This rulemaking is proposed in order to amend and reissue the existing general permit which expires on February 8, 2011. The general permit will establish limitations and monitoring requirements for point source discharge of treated wastewaters from coin operated laundries to surface waters. Coin operated laundry means any self service facility where the washing of clothes is conducted as designated by Standard Industrial Classification Code 7215. It does not mean facilities that engage in dry-cleaning. The general permit is being reissued in order to continue making it available for coin operated laundries after that February 8, 2011. This is a reissuance of an existing regulation, and there are changes to the regulation.
