ESTABLISHMENT OF A QUORUM

With ten (10) members of the Board present, a quorum was established.

CALL TO ORDER AND INTRODUCTIONS

Chairman Wingo called the meeting to order at 10:12 a.m. and asked for a calling of the role.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM OCTOBER 7, 2019

Ms. Hull Davidson moved for the approval of the minutes from the October 7, 2019 meeting of the Board of Conservation and Recreation. Ms. Nizer seconded and the minutes were approved as submitted.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT – Clyde E. Cristman, DCR Director

Director Cristman noted the following:

- The first of the Virginia State Parks license plates have been issued. A pre-order of 450 was required. DCR was able to submit orders for 550. After 1,000 plates have been issued, DCR will receive \$10 per plate.
- Melissa Baker has been named the new director of Virginia State Parks and will assume that role in late January. Ms. Baker is the former Director of North Dakota State Parks.
- Thank you to Dave Collett for serving as Acting State Parks Director.
- Deputy Director Isaac Sarver left the agency to work for Senator Mark Warner.

LEGISLATIVE AND BUDGET UPDATE – Clyde E. Cristman

Director Cristman advised that the General Assembly would convene on Wednesday, January 8. He noted that there was not a lot of information to report at this point. Committee assignments were not yet known. Some anticipated legislation includes:

- Designations for up to seven scenic rivers. Bills for the Clinch and Maury Rivers have been introduced.
- There is no current legislation specific to state parks. The Valors bill regarding law enforcement did not move forward. It is anticipated that the Virginia Association of Parks will continue to advocate for this.

Director Cristman reminded Board members that, as appointees of the Governor they could advocate for positions outlined in the Governor's budget. He also noted that they were free to advocate for other legislation as private citizens, but not in their capacity as a Board member.

DCR items in the Governor's proposed budget include:

- \$150,000 or State Park highway signs, an increase from \$70,000.
- Funding for Dam Safety and Floodplain management to include a new lead engineer, two positions for floodplain management.
- Two additional positions in the Soil and Water Conservation Division will be supported by federal funds.
- The proposal includes \$47 million the first year, and \$41 million the second for best management practices to keep pollution out of state waters.
- Legislation is in place to reopen Green Pastures Recreation Area to be managed as part of Douthat State Park. From 1940-1964 this was one of the only outdoor recreation areas for people of color. When parks were integrated in 1964, this area was operated as Longdale Recreation Area until it closed last year due to lack of funding.
- The Governor has proposed \$20 million each year for funding the Virginia Land Conservation Foundation.
- Proposed State Parks funding includes \$500K each year for preventive maintenance, and \$556 each year to support operations to include maintenance and wage staff.

• The Governor has proposed a \$144 million bond package for state parks. This would be used for taking care of established properties and developing additional revenue producing facilities.

Director Cristman advised that this was all subject to change once the General Assembly convened.

Mr. Bulluck offered to send information regarding the Natural Heritage request that did not move forward.

Director Cristman noted that staff was working with the Governor's office to schedule the official opening of Seven Bends State Park in Shenandoah County in the spring.

<u>DIVISION OF NATURAL HERITAGE</u> – Jason Bulluck, Director, Division of Natural Heritage

Mr. Bulluck gave the report for the Division of Natural Heritage covering the 2019 highlights for the division.

- Many jobs are based around information, developing it, sharing it and putting it to use so that
 the best decisions are made. The backbone of the work done by Natural Heritage is data and
 information.
- 2019 Rare Bumble Bee Surveys conducted by Natural Heritage found:
 - o 3 new locations for Rusty-patched Bumble Bee (Rockingham (2) and Augusta)
 - Now extant in Augusta, Bath, Fauquier, Highland, Rockingham counties
 - Additional locations found in VA/WV by others
 - o 1 new location for Yellow-banded Bumble Bee (Rockingham)
 - The studies were funded by federal dollars, but much of the fieldwork, allowing a broader focus on rare bees, was made possible by a GoFundMe campaign set up by Board Member Vivek Patil.
- Natural Heritage conducted the third year of work with middle school students at Breaks Interstate State Park to conduct field ID, data collection, processing insect collectors, bat banding, and lab techniques.
- With funding from the Division of State Parks, inventories were conducted at High Bridge and James River State Parks.
- Funding from the General Assembly allowed for an assessment of mountain biking trails at First Landing State Park.
- Staff continues to work with ConserveVirginia, the Governor's land conservation initiative. Version 3 will include a water quality component.
- DCR continues to review solar projects. Solar is rapidly expanding across the Virginia landscape.
- The Virginia Pollinator Smart Webpage can be accessed at www.pollinatorsmartva.org and is a source of pollinator information services for solar developers.
- DCR Natural Heritage Stewardship Staff completed 78 critical natural area resource enhancement projects during Fiscal Year 2018. This number included 9 prescribed fire management projects, 21 outreach and education projects, 15 public access improvement projects, 9 habitat restoration projects, 9 rare species monitoring projects, 8 invasive species projects, 3 wildlife management projects, and 4 volunteer workdays.

Mr. Bulluck requested that the Board consider the naming the 65th Natural Area Preserve for property purchased with the funds from the DuPoint South River Settlement. The property is located along the South River in Augusta County. The staff recommended name was Cave Hill Natural Area Preserve.

BOARD ACTION

Ms. Jackson moved that the Board of Conservation and Recreation approve the naming of the 65th Natural Area Preserve as Cave Hill Natura Area Preserve as recommended by DCR staff. Mr. Patil seconded and the motion carried.

GREETINGS FROM SECRETARY OF NATURAL RESOURCES, MATTHEW STRICKLER

Director Cristman welcomed Secretary Strickler to the meeting.

Secretary Strickler expressed his appreciation to the Board as well as that of the Governor. He thanks the Board for their guidance with regard to state parks and natural areas.

State Park Master Plans – Bill Conkle, Park Planner

Smith Mountain Lake State Park

Mr. Conkle presented the recommended update to the Master Plan for Smith Mountain Lake State Park.

The Smith Mountain Lake State Park Master Plan Executive Summary is an update to the official unabridged master plan document adopted in 2003 by the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) Board. This 2019 executive summary represents the most recent ten year review mandated in §10.1-200.1 of the *Code of Virginia*

Smith Mountain Lake State Park is on the 20,600-acre Smith Mountain Lake that was created in 1960 when Appalachian Power Company (now American Electric Power) built a dam on the Roanoke River in Smith Mountain Gap. The park, which includes 16 miles of lakefront, opened to the public in 1983.

Mr. Conkle reviewed the phased development plan to be developed over a 30-year timeframe.

BOARD ACTION

Ms. Jackson moved that the Board of Conservation and Recreation recommend approval of the updated Master Plan for Smith Mountain Lake State Park as presented by staff. Mr. Morgan seconded and the motion carried.

False Cape State Park

Mr. Conkle presented the updated Master Plan for False Cape State Park.

False Cape State Park consists of some 4,321 acres of maritime forests, dunes, marshes, shrub areas, and several islands. It is located in the southeast corner of Virginia, within the jurisdiction of the City of Virginia Beach. The park site is bordered by the state of North Caroline to the south, the Atlantic Ocean to the west, Back Bay to the west, and Back Bay National Wildlife Refuge to the north. The park opened in 1980 with trails, boat docks, and primitive camping.

The 2019 master plan update describes both proposed facilities and improvements to existing facilities. New facilities are sited to minimize impact to the park. DCR must keep a close watch on changing projections for both sea level rise and storm surge impacts on False Cape State Park. This will require management actions to protect the resources and the quality of the park experience.

Mr. Conkle reviewed the phased development plan to be developed over a 30-year timeframe.

BOARD ACTION

Mr. Patil moved that the Board of Conservation and Recreation recommend approval of the updated Master Plan for False Cape State Park as presented by staff. Ms. Maybury seconded and the motion carried.

Review of General Assembly comments regarding Leesylvania State Park

Director Cristman advised that comments had been received from legislators regarding Leesylvania State Park. Concerns were expressed with regard to boat landings and associated parking. He reported that DCR continues to review the site to address the concerns. When those concerns are addressed, the master plan will likely be amended.

Virginia Scenic Rivers – Lynn Crump, Scenic Resources Coordinator

Ms. Crump gave the update regarding the Virginia Scenic Rivers Program.

The following rivers qualified for designation in 2019:

- Pound
- Clinch

- Maury
- Roanoke
- Portions of the Upper James
- Staunton
- Grays Creek

Legislation has been introduced for the Clinch and Maury Rivers. Others are expected.

The 50th Anniversary Celebration plans are underway.

- Steering Committee, 6 meetings since 2018
- Marketing plan implementation
- Accomplishments.
- The kick-off event is scheduled for April 22 in the Richmond Area.

The River Management Society conference will be held in Richmond on May 12-15, 2020.

STATE PARKS UPDATE - Dave Collett, Acting Director, Virginia State Parks

Mr. Collett noted the following from Virginia State Parks.

First Day Hikes on January 1

- Almost 4,000 people participated in the annual First Day Hikes.
- There were 73 ranger led hikes.

Youth Conservation Corps

- Applications are being accepted through March 5.
- The sessions begin on June 21 and July 19 and run for three weeks.
- The program is designed for youth ages 14-17 to give them a three-week intensive indoctrination into natural resources.

Chairman Wingo appointed Ms. Hull Davidson, Ms. Maybury, and Mr. Hurt to serve on the nominating committee. He requested that they return to the April meeting with a recommended slate of officers.

Mr. Smith noted that by the next meeting the new Virginia State Parks Director and the new Director of Planning and Recreation Resources will be on Board. He expressed appreciation to Mr. Collett for serving as Acting State Parks Director and to Ms. McClary for serving as Acting Director of Planning and Recreation Resources.
