of their report was that there was a coordinated effort to shield Pulaski Citizens for an Informed Community from the requirements of public disclosure by acting as a referendum committee without registering as such; therefore, the public would assume that the advertisements were paid for and authorized by a committee, when in fact, no such committee existed. The representative asked what passing the topic by for the day entailed. Chairman Alcorn explained that the Board would not rule on the matter during the meeting, and would make a decision in a future meeting.

The next complaint heard was against Schleeper for City Council. Ms. Schneider covered the number of ads in question, as well the proximity of the ads to the election. Mr. Schleeper, respondent, stated it was his first time running. Upon realizing the lack of disclaimer, Mr. Schleeper attempted to add a handwritten disclaimer to each sign. When the campaign received new signs with the proper disclosure, the old, undisclosed signs were disposed of. Chairman Alcorn clarified the recommended fine was a \$50 fine for a first time violation with attempts of remediation and an explanation, doubled due to proximity to the election, and then applied to each sign submitted as evidence, which resulted in a \$400 fine. Vice Chair Wheeler asked how many of the signs were remediated and if the fixes happened before Election Day. Mr. Scheleeper said that new signs were ordered on March 16, with a two-week delivery date, putting the arrival of the new, properly disclosed signs at April 1st; meaning the new signs replaced the undisclosed signs before Election Day. Vice Chair Wheeler noted that the proximity to the election did not apply because Mr. Schleeper hand wrote the disclosures before the election. Ms. Schneider said the complaint alleged that there were four signs, but made no mention of

whether or not there was an attempt to provide disclosure. Chairman Alcorn asked if there were any other photographs submitted as evidence, and Ms. Schneider said there were not.

Vice Chair Wheeler stated because the Board agreed to lower Mr. Gallaway's sign, that they should consider reducing Mr. Schleeper's fine as he attempted to fix the disclosure. Chairman Alcorn clarified that Mr. Gallaway's fine was lowered because Mr. Gallaway self-reported, but noted that other candidates who remediated their signs received a \$50 assessment. Chairman Alcorn stated earlier in the meeting the Board fined based on the number of signs reported. As there was only evidence of one sign per the evidence submitted, rather than the four reported, Commissioner Piper asked if that information would be taken into consideration. Ms. Schneider agreed, noting that the Board did not previously require a photograph of each sign in violation for which a penalty assessed. Ms. Schneider reminded the Board that in Mr. Gallaway's situation, there were 8 signs reported before Mr. Gallaway self-reported 48. Mr. Gallaway was then fined for the 8 signs reported, and the resulting fine was \$400. Vice Chair Wheeler asked Mr. Schleeper for clarification on when the signs were corrected by a handwritten disclosure. Mr. Schleeper said the hand written disclosures were added to the signs before the signs were even disseminated; therefore, the sign in the photographic evidence likely had the handwritten disclaimer on the back of it. Chairman Alcorn stated if there was in fact a disclaimer on the back side of the sign, then there was no violation. Chairman Alcorn moved subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Schleeper for City Council not in violation of Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure requirements. Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

The next complaint heard was against Tim McPeters for Commissioner of the Revenue. Ms. Schneider stated that all of Mr. McPeters's signs were properly disclosed before they were placed, and that no violation of SBYA was to be found. Chairman Alcorn asked why this was submitted as a SBYA complaint, and Mr. McPeters said there was confusion over the size the disclaimer is required to be. Commissioner Piper said that advertisements were required to have their disclaimers placed in a conspicuous manner, and Chairman Alcorn noted that the size requirement was 7 pt. Mr. McPeters stated he had the evidence to indicate that the font on the signs was bigger than that. Ms. Schneider noted that the 7 pt font applies to electronic advertisements, as stated in §24.2-956. Mr.

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McPeters pulled out one of the signs in question, and showed the Board that the disclaimer was placed on both sides. Chairman Alcorn moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Tim McPeters not in violation of Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure requirements.* Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Schneider then gave the Board background on television advertisement disclosure requirements, stating that any television ad that a campaign committee puts out must have a written disclosure that appears on the screen. The disclosure must have the name of the committee or candidate that paid for it. If the ad references another clearly identified candidate, there must be a spoken disclaimer, spoken in the voice of the candidate. The spoken disclaimer must be accompanied by a full screen, unobscured image of the candidate. Unobscured, as defined in §24.2-955, means "that the only printed material that may appear on the television screen is a visual disclosure statement required by law, and that nothing is blocking the view of the disclosing person's face." Ms. Schneider mentioned that the requirement in §24.2-957.1 that there be a disclaimer at the beginning and end of the ad was not applicable because none of the ads being discussed during the meeting were longer than 30 seconds.

The first television ad complaint heard was against a TV advertisement sponsored by the Northam for Governor campaign. Ms. Schneider played the ad for the Board, and said that the complaint alleged that there was an insufficient, full screen image of Governor Northam. Ms. Schneider disagreed with the complaint, noting that the image was not obscured as it was the only photograph on screen, contained the disclosing individual, occupied all space, and contained at least 50% of the vertical height of the screen. Ms. Schneider further noted that no other printed material other than the written disclosure appeared with the image, and that the advertisement met the requirements for oral and written disclosures.

Ms. Schneider noted that with television ads, the written disclosure was required to constitute 20 scan lines in size, but that the size of the written disclosure was not in question and it was unclear how to measure scan lines. Brad Komar, Governor Northam's Campaign Manager, spoke and noted the letter submitted by the DPVA and RPVA. Mr. Komar stated both complaints, against Governor Northam and Ed Gillespie, were filed in

late September. The letter sent to ELECT came from counsel from both the Democratic and Republican parties, and stated the ads substantially complied with §24.2, and that the Board should find both Gillespie and Northam to not be in violation. In regards to the Northam ad, Mr. Komar noted that there was a clear, unobstructed image of Governor Northam. Chairman Alcorn moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3 to find Northam for Governor not in violation of Stand By Your Ad television disclosure.* Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

The next complaint heard was against three television advertisements sponsored by the Ed Gillespie for Governor campaign. Ms. Schneider played the first ad for the Board, noting that because the ad did not mention another candidate, the oral disclosure statement was not required. Ms. Schneider explained that the statement has to be accompanied by an unobscured, full screen photo of the candidate; the advertisement could be considered obscured because there were lines of text that preceded the disclosure statement, and the Code states that the only text on screen could be the disclosure statement. Chairman Alcorn asked if that definition was from ELECT or in the Code, and Ms. Schneider directed the Board to §24.2-955.1. Ms. Birkenheier drew the Board's attention to §24.2-957.1, subsection 1, where the Code stated the requirements for a legend of a disclosure statement; Ms. Birkenheier noted that that subsection did not mention the term "unobscured." Chairman Alcorn clarified that there would only be the unobscured requirement if another candidate was mentioned in the advertisement, as required by §24.2-957.1, subsection 3. Ms. Birkenheier agreed, but deferred to staff on if that interpretation was consistent with past Board actions. Ms. Schneider noted it was unclear if subsection 3 applied to the subsections about the legend as well as to advertisements that clearly identify another candidate; Ms. Schneider also said the Board did not have past rulings on television ads.

Ms. Schneider said, consistent with Ms. Birkenheier's notes, the next two advertisements from Gillespie for Governor clearly identify a candidate and therefore explicitly require an unobscured photograph of Mr. Gillespie to appear during the disclosure statement and would also require a disclosure statement spoken by the sponsoring candidate. Vice Chair Wheeler asked if the reason the first advertisement was being questioned was because there was other print on the screen, noting that the disclosure

text was unobstructed. Ms. Schneider referred back to the definition in the Code discussed, stating the unobscured statement only referred to advertisements that clearly identified another candidate. Commissioner Piper asked Ms. Birkenheier if the unobscured requirement only applied to the candidate's picture, not to the text of the disclosure statement on the screen. Chairman Alcorn pointed out that \$24.2-957.1 read "the disclosure statement" in all of the subsections, except for subsection 5, which read "the oral disclosure statement." The Chairman interpreted the Code as meaning that the unobscured photograph only applied to the oral disclosure statement, rather than the text of a disclosure statement. Because the first advertisement did not have an oral disclosure statement as it did not mention another candidate, the Chairman found no violation in the first advertisement.

Ms. Schneider played the second advertisement for the Board. Chairman Alcorn noted the advertisement did identify another candidate: Governor Northam. The Chairman noted that §24.2-955.1 defined unobstructed as having no other text than the written disclosure statement on screen during the oral disclosure statement. Because Mr. Gillespie's ad included additional text, the Chairman found this advertisement to be in violation of §24.2-957.1. Ms. Birkenheier clarified that the Code allowed the text of visual disclosure statements required by law, but agreed that there was additional text on screen. Ms. Schneider pointed to the third subsection of §24.2-957.1, which states that a candidate may provide the oral disclosure statement required by the section at the same time as the visual disclosure. Vice Chair Wheeler clarified that according to Ms. Schneider's statement, the second advertisement was not in violation. Ms. Schneider corrected the Vice Chair, stating the additional text on the screen, present in addition to the written disclosure, would constitute a violation. Vice Chair Wheeler asked that because there was additional text on the screen, despite the photo of the candidate being otherwise unobstructed and having the disclosure spoken in the candidate's voice, that there was a violation. Ms. Schneider said yes, because of the nuanced definition in the Code. Vice Chair Wheeler stated that it was clear who sponsored the ad, and that the probable intent of the law was so the candidate's face and the written disclaimer were not obstructed. Chairman Alcorn agreed that the definitions were nuanced, but agreed with staff assessment that the advertisement was in violation of §24.2-957.

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Vice Chair Wheeler asked if it mattered that both parties asked to have their complaints withdrawn. Chairman Alcorn reminded the Vice Chair of the earlier conversation, stating that even if the complainant withdrew, a violation still may have happened so it was the Board's duty to review and assess fines regardless. The Vice Chair argued that in addition to requests for withdrawal, the additional text on the screen did not obscure the face of the candidate. Chairman Alcorn agreed, but noted the requirement stated that no text could be on the screen other than the written disclaimer, which was not the case with the particular advertisement. Secretary McAllister also agreed with staff's recommendation to find a violation of §24.2-957. The Secretary stated because this was the first television advertisements the Board would make a ruling on, the Board should adhere closely to the rules as their assessments would establish precedent for future hearings. Vice Chair Wheeler reiterated that the text did not obscure the candidate's face, and said the letter sent by both parties should be counted in the Board's consideration. Ms. Schneider said the letter indicated the advertisements substantially complied, though the Board had indicated otherwise during the discussion, and did not include an explanation, attempt of remediation, or apology. Vice Chair Wheeler asked if both parties' legal counsel were signatories on the letter, and Ms. Schneider said yes.

Ms. Schneider showed the Board the third advertisement. Chairman Alcorn noted the advertisement clearly mentioned another candidate, and therefore required oral disclosure. This advertisement also included extraneous text on the screen during the oral disclosure, rendering the advertisement improperly disclosed in violation of §24.2-957.1; similar to the second advertisement. Chairman Alcorn asked what the typical penalty for a television advertisement was. Ms. Schneider said there have been no previous Board decisions on television advertisements, but that there are recommendations in the campaign finance summaries; Ms. Schneider noted that the maximum penalty was not to exceed \$1,000 per occurrence, or \$2,500 per occurrence if the advertisement occurred within 14 days of the election. In no event could a penalty for a single advertisement exceed \$10,000. Chairman Alcorn asked if it was known when the advertisements ran. Commissioner Piper noted the reason the Board did not hear television violations in the past was because of the per-occurrence issue. Without knowledge of when an advertisement aired or how often it ran, it was difficult to assess an appropriate penalty. The Commissioner asked Ms.

Birkenheier that because the Board was not positive the advertisement ran on television, but knew that it was posted online, if the Board could assess penalties treating the ad as a print media violation; Ms. Birkenheier said yes, the Board had that discretion. Chairman Alcorn asked if the complaints were brought as television ads, and Ms. Schneider said they were, with the complainant alleging multiple broadcasts throughout the Commonwealth.

Chairman Alcorn said because there was no proof the ads ran within the 14 days prior to the election, and noted that neither campaign argued the advertisements weren't television ads, it was appropriate to treat the advertisements as television violations rather than print media. Ms. Birkenheier asked Ms. Schneider if she requested information on the amount of broadcasts for each ad, and Ms. Schneider said yes, but did was not provided any additional information. Chairman Alcorn moved subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Ed Gillespie for Governor in violation of §24.2-956 Stand By Your Ad print media disclosure requirements with regard to 2 advertisements, and is hereby assessed \$2,000. Secretary McAllister seconded the motion.

Vice Chair Wheeler stated members of the General Assembly and the Division of Legislative Services need to be careful when writing Code, and that candidates need to be careful to observe what was written. The Vice Chair stated she believed the intent of the law was to prevent the candidate or speaker's face, and the written disclosure, from being obscured, and did not believe that happened in any of Mr. Gillespie's ads. Ms. Schneider pointed the Board to the campaign finance summaries approved in 2015, which stated that each violation would be assessed a fine of \$2,500, unless the advertisement was disseminated in the 14 days prior to the election in which case the penalty would be \$10,000. Ms. Schneider added that because the complaint reporting the advertisement arrived over a month from the election, the violation did not occur within 14 days prior to the election. Commissioner Piper noted that the summaries needed to be updated, as the Code clearly stated that violations should not be more than \$1,000 per occurrence, or more than \$2,500 per occurrence when within 14 days prior to the election, not to exceed \$10,000 overall. Vice Chair Wheeler asked how the term occurrence was being used, and Chairman Alcorn recommended using the lowest definition, which constituted each advertisement as one violation each, regardless of the number of times the advertisements ran. However, Commissioner Piper noted that §24.2-955.1 defined "occurrence" as "one broadcast of a

radio or television political campaign advertisement." Ms. Schneider added that in no event, regardless of the number of broadcasts, could the penalty for one advertisement exceed \$10,000.

Chairman Alcorn suggested keeping the penalty to \$2,000, with a \$1,000 fine for each of the two advertisements. Vice Chair Wheeler asked if the Board was going to disregard the request to withdraw from the parties, and Chairman Alcorn said yes. The Board then voted on the matter; Chairman Alcorn voted yea, Secretary McAllister voted yea, and Vice Chair Wheeler abstained. The motion passed 2:0:1.

Chairman Alcorn then moved *the Board recess for ten minutes*. The Board reconvened at 2:54 p.m.

The next hearing was regarding Joan Ziglar for Commonwealth's Attorney. Ms. Schneider stated that ELECT recommended finding no violation because the challenged advertisement neither mentions a candidate nor an election, and therefore does not constitute an advertisement expressly advocating for a candidate or election. Chairman Alcorn moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Joan Ziglar not in violation of Virginia's campaign finance Stand By Your Ad laws.* Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed 2 to nothing, as the Secretary was not present in the room for the vote.

The next hearing was regarding Virginia Gov Facts. Ms. Schneider recommended finding no violation, per her recommendation that the advertisement did not contain express advocacy. Chairman Alcorn moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Virginia Gov Facts not in violation of Virginia's campaign finance Stand By Your Ad laws.* Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed 2 to nothing, as the Secretary was not present in the room for the vote.

The next hearing was regarding Virginia Freedom Caucus. Ms. Schneider said the three advertisements before the Board constituted print media advertisements, and had an incomplete disclosure. Ms. Schneider noted that because the publication referred to another candidate, an additional disclosure statement was required by §24.2-957.1. Chairman Alcorn asked if Virginia Freedom Caucus sent any explanation or attempted to remediate the situation. Ms. Schneider answered that the group had a website, but was not registered as a committee with ELECT. ELECT did not have a contact person to notify of

the hearing, but did send notification to a post office box. Ms. Schneider suggested that the case may have to be recommended to the Commonwealth's Attorney for further action because the group did not report or submit a Statement of Organization. Chairman Alcorn observed that no violation occurred because the advertisements did not meet the current definition of express advocacy. Chairman Alcorn moved *subject to the Board's authority under the Code of Virginia §24.2-955.3, to find Virginia Gov Facts not in violation of Virginia's campaign finance Stand By Your Ad laws.* Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed 2 to nothing, as Secretary McAllister was not present.

Vice Chair Wheeler thanked Ms. Schneider for the format and presentation of the hearings. The Vice Chair reiterated the importance of educating candidates on campaign finance rules. Chairman Alcorn agreed, stating the Virginia Benchmark Index Workgroup would help establish areas of need to improve training and education.

Chairman Alcorn then moved to adjourn the meeting. Vice Chair Wheeler seconded the motion, and the motion passed two to nothing. The meeting was adjourned at approximately 3:07 PM. The next Board meeting will be on June 19, at 11:00 AM.

Background:

The requirement for ELECT to provide training and guidelines for Third Party Voter Registration became effective on July 1, 2013. Annually, ELECT reviews and revises the Third Party Voter Registration Training PowerPoint and Guidelines for Conducting Voter Registration Drives to reflect changes in current laws, policies, and procedures. The current version of the Third Party Voter Registration Drive Training and Guidelines for Conducting Voter Drives were approved by the State Board in June of 2017. Because there were no changes in the law, polices, and procedures, the Third Party Voter Drive Training PowerPoint has not been changed, but is included for the Board's continued approval for use in 2018.

ELECT staff recommendations:

ELECT staff recommends the Board approve the proposed changes to the Third Party Voter Drive Training and Guidelines to Conduct Voter Drives.

GUIDELINES FOR CONDUCTING VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVES

Introduction and Notice of Training Requirement

These guidelines outline the several requirements imposed by the Code of Virginia and instructions and best practices as prescribed by the Department of Elections (ELECT) on how to effectively and lawfully conduct a voter registration drive. Helping voters register – like driving or filing taxes – is a serious undertaking. Training and reviewing these guidelines before launching your registration drive will ensure compliance with the law and success in your efforts.

Please note that state law requires any group or individual that requests 25 or more voter registration applications from ELECT or a local general registrar's office to register and complete training approved by the State Board of Elections (SBE) (see page 3 for more information). Groups that print and distribute their own voter registration applications when conducting drives are also strongly encouraged to complete the training to protect both applicants and the individuals working on the drive.

Voter registration applications can be requested in person at the local general registrar's office or by calling ELECT at 1-800-552-9745. Training classes are offered online, at the local voter registration office or by signing up for an in-person class which are held at ELECT's offices. Please visit ELECT's website (www.elections.virginia.gov) for information on upcoming training sessions.

Please read these instructions carefully as failure to follow the requirements laid out by state law may result in criminal penalties. Do not hesitate to contact the Department of Elections (ELECT) or a local voter registration office if you are uncertain on the laws and proper procedures. ELECT thanks you for your efforts to increase voter registration and participation in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

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Registration and Training Requirements for Drives

- ✓ Virginia law requires training and registration for some individuals and groups conducting voter registration drives. Specifically, groups and individuals that obtain 25 or more voter registration applications from ELECT or a local registrar's office must register with ELECT or in person at the general registrar and take training (Va. Code § 24.2-416.6). Groups printing their own registration applications and engaging in registration drives are also strongly encouraged to register and receive this training.
- ✓ Both the registration process and training can be completed online or in-person at the Department of Elections or a local voter registration office.

At least one agent of the organization seeking to obtain applications must complete the training and certify that that the organization will require training for all persons collecting completed voter registration applications from applicants on behalf of the organization. However, if any other individual requests more than 25 applications (even if they claim to represent a group which has already received the training), the individual is still required to complete the training prior to receiving the requested applications. In sum, each individual or agent requesting applications must receive the training. Other groups and individuals conducting voter registration drives that obtain their registration applications through other means are strongly encouraged, but not required, to receive training prior to conducting a drive.

- ✓ Upon completion of in-person training, the group or individual will receive a certificate stating that they have completed the required training for conducting voter registration drives in the Commonwealth. The certification is valid until June 30^{th} each year upon which time the training must be completed again in order to renew the certification.
- ✓ For more information on the training requirements please contact your local voter registration office or ELECT at 1-800-552-9745. The registration and training module can be accessed at www.elections.virginia.gov/.

Rules of the Road: Best Practices Overview

- 1. Make sure the organization you represent is (1) registered with the Department of Elections (this can be checked by contacting ELECT at 1-800-552-9745), and (2) has taken state approved training about your legal responsibilities. For training and registration requirements see page 3 and the forms at the end of this document. These requirements apply if an individual or an organization receives 25 or more applications from the Department of Elections or a local voter registration office. Other groups are encouraged to receive training.
- 2. When approaching individuals, introduce yourself and the organization you represent, explain your purpose, the qualifications to vote in Virginia, and whether or not you will deliver the completed application for the applicant. You should inform voters that Virginia now has online voter registration and address update available on the ELECT website to those with a Virginia driver's license or DMV ID card. This information will be helpful to an applicant that wishes to ensure their application is delivered in real time directly to their local voter registration office.
- 3. Target only non-registered individuals who are qualified to vote or registered individuals who have outdated registration information such as those who moved and did not update their registration address.
 - ✓ Don't complete or accept applications for anyone who you know is not eligible to vote, such as a convicted felon whose rights have not been restored or a non-Virginia resident.
 - ✓ Don't attempt to re-register individuals who are registered and have up to date information. Registrants are able to check to their registration information and status online at www.elections.virginia.gov
 - ✓ You should leave the registration application with the individual if he/she is uncertain as to their registration status or his/her qualification to register to vote.

The Qualifications to Vote in Virginia:

- ✓ Citizen of the United States.
- ✓ Resident of Virginia (residency requires both domicile and a place of abode, i.e., an intention to remain indefinitely and a physical place to live.) Voters must provide a <u>current</u> residence address when completing the application. Note: special rules apply to military and overseas voters.
- ✓ Must be at least 18 years old on or before the date of the next general election. 17 year olds may register and vote in special elections and primaries, specifically the presidential primary.
- ✓ Unless rights have been restored, must not have been convicted of a felony nor have been judged by a court to be mentally incapacitated (either in VA or another state). Restoration required as to each disqualifying conviction or adjudication.
- 4. Instruct individual that the application <u>must</u> be completed <u>neatly</u>, <u>accurately</u>, and in its <u>entirety</u>.
 - ✓ Failure to provide the required information, including citizenship status, will result in the rejection of an applicant's registration.
 - ✓ Applicants are also required to list their previous registration address to help prevent registration in more than one jurisdiction or duplicate registrations. An applicant who is already registered in Virginia may update his record using an application that is

- completed with the changed information and signed by the voter. A registrant may also update his or her address online with the online registration portal at the ELECT website if the registrant has a Virginia driver's license or DMV ID card.
- ✓ Intentionally making a materially false statement on the registration application may result in felony prosecution or other penalties.
- 5. Unless specifically directed by the applicant, do not complete the blanks on the registration application.
- 6. Respect the wishes of those who decline to register. It is unlawful to, by use of threats or force, interfere with or attempt to interfere with a person applying or declining to register to vote. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.
- 7. Those registering should be reminded that they are required to provide their identification at the polls. Please encourage individuals to contact their local registration office or visit www.elections.virginia.gov for more information on Virginia's voter identification requirements.
- 8. If you offer to deliver the application, you <u>must</u> complete and provide a receipt to the applicant upon his/her completion of the application. Va. Code § 24.2-418.1.
- 9. You <u>must</u> deliver completed applications to the local voter registration office or to ELECT within 10 days of signature date or by 5:00pm on the day of the next election's registration deadline, whichever date comes first. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01.
- 10. To ensure the timely and accurate processing of registration applications, you should provide the appropriate local voter registration office with an alphabetical list detailing the name on every application delivered.
- 11. **You may be subject to criminal penalties if you fail to give the applicant a receipt to document your timely delivery of completed applications.**

As of July 1, 2013, the Department of Elections provides online voter registration. An individual now has the ability to complete their application directly on ELECT's website (www.elections.virginia.gov). The application can be completed by the individual on a tablet or laptop.

The Do's: Basic Instructions and Guidelines

1. Register with election officials, complete official training, and ensure training of volunteers and staff:

- ✓ Please see Registration and Training Requirements on page 3 and forms at the end of the guidelines.
- ✓ When obtaining 25 or more voter registration applications from ELECT or a local registrar's office, such individuals or groups are required to register with ELECT (this is done by completing the required training either online, in the local voter registration office or in person at ELECT's offices). Groups printing their own registration applications are also strongly encouraged to register and receive this training. Va. Code § 24.2-416.6
- ✓ If you are the organizer, manager, or supervisor of your organization's voter registration drive, ensure that your volunteers and staff are trained on and knowledgeable about these guidelines and Virginia law on voter registration drives.
- ✓ Voter registration drives are serious undertakings and it is imperative you follow the laws and guidelines that are designed to protect both the drive and the registration applicant. It is essential that all participants in your organization's voter registration drive are made aware of the rules, regulations, and guidelines related to voter registration drives as well as the legal consequences for failure to comply with Virginia and federal law.
- ✓ When conducting drives your volunteers and staff should, at a minimum, keep the two page "Best Practices and Overview for Volunteers" document on pages 4 and 5 with them for quick reference.
- ✓ Each section of the registration application asks for information that the applicant must provide in order for the voter registration office to accept the application and register the individual. It is important that you familiarize yourself with the application. Official training materials and these guidelines should answer any questions you may have regarding the registration application; however, if questions remain please contact ELECT or a local voter registration office.

2. You should only seek to register eligible Virginia residents who are not currently registered and those whose registration information is not up to date:

- ✓ Please review the FAQ section below as it relates to qualifications to register to vote in Virginia. Individuals ineligible to vote should not be instructed to complete registration applications.
- ✓ Individuals should complete a new application only to apply to register to vote or notify their local voter registration office of a change to their existing voter registration record such as a change in residence address or name.
- ✓ You should not seek to re-register individuals who are already registered to vote and whose information is current. You should also not offer applications to individuals who indicate they are not residents of Virginia. Please see "The Don'ts" #1 below for additional information.

3. <u>Drives must complete and provide applicants a receipt if offering to deliver a completed application:</u>

✓ If you offer to deliver the application, Virginia state law requires that voter

- registration drives provide the applicants a receipt upon his/her completion of the voter registration application. Va. Code § 24.2-418.1.
- ✓ Attached to the registration application is a receipt that requests and/or displays the following information:
 - The receipt requests the individual to provide the name of the applicant, the name of the group or individual receiving the application, an email address and daytime telephone number of the group or individual delivering the application, and the date the application was completed.
 - The form also provides contact information for ELECT and notes that individuals should contact ELECT if the voter has not been notified of their registration status within 30 days. You may also wish to refer individuals to the contact information for local registration offices located on the back of the registration application instruction form.
- ✓ Your group may also prepare receipts that request and include the same information on the receipt on the registration application listed above.
- ✓ The receipt shall be completed by the person or group receiving the completed form from the applicant.
- ✓ You may be subject to criminal penalties if you fail to give the applicant a receipt to document your timely delivery of completed applications. Va. Code §§ 24.2-418.1, 24.2-1002.01, 24.2-1017 and 24.2-1018.
- 4. Completed applications must be delivered to the appropriate local voter registration office or to ELECT within 10 days of the signature date or by 5:00pm the day of the next election's registration deadline, whichever is sooner:
 - ✓ Please note: It is more important that the applications be delivered *even if they are late*. Discarding voter registration applications is punishable as a misdemeanor under § 24.2-1002.01.
 - ✓ Best practices dictate delivery of the completed applications to the appropriate local voter registration office. Virginia state law requires that individuals receiving completed applications timely deliver the application to the local voter registration office, ELECT, or designated voter registration agency. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01.
 - ✓ The mailing or delivery of an application is timely if it is mailed or delivered within 10 days of the applicant's signature on the application <u>or</u> by 5:00pm on the voter registration deadline for the next election, <u>whichever comes first.</u>
 - ✓ Please be mindful of upcoming voter registration deadlines when circulating applications.
 - ***Failure to deliver completed applications is punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor and can result in the failure of individuals to be timely registered and, consequently, disenfranchised. ***
 - ✓ To the extent possible, please sort and deliver the registration applications to the voter registration office of the locality designated on the registration application. For example, one should not deliver a voter registration application for a Virginia Beach resident to the City of Richmond. Doing so delays the processing of the voter registration application and results in unnecessary costs to the registrar. If your drive is engaged in delivering voluminous numbers of registration applications on behalf of individuals residing in multiple localities, please contact ELECT to discuss the possible delivery of applications directly to ELECT.

✓ Please also be considerate of not "dumping" voluminous numbers of voter registration applications on the registrar offices immediately prior to the registration deadline. Doing so makes it very difficult for local election officials to timely process the applications prior to the election. Instead, you should submit applications to the appropriate voter registration office as you receive them. Waiting until the applicable deadlines risks delaying the processing of applications and may result in insufficient time to resolve any problems with registration applications.

5. Drives Should Provide Alphabetical Listing of Applications with Registrar:

✓ ELECT requests that voter registration drives provide the appropriate local voter registration office with an alphabetical list detailing the name on every application delivered to the registrar. Such a list protects you and your applicants.

6. <u>Be Aware of and Communicate "New" Voter Identification Requirements to Applicants:</u>

- ✓ Virginia law requires all voters to provide Photo identification when voting in person.
- ✓ There are several forms of ID that are permitted and they include:
 - a valid Virginia driver's license;
 - a valid DMV issued Identification card;
 - ELECT issued Photo Identification card (for voting purposes only);
 - a valid college or university student photo identification card (college or institution must be located in Virginia) (Effective January 1, 2016, photo ID issued by any private school in Virginia will be an accepted form of ID for voting.)
 - any valid Federal, Virginia state or local government-issued ID; and
 - a valid employer issued photo ID card.
- ✓ Department of Elections will provide photo identification card free of charge if applicant/voter does not possess a satisfactory photo identification. Please have applicants contact their local voter registration office should they need a photo identification, or if they have questions on identification requirements to vote in Virginia.

7. <u>Instruct volunteers that all voter registration applications must be completed neatly, accurately and in their entirety:</u>

- Registration applications must be completed in their **entirety**. Incomplete applications may be rejected by the local voter registration office. It is important that applicants closely follow the instructions on the application to ensure all required fields are completed.
- ✓ Please instruct applicants to print as <u>neatly</u> as possible. Illegible handwriting on applications is a common reason for rejection of applications and keying errors when inputting the individual's data into the statewide registration database.
- ✓ The information provided must be <u>accurate</u>. There are criminal penalties for intentionally making a materially false statement on the application. Examples of materially false statements could include falsely affirming United States citizenship, legal age, not disclosing a prior felony conviction, residence address, or registration status in another state.
- ✓ It is extremely important that volunteers and registration drive participants understand the legal qualifications to vote in the Commonwealth and that they

convey that information to applicants when completing the voter registration application. Please see the FAQ below addressing qualifications to register to vote in Virginia.

The Don'ts: Prohibitions and Penalties

1. <u>Drives must not intentionally solicit multiple applications from any one person or seek</u> to re-register a voter whose registration information is current:

- ✓ Virginia law explicitly prohibits an individual from soliciting multiple registrations from any one person or intentionally falsifying a registration application. Violations are punishable as a Class 5 felony. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01.
- ✓ You should also make every effort to avoid handing in duplicate registrations or reregistering individuals whose registration information is current. Some practical solutions to avoid re-registering current voters include:
 - If a voter believes that he/she may already be registered to vote and that his/her information may be current, you should leave the registration application with the voter for the individual to mail in or inform the voter about the new online voter registration option after the individual has confirmed his/her status. Be sure to remind the applicant of upcoming registration deadlines.
 - Encourage the <u>individual</u> to verify his/her voter registration information online at http://www.elections.virginia.gov/register.
 - Asking the voter if he/she has his/her voter registration card available and to have the voter review it and verify the information is up to date.
 - Contact ELECT during normal business hours at 1-800-552-9745 or their local voter registration office. Staff can immediately confirm the voter's registration information.
 - Obtain lists of registered voters from ELECT to cross-check potential registrants. Please see FAQ below.

Intentionally submitting duplicate registrations may be a felony and delays the processing of new registration applications.

- ✓ A registration application can be used to notify a local voter registration office of a change to the voter's record, including a change of address or a change of name. Please do accept applications from registered voters wishing to update their registration records.
- ✓ It is a Class 1 misdemeanor to communicate false information to a registered voter, including false information regarding the voter's registration status. Va. Code § 24.2-1005.1. Accordingly, it is unlawful to inform a voter that he/she needs to re-register after the individual affirms that his/her registration information is up to date. Please review the registration laws and requirements and do not convey false information to voters. If you do not know, please refer potential registrants to the ELECT or any local general registrar for information.

2. <u>Do not complete or accept applications for anyone that you know is not eligible to vote:</u>

- ✓ Please read the FAQ section to become familiarized with the qualifications to vote in Virginia.
- ✓ Do not offer applications to felons whose rights have not been restored, non-residents of Virginia, and others you know are ineligible to vote. Similarly, do not provide advice that an individual may legally be registered to vote in multiple states.
- ✓ Under no circumstances should you knowingly accept an application from someone

- using a fictitious name or alias.
- ✓ Any willfully false material statement or entry made by any person in a voter registration application constitutes election fraud and is punishable as a Class 5 felony. Va. Code § 24.2-1016.
- ✓ Persuading a voter to provide false information on his/her voter registration application may also constitute the felony crime of solicitation. Va. Code §§ 18.2-29 and 24.2-1004.

3. <u>Do not destroy, make changes to, or alter in any way a completed voter registration application:</u>

- ✓ Virginia state law expressly prohibits an individual from intentionally destroying a completed registration application. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01 (Class 1 misdemeanor).
- ✓ Virginia also expressly prohibits an individual from intentionally falsifying a registration application. Va. Code § 24.2-1016 (Class 5 felony).
- ✓ Completed applications cannot be changed without signed permission from the applicant. See 1 VAC 20-40-70(F).
- ✓ Changing an application to accomplish fraud is a Class 5 felony. Va. Code § 24.2-1009.

4. <u>Do not pre-populate the registration blanks with information, and unless the individual is physically disabled you must not sign the application:</u>

- ✓ Virginia law expressly prohibits third parties from pre-populating the application with information the applicant is required to provide, unless directed by the applicant. § 24.2-418.
- ✓ Individuals providing assistance <u>must</u> include their name and address if they sign for the applicant.
- ✓ It is important to print neatly and legibly if you do offer assistance.

5. <u>Voter registration is a public accommodation like a bus or restaurant: You cannot discriminate illegally:</u>

- ✓ It is a violation of federal law to refuse to provide a registration application to an individual because of his/her race, religion, or other suspect classification.
- ✓ Conducting a partisan registration drive that discriminates based on political party affiliation could endanger your organization's tax-exempt status. Please review the applicable Internal Revenue Service (IRS) guidelines and/or consult with legal counsel regarding registration drives and tax-exempt status.
- ✓ Once you accept a completed registration application, you <u>must</u> deliver that application in a timely manner to the appropriate voter registration office.

6. Must not misuse personal information contained on the registration application:

- ✓ Warning: Unauthorized disclosure of all or part of an applicant's social security number is a felony. Unauthorized use of any personal information to defraud also is a crime. Va. Code §§ 18.2-186.3, 24.2-1002.1.
- ✓ Virginia law contains specific prohibitions regarding the use of personal information without permission of the person who is the subject of the identifying information. Please review Va. Code § 18.2-186.3 to ensure that any proposed retention of registration information is in compliance with Virginia law.
- ✓ State law allows the release of lists of registered voters to certain organizations for political purposes and/or to promote voter registration. We encourage you to contact

the Department of Elections if you or your organization would like to purchase a list of registered voters. Please see FAQ section below for more information.

7. Must not bribe, threaten, coerce, intimidate, etc. voters into registering to vote:

- ✓ State law expressly prohibits the use of threats or force to interfere with or attempt to interfere with any person applying for or declining to register to vote. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.
- ✓ Federal law prohibits an individual from using intimidation, threats, or coercion in urging or aiding a person in registering to vote. 52 USC 20511.
- ✓ Federal law also prohibits an individual from offering enticements or incentives for completing a voter registration application. 52 USC 10307(c).
- ✓ Federal law also expressly prohibits charging anyone for a voter registration application or charging for helping them to fill out the application. 52 USC 10307(c).
- ✓ Conspiracies to interfere with free exercise of voting rights are subject to felony prosecution under state law. Va. Code § 24.2-1015.
- 8. <u>Do not write or attach anything to the voter registration application related to candidates or ballot measures.</u>

Frequently Asked Questions

Voter Registration Questions:

Q. Where do I obtain voter registration applications for my drive?

- ✓ The Department of Elections will make available to any individual or group a reasonable number of voter registration application forms. Va. Code § 24.2-416.3. Any group or individual seeking 25 or more registration applications is required to register with the Department of Elections and take online or in-person training on the best practices and legal requirements for conducting registration drives. Please see page 3 above.
- ✓ <u>Blank</u> applications may be photocopied. However, an original signature is required on completed applications. The original signature may be applied electronically.
- ✓ A PDF of the voter registration application can be downloaded at www.elections.virginia.gov.
- ✓ Please complete the Sworn Affidavit Form below to request registration applications for your drive.
- ✓ Online: ELECT now offers the ability for individuals to complete and submit their voter registration application on-line.
 - To qualify for on-line submission of the application, the individual must either already be registered (updating their registration) or have a DMV issued identification.
 - For unregistered individuals who do not have a DMV ID, the opportunity to complete the application is still available on-line, but the applicant will be required to print, sign and mail the application to the appropriate local voter registration office or to ELECT.

Q. Who May Register to Vote in Virginia?

Below, please find the qualifications to register to vote in Virginia:

- ✓ <u>Citizen of U.S.:</u> Must be a citizen of the United States.
- ✓ Resident of Virginia: Must be a resident of Virginia. A person who has come to Virginia temporarily and intends to return to his/her state of residence is not considered a Virginia resident for voting purposes. Persons who legally reside in another state (for example, students who intend to return to their home state upon graduation) should register in their home state using the voter registration application for their home state, or the national application, not the Virginia application. Active duty uniformed services personnel and overseas citizens may retain Virginia residency under specific federal and state laws.

***Residency in Virginia is a prerequisite to be eligible to register to vote.

Residency requires both domicile and a place of abode. To establish domicile, a person must live in a particular locality with the intention to remain indefinitely. A place of abode is the physical place where a person dwells. ***

✓ <u>18 Years of Age by Next General Election</u>: Must be at least 18 years old on or before the date of the next general election. (Seventeen- year olds who will be 18 by the next general election may register in advance and vote in any primary or special election in the

- intervening period prior to the general election. Seventeen year olds who will be 18 by the next presidential election may register in advance and vote in any presidential primary or other primary held on the same day as the presidential primary.)
- ✓ No Felony Conviction or Mental Incapacity Adjudication: Unless voting rights have been restored, the applicant must have no felony conviction, nor have been judged by a court to be mentally incapacitated. (Please see FAQ below on felons.)
 - o For felonies, the Governor or the convicting jurisdiction can restore voting rights.
 - For adjudications of incapacity, a court order is required to restore voting rights.
 Rarely, an adjudication order may specifically provide voting rights. Va. Code § 64.2-2000.
- ✓ Virginia law makes special provisions for some military and overseas voters. Please have individuals with questions contact the Department of Elections or their local registration office should they have questions regarding their registration eligibility.
- ✓ For more information please review Va. Constitution Article II, §§ 1-2; Va. Code §§ 24.2-101, 24.2-400, 24.2-417 and 24.2-418; and 1 VAC 20-40-10 through 20-40-60.

Q. How does a felon know if his/her rights have been restored?

✓ Those convicted of a felony in Virginia must apply to the Governor or other appropriate authority to have their rights restored. Some states automatically restore voting rights to felons. Individuals convicted of a felony in a state other than Virginia should contact the appropriate authorities in that state to determine whether or not their rights have been restored. If a person has been convicted of a felony and would like to know eligibility requirements for restoration of civil rights, he/she should contact:

✓ Do not attempt to register felons whose voting rights have not been restored—you and the applicants could be prosecuted for felony voter fraud. Va. Code § 24.2-1004(B).

Completing a Voter Registration Application:

Q. What information is required to be completed on the application?

- ✓ <u>All</u> required information asked for on the application <u>must</u> be provided. The phone number and email address are not required. However, please let the voter know that failure to include that information may result in the inability of election staff to contact the applicant should the staff member need to verify unreadable handwriting and may result in denial if they are otherwise unable to reach the voter where there is a lack of clarity. If any information requested on the application does not apply to the voter, he/she should write "none" or place a dash in the appropriate space. Va. Code § 24.2-418.
- ✓ It is required and important for an applicant to closely read and complete the section on the registration application that asks if the applicant is currently registered to vote in Virginia or another state. Completing this information allows the registrar to communicate with election officials in another state that the voter has registered in Virginia and that their registration

- should be cancelled.
- ✓ The registrant must sign and date the application.
- ✓ If the volunteer signs the application for the applicant with physical disabilities who is unable to sign, the volunteer must include his/her name and address on the application. Please see Signature Line on the registration application.
- ✓ Failure to complete the form properly may result in a denial of the application.
- ✓ It is important that the applicant and/or individual providing assistance print neatly and legibly when completing the voter registration application.

Q. Are applicants permitted to include a <u>future</u> address as their mailing or residence address?

✓ A voter must provide his/her <u>current</u> residence address and mailing address when registering to vote. § 24.2-418.

Q. Are applicants permitted to list a P.O. Box for their mailing address? If so, are they still required to list their street address?

- ✓ Some individuals may be qualified to include a P.O. Box in addition to their residence address on the registration application. These individuals must still provide his or her residence address. Individuals qualified to include a P.O. Box mailing address either (1) have a residence address that is not deliverable by the USPS; OR (2) meet the legal definition of protected voter in the Code of Virginia who may non-publish their residence address in voter lists. The list of protected voters set out in the Code is as follows:
 - Active or retired law enforcement officers.
 - Persons under protective order.
 - Persons who are threatened or stalked (must have complaint to law enforcement).
 - Participants registered with the Attorney General's Address Confidentiality Program.
 - Judges and attorneys employed by the U.S. or Virginia Attorney General (active or retired).
- ✓ Protected voters claiming eligibility to not publish their residence address must provide the appropriate three digit code on the registration application to certify they are legally eligible.
- ✓ These eligible voters <u>must</u> still provide a complete residence address. This is necessary to determine their ballot choices and the location of their polling place. Va. Code § 24.2-418.
- ✓ If the registrant has any questions about mailing addresses or address protection, they should contact their local voter registration office or the Department of Elections.

Q. What about homeless people? How do they complete the registration application?

- ✓ A homeless person can register to vote if he/she intends to remain in a locality indefinitely and provides some residence address indicating the primary place where he/she stays at night. This is necessary to determine for whom a person can vote and the location of the applicant's polling place.
- ✓ A mailing address is required to ensure that the voter will receive his/her registration card and to avoid cancellation of voting eligibility due to returned mail. Some homeless shelters allow people to have their voter registration cards mailed to the shelter address. By

providing this service, the homeless person is able to pick up his/her card from the shelter address. Call the local voter registration office if you have questions about registering the homeless.

Q. Am I permitted to assist a voter in completing his/her application?

- Recent changes to the law explicitly prohibit individuals from pre-populating the registration application for the individual unless directed by the voter. This does not prohibit you from assisting an individual with completing the application. All applications must be signed, either by the applicant or the assistant for a person unable to sign due to physical disability. Signing the form under felony penalty makes the person signing legally responsible for the truthfulness of all statements on the form. Any assistant must be identified if the applicant is unable to sign due to physical disability.
- ✓ A signature under a power-of-attorney is not permitted. Va. Code § 24.2-123.

Responsibility for Delivering and Timeliness of Delivery:

Q. Who is responsible for delivering the completed voter registration applications and where should they be delivered?

- ✓ If you offer to deliver or mail the completed registration applications to the local voter registration office or ELECT, then you must follow through on that offer or risk criminal penalties. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01. Please see applicable deadlines below.
- ✓ Voter registration applications can be turned in to any local voter registration office or to the Department of Elections, 1100 Bank St, 1st Floor, Richmond, VA 23219.
- ✓ For timely processing of registration applications, ELECT encourages you to sort and deliver the completed applications to the voter registration office of the locality indicated on the registration application. Applications are considered "on time" once they arrive at ELECT or at any Virginia registrar's office, or if they are mailed with a postmark on or before the final day of registration.
- ✓ Contact information for all voter registration offices can be found on the registration application and at the following website:

Q. Is there a deadline for delivering completed voter registration applications?

✓ Yes. The coordinator of the voter registration drive has the responsibility for making sure all completed applications are mailed or delivered to ANY local voter registration office or the Department of Elections within 10 days of signature date or not later than 5:00 pm on the due date, whichever is earlier. (22 days before any General Election Day). The failure to timely deliver completed applications constitutes a Class 1 misdemeanor and can result in the failure of individuals to be timely registered and, consequently, disenfranchised. ELECT and local voter registration office will refer these violations to the appropriate Commonwealth's Attorney and/or Office of the Attorney General for investigation and prosecution. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01

- ✓ If mailed, registration applications must be postmarked no later than the voter registration deadline.
- ✓ If delivered in person, either by the applicant or a third party, the application must be received by 5:00 pm on the deadline.
- ✓ Applications postmarked or received after the deadline will be held and processed after the election; these applications will be effective for the next election if the applicant is otherwise qualified.
- ✓ It is important to realize that failure to deliver applications even after the deadline for submission will result in disenfranchisement and potentially more serious consequences to the individual responsible for non-delivery.

Q. When is the voter registration deadline?

- ✓ For a general or primary election, the deadline is the close of business on the 22nd day before the election. Va. Code § 24.2-416.
- ✓ Limited exceptions may apply for certain military and returning overseas voters. Va. Code §§ 24.2-419 and 24.2-420.1.
- ✓ For a special election held at a time other than a general election, deadlines are shorter (either thirteen or six days prior to the election). Va. Code § 24.2-416.
- ✓ ELECT encourages you to contact the agency or a local voter registration office if you have any questions or uncertainty regarding your obligations to return completed voter registration applications by the registration deadline for a particular election.

Q. What if applicants wish to keep their voter registration applications and turn them in themselves?

- ✓ If the applicant requests, you must allow him/her to take the voter registration application and return it him/herself.
- ✓ ELECT encourages this practice. It relieves the registration drives of the responsibility to timely deliver applications and provide a receipt, allows individuals to verify their registration status before submitting another application, and ensures that local voter registration offices are not inundated with large numbers of registration applications immediately prior to the registration deadline.
- ✓ The applicant can deliver the voter registration application through the postal system or in person to any voter registration office.
- ✓ It would be helpful for you to provide envelopes with postage stamps to individuals who wish to mail in their registration application.
- ✓ Allowing an individual to submit his/her own registration applications is particularly appropriate when the voter suspects that he/she is already registered and/or the registration information is up to date.

Training:

Q. Is training available for my registration drive workers?

✓ Yes. State approved training is required for individuals or organizations that obtain 25 or

more voter registration applications from state or local elections officials. Training is available in several formats:

- Online training is available and easily accessible at the ELECT website (www.elections.virginia.gov).
- Instructor led training is available; the schedule for classes is also available on ELECT's website (www.elections.virginia.gov).
- Each local voter registration office will offer in-person training. Written training materials will be available. Please contact your local voter registration office for more information.
- Please see page 3 above for additional information.

Other Questions:

Q. How will individuals know if their registration was accepted?

- ✓ The local voter registration office will determine registration eligibility. A voter registration notification will be mailed to eligible registrants. Va. Code §§ 24.2-417 and 24.2-418.
- ✓ A denial letter will be mailed to any applicant determined not to be eligible.
- ✓ Any applicant who does not receive either confirmation of voter registration or a denial notice within 30 days should contact their local registration office.
- ✓ Any application received after the registration deadline will not be processed until after the election which follows the registration deadline. No voter registration confirmation or denial letters will be issued during this period. Va. Code § 24.2-416.

Q. What about the national voter registration application?

- ✓ The national application is available at <u>www.EAC.gov</u> and should be used for persons with legal residence outside Virginia.
- ✓ ELECT and the local voter registration offices strongly urge your registration drive to use the Virginia Voter Registration Application as it requests all information required to register to vote in Virginia. While this information is in the federal long-form instructions, the national application does not ask the applicant if he/she was convicted of a felony, information that is required to be provided in order to submit a complete registration application in Virginia.
- ✓ Active-duty military personnel should be encouraged to use the Federal Post Card Application, available at: www.FVAP.gov.

Q. May I obtain a list of Virginia registered voters?

- ✓ The Code of Virginia permits ELECT to furnish, at a reasonable price, lists of registered voters to certain groups and individuals, including non-profit organizations that promote voter participation and registration.
- ✓ Please review Va. Code § 24.2-405 and contact ELECT staff if you would like to request a list of registered voters.

Q. What if I have a question not addressed by these guidelines?

✓ For questions concerning deadlines, completion of the application and voting on Election Page 18 of 21

Criminal Penalty for Nondelivery or Late Application

§ 24.2-1002.01. Destruction of, or failure to mail or deliver, voter registration application; penalty.

If any person (i) agrees to mail or deliver a signed voter registration application to the voter registrar or other appropriate person authorized to receive the application and (ii) intentionally interferes with the applicant's effort to register either by destroying the application or by failing to mail or deliver the application in a timely manner, he shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. The mailing or delivery of an application shall be deemed timely for the purposes of this section if it is mailed or delivered within 10 days of the applicant's signature or in accordance with the provisions of § 24.2-416.4 for processing before the closing of the registration records for the pending election whichever comes first. This section shall not apply to any state or local government employee acting in his official capacity. If any person intentionally solicits multiple registrations from any one person or intentionally falsifies a registration application, he shall be guilty of a Class 5 felony.

ATTENTION: Overseas citizens, uniformed service voters, qualifying spouses and dependents may register using the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA), available at www.frap.gov.

Go Online

You may complete your voter registration application online at <u>elections.virginia.gov/register</u>. You may also check your voter registration status online at <u>elections.virginia.gov/status</u>.

Your Address

You must provide a street address or description of your physical dwelling place as a residence address. If your residence address is not serviced by the U.S. Postal Service, or if you are homeless, you can list a mailing address in Box 4. Overseas citizens, uniformed service members, qualifying spouses and dependents can list a mailing address in Box 4. If you are a qualified protected voter, you must list a Virginia post office box to protect your residential address from public disclosure in Box 4. No other applicant can list a mailing address.

How to Mail

Mail your completed application to your local registrar. Use the online address lookup tool if you do not know your registrar's address: <u>elections.virginia.gov/localGR</u> or mail your application to:

Mailed applications must be postmarked at least 22 days before the next election in which you plan to vote. A qualified active-duty uniformed services member, spouse or dependent is NOT subject to the mailing deadline if by reason of active duty, you are normally absent from the locality in which you reside.

Privacy Act Notice

When registering to vote, Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution of Virginia (1971) requires you to provide your social security number, if you have one. If you do not provide your social security number, your application will be denied. Voting officials use the social security number as a unique identifier to ensure that no voter is registered in more than one place.

Your application will only be open to inspection by the public if the social security number is removed. Your social security number will appear on reports produced only for official use by voter registration and election officials, for jury selection purposes by courts, and all lawful purposes. Your decision to decline to register to vote as well as the office where you submit your application, if you choose to do so, are confidential and will only be used for voter registration purposes.

Photo ID

All voters must show one acceptable, valid photo ID when voting in-person. For a complete list of acceptable forms of photo identification visit: <u>elections.virglinia.gov/voterID</u>. All acceptable forms of photo ID can be used up to a year after the ID has expired.

Photo Identification

- All voters are required to present a photo ID when voting in person.
 - ID must contain a picture and name of the registrant
- The law provides for free voter registration cards that contain a voter's photograph and signature if the voter does not possess other satisfactory photo ID.

Acceptable Photo Identification (for voting)

- Valid Virginia Driver's License
- DMV issued photo identification card
- Valid United States passport
- Valid Employee photo identification
- Other government issued photo identification
- Valid student ID issued by a public school or private school in Virginia displaying a photo
- Valid college or university student photo identification card (issuer must be an institution of higher education located in Virginia)

Important Things to Remember

- Only register Virginia residents who are not currently registered or whose information is outdated.
- Voters can check their registration status by visiting vote.virginia.gov.
- Provide a receipt to each applicant.
- Deliver applications timely (within 10 days)!
- Provide alphabetical listing of applications.

Important Things to Remember

- Do not pre-populate the application.
- Do not solicit multiple applications from one person.
- Do not destroy, make changes to, or alter completed applications.
- Do not copy the Social Security Number.
- Do not discriminate.

- Are applicants permitted to include a future address as their mailing or residence address?
 - -NO
- Can a homeless person apply to register to vote?
 - YES

FAQ's (continued)

- Where do I deliver the completed applications?
 - It is best to deliver them to the general registrar of the locality where the voter lives.
- How long do I have to deliver the applications?
 - You have 10 days or until the registration deadline for the next election, whichever comes first.

FAQ's (continued)

- How will individuals know if their registration was accepted?
 - The local general registrar will determine registration eligibility. A voter registration notice advising the applicant of acceptance of their voter registration will be mailed to the registrant.
 - A denial notice will be mailed to any applicant determined not to be eligible.
 - Any applicant who does not receive either a voter registration or denial notice within 30 days should contact their local registration office.

FAQ's (continued)

- Can the national voter registration application be used in Virginia?
 - YES; however, the Department of Elections prefers you use the Virginia form.
- May I obtain a list of active registered voters in Virginia?
 - The Code of Virginia permits the Department of Elections to furnish, at a reasonable price, lists of registered voters to certain groups and individuals, including non-profit organizations that promote voter participation and registration.

GUIDELINES FOR CONDUCTING VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVES

Introduction and Notice of Training Requirement

These guidelines outline the several requirements imposed by the Code of Virginia and instructions and best practices as prescribed by the Department of Elections (ELECT) on how to effectively and lawfully conduct a voter registration drive. Helping voters register – like driving or filing taxes – is a serious undertaking. Training and reviewing these guidelines before launching your registration drive will ensure compliance with the law and success in your efforts.

Please note that state law requires any group or individual that requests 25 or more voter registration applications from ELECT or a local general registrar's office to register and complete training approved by the State Board of Elections (SBE) (see page 3 for more information). Groups that print and distribute their own voter registration applications when conducting drives are also strongly encouraged to complete the training to protect both applicants and the individuals working on the drive.

Voter registration applications can be requested in person at the local general registrar's office or by calling ELECT at 1-800-552-9745. Training classes are offered online, at the local voter registration office or by signing up for an in-person class which are held at ELECT's offices. Please visit ELECT's website (www.elections.virginia.gov) for information on upcoming training sessions.

Please read these instructions carefully as failure to follow the requirements laid out by state law may result in criminal penalties. Do not hesitate to contact the Department of Elections (ELECT) or a local voter registration office if you are uncertain on the laws and proper procedures. ELECT thanks you for your efforts to increase voter registration and participation in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

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Registration and Training Requirements for Drives

- ✓ Virginia law requires training and registration for some individuals and groups conducting voter registration drives. Specifically, groups and individuals that obtain 25 or more voter registration applications from ELECT or a local registrar's office must register with ELECT or in person at the general registrar and take training (Va. Code § 24.2-416.6). Groups printing their own registration applications and engaging in registration drives are also strongly encouraged to register and receive this training.
- ✓ Both the registration process and training can be completed online or inperson at the Department of Elections or a local voter registration office.

At least one agent of the organization seeking to obtain applications must complete the training and certify that that the organization will require training for all persons collecting completed voter registration applications from applicants on behalf of the organization. However, if any other individual requests more than 25 applications (even if they claim to represent a group which has already received the training), the individual is still required to complete the training prior to receiving the requested applications. In sum, each individual or agent requesting applications must receive the training. Other groups and individuals conducting voter registration drives that obtain their registration applications through other means are strongly encouraged, but not required, to receive training prior to conducting a drive.

- ✓ Upon completion of <u>in-person</u> training, the group or individual will receive a certificate stating that they have completed the required training for conducting voter registration drives in the Commonwealth. The certification is valid until June 30^{th} each year upon which time the training must be completed again in order to renew the certification.
 - ✓ For more information on the training requirements please contact your local voter registration office or ELECT at 1-800-552-9745. The registration and training module can be accessed at www.vote.virginia.gov/.

Rules of the Road: Best Practices Overview

- 1. Make sure the organization you represent is (1) registered with the Department of Elections (this can be checked by contacting ELECT at 1-800-552-9745), and (2) has taken state approved training about your legal responsibilities. For training and registration requirements see page 3 and the forms at the end of this document. These requirements apply if an individual or an organization receives 25 or more applications from the Department of Elections or a local voter registration office. Other groups are encouraged to receive training.
- 2. When approaching individuals, introduce yourself and the organization you represent, explain your purpose, the qualifications to vote in Virginia, and whether or not you will deliver the completed application for the applicant. You should inform voters that Virginia now has online voter registration and address update available on the ELECT website to those with a Virginia driver's license or DMV ID card. This information will be helpful to an applicant that wishes to ensure their application is delivered in real time directly to their local voter registration office.
- 3. Target only non-registered individuals who are qualified to vote or registered individuals who have outdated registration information such as those who moved and did not update their registration address.
 - ✓ Don't complete or accept applications for anyone who you know is not eligible to vote, such as a convicted felon whose rights have not been restored or a non-Virginia resident.
 - ✓ Don't attempt to re-register individuals who are registered and have up to date information. Registrants are able to check to their registration information and status online at www.vote.virginia.gov
 - ✓ You should leave the registration application with the individual if he/she is uncertain as to their registration status or his/her qualification to register to vote.

The Oualifications to Vote in Virginia:

- ✓ Citizen of the United States.
- ✓ Resident of Virginia (residency requires both domicile and a place of abode, i.e., an intention to remain indefinitely and a physical place to live.) Voters must provide a <u>current</u> residence address when completing the application. Note: special rules apply to military and overseas voters.
- ✓ Must be at least 18 years old on or before the date of the next general election. 17 year olds may register and vote in special elections and primaries, specifically the presidential primary.
- ✓ Unless rights have been restored, must not have been convicted of a felony nor have been judged by a court to be mentally incapacitated (either in VA or another state). Restoration required as to each disqualifying conviction or adjudication.
- 4. Instruct individual that the application <u>must</u> be completed <u>neatly</u>, <u>accurately</u>, and in its <u>entirety</u>.
 - ✓ Failure to provide the required information, including citizenship status, will result in the rejection of an applicant's registration.

- ✓ Applicants are also required to list their previous registration address to help prevent registration in more than one jurisdiction or duplicate registrations. An applicant who is already registered in Virginia may update his record using an application that is completed with the changed information and signed by the voter. A registrant may also update his or her address online with the online registration portal at the ELECT website if the registrant has a Virginia driver's license or DMV ID card.
- ✓ Intentionally making a materially false statement on the registration application may result in felony prosecution or other penalties.
- 5. Unless specifically directed by the applicant, do not complete the blanks on the registration application.
- 6. Respect the wishes of those who decline to register. It is unlawful to, by use of threats or force, interfere with or attempt to interfere with a person applying or declining to register to vote. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.
- 7. Those registering should be reminded that they are required to provide their identification at the polls. Please encourage individuals to contact their local registration office or visit www.vote.virginia.gov for more information on Virginia's voter identification requirements.
- 8. If you offer to deliver the application, you <u>must</u> complete and provide a receipt to the applicant upon his/her completion of the application. Va. Code § 24.2-418.1.
- 9. You <u>must</u> deliver completed applications to the local voter registration office or to ELECT within 10 days of signature date or by 5:00pm on the day of the next election's registration deadline, whichever date comes first. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01.
- 10. To ensure the timely and accurate processing of registration applications, you should provide the appropriate local voter registration office with an alphabetical list detailing the name on every application delivered.
- 11. **You may be subject to criminal penalties if you fail to give the applicant a receipt to document your timely delivery of completed applications.**

As of July 1, 2013, the Department of Elections provides online voter registration. An individual now has the ability to complete their application directly on ELECT's website (www.vote.virginia.gov). The application can be completed by the individual on a tablet or laptop.

The Do's: Basic Instructions and Guidelines

1. Register with election officials, complete official training, and ensure training of volunteers and staff:

- ✓ Please see Registration and Training Requirements on page 3 and forms at the end of the guidelines.
- ✓ When obtaining 25 or more voter registration applications from ELECT or a local registrar's office, such individuals or groups are required to register with ELECT (this is done by completing the required training either online, in the local voter registration office or in person at ELECT's offices). Groups printing their own registration applications are also strongly encouraged to register and receive this training. Va. Code § 24.2-416.6
- ✓ If you are the organizer, manager, or supervisor of your organization's voter registration drive, ensure that your volunteers and staff are trained on and knowledgeable about these guidelines and Virginia law on voter registration drives.
- ✓ Voter registration drives are serious undertakings and it is imperative you follow the laws and guidelines that are designed to protect both the drive and the registration applicant. It is essential that all participants in your organization's voter registration drive are made aware of the rules, regulations, and guidelines related to voter registration drives as well as the legal consequences for failure to comply with Virginia and federal law.
- ✓ When conducting drives your volunteers and staff should, at a minimum, keep the two page "Best Practices and Overview for Volunteers" document on pages 4 and 5 with them for quick reference.
- ✓ Each section of the registration application asks for information that the applicant must provide in order for the voter registration office to accept the application and register the individual. It is important that you familiarize yourself with the application. Official training materials and these guidelines should answer any questions you may have regarding the registration application; however, if questions remain please contact ELECT or a local voter registration office.

2. You should only seek to register eligible Virginia residents who are not currently registered and those whose registration information is not up to date:

- ✓ Please review the FAQ section below as it relates to qualifications to register to vote in Virginia. Individuals ineligible to vote should not be instructed to complete registration applications.
- ✓ Individuals should complete a new application only to apply to register to vote or notify their local voter registration office of a change to their existing voter registration record such as a change in residence address or name.
- ✓ You should not seek to re-register individuals who are already registered to vote and whose information is current. You should also not offer applications to individuals who indicate they are not residents of Virginia. Please see "The Don'ts" #1 below for additional information.

3. <u>Drives must complete and provide applicants a receipt if offering to deliver a completed application:</u>

- ✓ If you offer to deliver the application, Virginia state law requires that voter registration drives provide the applicants a receipt upon his/her completion of the voter registration application. Va. Code § 24.2-418.1.
- ✓ Attached to the registration application is a receipt that requests and/or displays the following information:
 - The receipt requests the individual to provide the name of the applicant, the name of the group or individual receiving the application, an email address and daytime telephone number of the group or individual delivering the application, and the date the application was completed.
 - The form also provides contact information for ELECT and notes that individuals should contact ELECT if the voter has not been notified of their registration status within 30 days. You may also wish to refer individuals to the contact information for local registration offices located on the back of the registration application instruction form.
- ✓ Your group may also prepare receipts that request and include the same information on the receipt on the registration application listed above.
- ✓ The receipt shall be completed by the person or group receiving the completed form from the applicant.
- ✓ You may be subject to criminal penalties if you fail to give the applicant a receipt to document your timely delivery of completed applications. Va. Code §§ 24.2-418.1, 24.2-1002.01, 24.2-1017 and 24.2-1018.

4. Completed applications must be delivered to the appropriate local voter registration office or to ELECT within 10 days of the signature date or by 5:00pm the day of the next election's registration deadline, whichever is sooner:

- ✓ Please note: It is more important that the applications be delivered *even if they are late*. Discarding voter registration applications is punishable as a misdemeanor under § 24.2-1002.01.
- ✓ Best practices dictate delivery of the completed applications to the appropriate local voter registration office. Virginia state law requires that individuals receiving completed applications timely deliver the application to the local voter registration office, ELECT, or designated voter registration agency. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01.
- ✓ The mailing or delivery of an application is timely if it is mailed or delivered within 10 days of the applicant's signature on the application <u>or</u> by 5:00pm on the voter registration deadline for the next election, <u>whichever comes first</u>.
- ✓ Please be mindful of upcoming voter registration deadlines when circulating applications.

***Failure to deliver completed applications is punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor and can result in the failure of individuals to be timely registered and, consequently, disenfranchised. ***

- ✓ To the extent possible, please sort and deliver the registration applications to the voter registration office of the locality designated on the registration application. Code does not require you to deliver applications to the general registrar of the applicant's locality; however, sorting applications will alleviate delays in processing of the voter registration application and mailing costs of the registrar. If your drive is engaged in delivering voluminous numbers of registration applications on behalf of individuals residing in multiple localities, please contact ELECT to discuss the possible delivery of applications directly to ELECT.
- ✓ Please also be considerate of not "dumping" voluminous numbers of voter registration applications on the registrar offices immediately prior to the registration deadline. Dumping a number of applications on a general registrar makes it very difficult for the registrars to timely process the applications prior to the election. Instead, you should submit applications to a general registrar as you receive them because waiting until the deadline risks delaying the processing of applications and may result in there not being enough time for applicants to resolve any problems with their registration.

5. <u>Drives Should Provide Alphabetical Listing of Applications with Registrar:</u>

✓ ELECT requests that voter registration drives provide the appropriate local voter registration office with an alphabetical list detailing the name on every application delivered to the registrar. An alphabetical list protects you and your applicants from any processing issues that may arise. If you are delivering applications for multiple localities, please provide a separate list for each locality

6. Be Aware of and Communicate "New" Voter Identification Requirements to Applicants:

- ✓ Virginia law requires all voters to provide photo identification when voting in person.
- ✓ There are several forms of ID that are permitted and they include:
 - a valid Virginia driver's license;
 - a valid DMV issued Identification card;\
 - an ELECT issued Photo Identification card (for voting purposes only);
 - a valid college or university student photo identification card (college or institution must be located in Virginia);
 - any valid Federal, Virginia state or local government-issued ID; and
 - a valid employer issued photo ID card.
- ✓ Department of Elections will provide a photo ID card free of charge if a n applicant/voter does not possess a satisfactory photo identification. Please have applicants contact their local voter registration office should they need a photo ID, or if they have questions on identification requirements to vote in Virginia.

7. <u>Instruct volunteers that all voter registration applications must be completed neatly, accurately, and in their entirety:</u>

- ✓ Registration applications must be completed in their **entirety**. Incomplete applications may be rejected by the local voter registration office. It is important that applicants closely follow the instructions on the application to ensure all required fields are completed.
- ✓ Please instruct applicants to print as <u>neatly</u> as possible. Illegible handwriting on applications is a common reason for rejection of applications and keying errors when inputting the individual's data into the statewide registration database.
- ✓ The information provided must be <u>accurate</u>. There are criminal penalties for intentionally making a materially false statement on the application. Examples of materially false statements include falsely affirming United States citizenship, legal age, or not disclosing a prior felony conviction, residence address.
- ✓ It is extremely important that volunteers and registration drive participants understand the legal qualifications to vote in the Commonwealth and that they convey that information to applicants when completing the voter registration application. Please see the FAQ below addressing qualifications to register to vote in Virginia.

The Don'ts: Prohibitions and Penalties

1. <u>Drives must not intentionally solicit multiple applications from any one person or seek to re-register a voter whose registration information is current:</u>

- ✓ Virginia law explicitly prohibits an individual from soliciting multiple registrations from any one person or intentionally falsifying a registration application. Violations are punishable as a Class 5 felony. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01.
- ✓ You should also make every effort to avoid handing in duplicate registrations or reregistering individuals whose registration information is current. Some practical solutions to avoid re-registering current voters include:
 - If a voter believes that he/she may already be registered to vote and that his/her information may be current, you should leave the registration application with the voter for the individual to mail in or inform the voter about the new online voter registration option after the individual has confirmed his/her status. Be sure to remind the applicant of upcoming registration deadlines.
 - Encourage the <u>individual</u> to verify his/her voter registration information online at http://www.vote.virginia.gov/register.
 - Contact ELECT during normal business hours at 1-800-552-9745 or their local voter registration office. Staff can immediately confirm the voter's registration information.
 - Obtain lists of registered voters from ELECT to cross-check potential registrants. Please see FAQ below.
- ✓ A registration application can be used to notify a local voter registration office of a change to the voter's record, including a change of address or a change of name.
- ✓ It is a Class 1 misdemeanor to intentionally communicate false information to a registered voter with the intention to impede the voter in the exercise of their right to vote, including false information regarding the voter's registration status. Va. Code § 24.2-1005.1. Please review the registration laws and requirements and do not convey false information to voters. Please refer potential registrants to ELECT or any local general registrar for information regarding registration status.

2. Do not complete or accept applications from anyone that you know is not eligible to vote:

- ✓ Please read the FAQ section to become familiarized with the qualifications to vote in Virginia.
- ✓ Do not offer applications to felons whose rights have not been restored, non-residents of Virginia, and others you know are ineligible to vote. Similarly, do not provide advice that an individual may legally be registered to vote in multiple states. Under no circumstances should you knowingly accept an application from someone using a fictitious name or alias.
- ✓ Any willfully false material statement or entry made by any person on a voter registration application constitutes election fraud and is punishable as a Class 5 felony. Va. Code § 24.2-1016.
- ✓ Persuading a voter to provide false information on his/her voter registration application may also constitute the felony crime of solicitation. Va. Code §§ 18.2-29 and 24.2-1016.

3. <u>Do not destroy, make changes to, or alter in any way a completed voter registration application:</u>

- ✓ Virginia state law expressly prohibits an individual from intentionally destroying a completed registration application. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01 (Class 1 misdemeanor).
- ✓ Virginia also expressly prohibits an individual from intentionally falsifying a registration application. Va. Code § 24.2-1016 (Class 5 felony).
- ✓ **Altering an application fraudulently is a Class 5 felony.** Va. Code § 24.2-1009.

4. <u>Do not pre-populate the registration blanks with information and unless the individual is physically disabled you must not sign the application:</u>

- ✓ Virginia law expressly prohibits voter registration applications from being prepopulated with information the applicant is required to provide, unless directed by the applicant. Va. Code § 24.2-418.
- ✓ It is important to print neatly and legibly if you do offer assistance.

5. You cannot discriminate when conducting a voter registration drive:

- ✓ You cannot refuse to provide a registration application to an individual because of his/her race, religion, or other classification.
- ✓ Conducting a partisan registration drive that discriminates based on political party affiliation could endanger your organization's tax-exempt status. Please review the applicable Internal Revenue Service (IRS) guidelines and/or consult with legal counsel regarding registration drives and tax-exempt status.
- ✓ Once you accept a completed registration application, you <u>must</u> deliver that application in a timely manner to the appropriate voter registration office.

6. Must not misuse personal information contained on the registration application:

- ✓ <u>Warning</u>: Unauthorized disclosure of all or part of an applicant's social security number is a felony. Unauthorized use of any personal information to defraud is a crime. Va. Code §§ 18.2-186.3, 24.2-1002.1.
- ✓ Virginia law contains specific prohibitions regarding the use of personal information without permission of the person who is the subject of the identifying information. Please review Va. Code § 18.2-186.3 to ensure that any proposed retention of registration information is in compliance with Virginia law.
- ✓ State law permits the release of lists of registered voters to certain organizations for political purposes and/or to promote voter registration. We encourage you to contact the Department of Elections if you or your organization would like to purchase a list of registered voters. Please see FAQ section below for more information.

7. Must not bribe, threaten, coerce, intimidate, etc. voters into registering to vote:

- ✓ State law expressly prohibits the use of threats or force to interfere with or attempt to interfere with any person applying for or declining to register to vote. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.
- ✓ Federal law prohibits an individual from using intimidation, threats, or coercion in urging or aiding a person in registering to vote. 52 USC § 20511.
- ✓ Conspiracies to interfere with free exercise of voting rights are subject to felony prosecution under state law. Va. Code § 24.2-1015.
- 8. <u>Do not write or attach anything to the voter registration application related to candidates or ballot measures.</u>

Frequently Asked Questions

Voter Registration Questions:

Q. Where do I obtain voter registration applications for my drive?

- ✓ The Department of Elections will make available to any individual or group a reasonable number of voter registration application forms. Va. Code § 24.2-416.3. Any group or individual seeking 25 or more registration applications from the Department of Elections is required to register with the Department of Elections and take online or in-person training on the best practices and legal requirements for conducting registration drives. Please see page 3 above.
- ✓ <u>Blank</u> applications may be photocopied. However, an original signature is required on completed applications. The original signature may be applied electronically.
- ✓ A PDF of the voter registration application can be downloaded at www.vote.virginia.gov.
- ✓ Please complete the Sworn Affidavit Form below to request registration applications for your drive.
- ✓ Online: ELECT now offers the ability for individuals to complete and submit their voter registration application on-line.
 - O To qualify for on-line submission of the application, the individual must either already be registered (updating their registration) or have a DMV issued identification.
 - For unregistered individuals who do not have a DMV ID, the opportunity to complete the application is still available on-line, but the applicant will be required to print, sign and mail the application to the appropriate local voter registration office or to ELECT.

Q. Who May Register to Vote in Virginia?

Below, please find the qualifications to register to vote in Virginia:

- ✓ Citizen of U.S.: Must be a citizen of the United States.
- ✓ Resident of Virginia: Must be a resident of Virginia. A person who has come to Virginia temporarily and intends to return to his/her state of residence is **not** considered a Virginia resident for voting purposes. Persons who legally reside in another state (for example, students who intend to return to their home state upon graduation) should register in their home state using the voter registration application for their home state, or the national application, not the Virginia application. Active duty uniformed services personnel and overseas citizens may retain Virginia residency under specific federal and state laws.

***Residency in Virginia is a prerequisite to be eligible to register to vote.

Residency requires both domicile and a place of abode. To establish domicile, a person must live in a particular locality with the intention to remain indefinitely. A place of abode is the physical place where a person dwells. ***

- ✓ 18 Years of Age by Next General Election: Must be at least 18 years old on or before the date of the next general election. (Seventeen- year olds who will be 18 by the next general election may register in advance and vote in any primary or special election in the intervening period prior to the general election. Seventeen year olds who will be 18 by the next presidential election may register in advance and vote in any presidential primary or other primary held on the same day as the presidential primary.)
- ✓ **No Felony Conviction or Mental Incapacity Adjudication**: Unless voting rights have been restored, the applicant must have no felony conviction, nor have been judged by a court to be mentally incapacitated. (Please see FAQ below on felons.)
 - o For felonies, the Governor or the convicting jurisdiction can restore voting rights.
 - For adjudications of incapacity, a court order is required to restore voting rights.
 Rarely, an adjudication order may specifically provide voting rights. See Va.
 Code § 64.2-2000 for definition of "incapacitated person."
- ✓ Virginia law makes special provisions for some military and overseas voters. Please have individuals with questions contact the Department of Elections or their local registration office should they have questions regarding their registration eligibility.
- ✓ For more information please review Va. Constitution Article II, §§ 1-2; Va. Code §§ 24.2-101, 24.2-400, 24.2-417 and 24.2-418; and 1 VAC 20-40-10 through 20-40-60.

Q. How does a felon know if his/her rights have been restored?

✓ Those convicted of a felony in Virginia must apply to the Governor or other appropriate authority to have their rights restored. Some states automatically restore voting rights to felons. Individuals convicted of a felony in a state other than Virginia should contact the appropriate authorities in that state to determine whether or not their rights have been restored. If a person has been convicted of a felony and would like to know eligibility requirements for restoration of civil rights, he/she should contact:

✓ Do not attempt to register felons whose voting rights have not been restored—you and the applicants could be prosecuted for felony voter fraud. Va. Code § 24.2-1004(B).

Completing a Voter Registration Application:

Q. What information is required to be completed on the application?

✓ **All** required information asked for on the application **must** be provided if the applicant is not currently registered. The phone number and email address are not required. However, please let the voter know that failure to include that information may result in the inability of election staff to contact the applicant should the staff member need to verify unreadable handwriting and may result in denial if they are otherwise unable to reach the voter where there is a lack of clarity. If any information requested on the application does not apply to the voter, he/she should write "none" or place a dash in the appropriate space. Va. Code § 24.2-418.

It is required and important for an applicant to closely read and complete the section on the registration application that asks if the applicant is currently registered to vote in Virginia or another state. Completing this information allows the registrar to communicate with election officials in another state that the voter has registered in Virginia and that their registration should be cancelled.

- ✓ The registrant must sign and date the application. (if physically able)
- ✓ Failure to complete the form properly may result in a denial of the application.
- ✓ It is important that the applicant and/or individual providing assistance print neatly and legibly when completing the voter registration application.

Q. Are applicants permitted to include a <u>future</u> address as their mailing or residence address?

✓ A voter must provide his/her **current** residence address and mailing address when registering to vote. § 24.2-418.

Q. Are applicants permitted to list a P.O. Box for their mailing address? If so, are they still required to list their street address?

- ✓ Some individuals may be qualified to include a P.O. Box in addition to their residence address on the registration application. These individuals must still provide his or her residence address. Individuals qualified to include a P.O. Box mailing address either (1) have a residence address that is not deliverable by the USPS; OR (2) meet the legal definition of "protected voter" in the Code of Virginia who may not publish their residence address in voter lists. The list of protected voters set out in Va. Code § 24.2-418 is as follows:
 - Active or retired law enforcement officers.
 - Persons under protective order.
 - Persons who are threatened or stalked (must have complaint to law enforcement).
 - Participants registered with the Attorney General's Address Confidentiality Program.
 - Judges and attorneys employed by the U.S. or Virginia Attorney General (active or retired).
- ✓ Protected voters claiming eligibility to not publish their residence address must provide the appropriate three digit code on the registration application to certify they are legally eligible.
- ✓ These eligible voters <u>must</u> provide a complete residence address. This is necessary to determine their ballot choices and the location of their polling place. Va. Code § 24.2-418.

✓ If the registrant has any questions about mailing addresses or address protection, they should contact their local voter registration office or the Department of Elections.

Q. What about homeless applicants? How do they complete the registration application?

- ✓ A homeless applicant can register to vote if he/she intends to remain in a locality indefinitely and provides some residence address indicating the primary place where he/she stays at night. This is necessary to determine for whom a person can vote and the location of the applicant's polling place.
- ✓ A mailing address is required to ensure that the voter will receive his/her registration card and to avoid cancellation of voting eligibility due to returned mail. Some homeless shelters allow people to have their voter registration cards mailed to the shelter address. By providing this service, the homeless applicant is able to pick up his/her card from the shelter address. Call the local voter registration office if you have questions about registering homeless applicants.

Q. Am I permitted to assist a voter in completing his/her application?

- ✓ Recent changes to the law explicitly prohibit individuals from pre-populating the registration application for the individual unless directed by the voter. This does not prohibit you from assisting an individual with completing the application. All applications must be signed, by the applicant or check the box below the signature line indicating the person is unable to sign due to physical disability.
 - Signing the form under felony penalty makes the person signing legally responsible for the truth of all statements on the form.
- ✓ A signature under a power-of-attorney is not permitted. Va. Code § 24.2-123.

Responsibility for Delivering and Timeliness of Delivery:

Q. Who is responsible for delivering the completed voter registration applications and where should they be delivered?

- ✓ If you offer to deliver or mail the completed registration applications to the local voter registration office or ELECT, then you must follow through or risk criminal penalties. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01. Please see applicable deadlines below.
- ✓ Voter registration applications can be turned in to any local voter registration office or to the Department of Elections, 1100 Bank St, 1st Floor, Richmond, VA 23219.
- ✓ For timely processing of registration applications, ELECT encourages you to sort and deliver the completed applications to the voter registration office of the locality indicated on the registration application. Applications are considered "on time" once they arrive at ELECT or at any Virginia registrar's office, or if they are mailed with a postmark on or before the final day of registration.
- ✓ Contact information for all voter registration offices can be found at the following website: https://vote.elections.virginia.gov/VoterInformation/PublicContactLookup

Q. Is there a deadline for delivering completed voter registration applications?

✓ Yes. The coordinator of the voter registration drive has the responsibility for making sure all

completed applications are mailed or delivered to ANY local voter registration office or the Department of Elections within 10 days of signature date or not later than 5:00 pm on the last day to register for an upcoming election, whichever is earlier. The failure to timely deliver completed applications constitutes a Class 1 misdemeanor and can result in the failure of individuals to be timely registered and, consequently, disenfranchised. ELECT and local voter registration office will refer these violations to the appropriate Commonwealth's Attorney and/or Office of the Attorney General for investigation and prosecution. Va. Code § 24.2-1002.01

- ✓ If mailed, registration applications must be postmarked no later than the voter registration deadline.
- ✓ If delivered in person, either by the applicant or a third party, the application must be received by 5:00 pm on the deadline.
- ✓ Applications postmarked or received after the deadline will be held and processed after the election; these applications will be effective for the next election if the applicant is otherwise qualified.
- ✓ It is important to realize that failure to deliver applications even after the deadline for submission will result in disenfranchisement and potentially more serious consequences to the individual responsible for non-delivery.

Q. When is the voter registration deadline?

- ✓ For a general or primary election, the deadline is the close of business 22 days before the election. Va. Code § 24.2-416.
- ✓ Limited exceptions may apply for certain military and returning overseas voters. Va. Code §§ 24.2-419 and 24.2-420.1.
- ✓ For a special election held at a time other than a general election, deadlines are shorter. Va. Code § 24.2-416.
- ✓ ELECT encourages you to contact the agency or a local voter registration office if you have any questions or uncertainty regarding your obligations to return completed voter registration applications by the registration deadline for a particular election.

Q. What if applicants wish to keep their voter registration applications and turn it them themselves?

- ✓ If the applicant requests, you must allow him/her to take the voter registration application and return it him/herself.
- ✓ ELECT encourages applicant's to submit their application him/herself because it relieves the registration drives of the responsibility to timely deliver applications and provide a receipt, allows individuals to verify their registration status before submitting another application, and ensures that local voter registration offices are not inundated with large numbers of registration applications immediately prior to the registration deadline.
- ✓ The applicant can deliver the voter registration application through the postal system or in person to any voter registration office.
- ✓ It would be helpful for you to provide envelopes with postage stamps to individuals who wish to mail in their registration application.
- ✓ Allowing an individual to submit his/her own registration applications is particularly appropriate when the voter suspects that he/she is already registered and/or the registration information is up to date.

Training:

Q. Is training available for my registration drive workers?

- ✓ Yes. State approved training is required for individuals or organizations that obtain 25 or more voter registration applications from state or local elections officials. Training is available in several formats:
 - Online training is available and easily accessible at the ELECT website (www.vote.virginia.gov).
 - ELECT does provide in-person training to groups and organization. To schedule a training contact Garry E. Ellis by email at garry.ellis@elections.virginia.gov.
 - Each local voter registration office will offer in-person training. Written training materials will be available. Please contact your local voter registration office for more information.
 - Please see page 3 above for additional information.

Other Questions:

Q. How will individuals know if their registration was accepted?

- ✓ The local voter registration office will determine registration eligibility. A voter registration notification will be mailed to eligible registrants.
- ✓ A denial letter will be mailed to any applicant determined not to be eligible. Va. Code § 24.2-422.
- ✓ Any applicant who does not receive either confirmation of voter registration or a denial notice within 30 days should contact their local registration office.
- ✓ Any application received after the registration deadline will not be processed until after the election which follows the registration deadline. No voter registration confirmation or

denial letters will be issued during this period. Va. Code § 24.2-416.

Q. What about the national voter registration application?

- ✓ The national application is available at https://www.eac.gov/voters/national-mail-voter-registration-form/_and should be used for persons with legal residence outside of Virginia.
- ✓ ELECT and the local voter registration offices strongly urge your registration drive to use the Virginia Voter Registration Application as it requests all information required to register to vote in Virginia.
- ✓ Active-duty military personnel should be encouraged to use the Federal Post Card Application, available at: www.FVAP.gov.

Q. May I obtain a list of Virginia registered voters?

- ✓ The Code of Virginia permits ELECT to furnish, at a reasonable price, lists of registered voters to certain groups and individuals, including non-profit organizations that promote voter participation and registration.
- ✓ Please review Va. Code § 24.2-405 and contact ELECT staff if you would like to request a list of registered voters.

Q. What if I have a question not addressed by these guidelines?

✓ For questions concerning deadlines, completion of the application and voting on Election Day, call your local voter registration office or the Department of Elections at (804) 864-8901, (800)-552-9745 or 1-800-260-3466 (TTY).

Criminal Penalty for Non-delivery or Late Application

§ 24.2-1002.01. Destruction of, or failure to mail or deliver, voter registration application; penalty.

If any person (i) agrees to mail or deliver a signed voter registration application to the voter registrar or other appropriate person authorized to receive the application and (ii) intentionally interferes with the applicant's effort to register either by destroying the application or by failing to mail or deliver the application in a timely manner, he shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. The mailing or delivery of an application shall be deemed timely for the purposes of this section if it is mailed or delivered within 10 days of the applicant's signature or in accordance with the provisions of § 24.2-416.4 for processing before the closing of the registration records for the pending election whichever comes first. This section shall not apply to any state or local government employee acting in his official capacity. If any person intentionally solicits multiple registrations from any one person or intentionally falsifies a registration application, he shall be guilty of a Class 5 felony.

Move that the Board approve the proposed revisions to the Virginia Absentee Ballot Application for use beginning July 1, 2018.

Background:

HB397, signed by Governor Northam during the 2018 legislative session, amends Va. Code § 24.2-701 to make the social security number optional for voters who complete an absentee ballot application in the general registrar's office. This amendment will become effective July 1, 2018.

The proposed revision to the Virginia Absentee Ballot Application brings this form into legal compliance.

ELECT staff recommendation:

ELECT staff recommends the Board adopt the proposed revisions to the Virginia Absentee Ballot Application for use beginning July 1, 2018.

Background:

In the Spring of 2017, the Department of Elections, with the assistance of the Center for Civic Design (CCD), set out to develop a more simplified but functional absentee application for voters who apply and wish to vote absentee in person. A new form was developed by gathering research from interviews with general registrars and using input from the Usability Workgroup. The form went through multiple rounds of review and feedback with the AB Workgroup and Usability Workgroup.

In order to vote absentee, voters must fill out an application. The In-Person Absentee Ballot Application will completed by a voter who wishes to vote absentee in the general registrar's office after submitting the application. With the adoption of this application, the Department will provide clear instructions to the general registrars regarding the use of this application.





Dear Mr. Ables:

This letter is to inform you of my decision to withdraw as a candidate for the Warrenton Town Council at-large race effective today. After careful review of the race dynamics I feel that it would best serve the community's interests to urge every one of my supporters to vote for Sean Polster and Renard Carlos, to elect honest, earnest, young candidates eager to serve the community, and not themselves or cronies.

My motivation for entering the race was to save the community from the years of influence peddling and preferential treatment handed out to a small group of lawyers and insiders befriended by Sunny Reynolds. 

Must identify the person or political committee before each telephone call concludes. Unlawful to make campaign telephone calls without disclosing, before the conclusion of each telephone call, information to identify the person or political committee who has authorized and is paying for the calls.

Caller identification, if available, must state the sponsoring committee or the vendor conducting the calls. If the call is made from an automatic dialing-announcing device and caller identification information includes a name associated with the telephone number, then the caller identification shall include either the name of the committee that authorized and is paying for the calls OR the vendor conducting the calls on behalf of the committee.

"Automatic dialing-announcing device" means a device that (i) selects and dials telephone numbers and (ii) working alone or in conjunction with other equipment, disseminates a prerecorded or synthesized voice message to the telephone number called.
