The Board for Barbers and Cosmetology ("the Board") is amending its regulations to adjust license application, renewal, reinstatement, and other miscellaneous fees for the Board's licenses and certifications.

The Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation ("DPOR") is funded almost entirely from revenue collected for fees associated with applications for license, renewal, examination, and other miscellaneous fees. DPOR does not receive general fund money. The Board must establish fees

adequate to support the costs of the Board’s operations as well as a proportionate share of DPOR’s operations..

DPOR is self-supporting and must collect adequate revenue to support its mandated and approved activities and operations. Fees must be established at amounts that will provide that revenue. A portion of fee revenue collected on behalf of the various boards is used to fund DPOR’s authorized special revenue appropriation. The Board has no other source of revenue from which to fund its operations.

On May 12, 2025, the Board adopted final amendments to the (i) Barbering and Cosmetology Regulations, (ii) Tattooing Regulations, (iii) Body-Piercing Regulations, and (iv) Esthetics Regulations.

Mandate and Impetus

This proposed regulatory action is mandated by the following sections of the Code of Virginia. To comply with these statutes, the Board evaluates its current and projected financial position, and determines the type of fees and amounts to be established for each fee that will provide revenue sufficient to cover its expenses.

Section 54.1-201 of the Code of Virginia states in part:

- A. The powers and duties of regulatory boards shall be as follows:
 - 4. To levy and collect fees for certification or licensure and renewal that are sufficient to cover all expenses for the administration and operation of the regulatory board and a proportionate share of the expenses of the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation and the Board for Professional and Occupational Regulation.

Section 54.1-304 of the Code of Virginia states in part:

In the performance and discharge of his duties with respect to the regulatory boards, the Director shall:

3. Collect and account for all fees prescribed to be paid into each board and account for and deposit the moneys so collected into a special fund from which the expenses of the Board, regulatory boards, and the Department shall be paid.

Section 54.1-308 of the Code of Virginia states, "The compensation of the Director and the employees within the Department, including the compensation of the members of each board, shall be paid out of the total funds collected and charged to the accounts of the respective boards. The Director shall maintain a separate account for each board showing the moneys collected on its behalf and the expenses allocated to each board."

Section 54.1-113 of the Code of Virginia ("the Callahan Act") provides the authority for regulatory boards to adjust fees and states in part:

- A. Following the close of any biennium, when the account for any regulatory board within the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation maintained under § 54.1-308 shows that unspent and unencumbered revenue exceeds \$100,000 or 20 percent of the total expenses allocated to the regulatory board for the past biennium, whichever is greater, the regulatory board shall (i) distribute all such excess revenue to current regulants and (ii) reduce the fees levied by it for certification, licensure, registration, or permit and renewal thereof so that the fees are sufficient but not excessive to cover expenses.

These code sections require the Department to:

- pay expenses of each board and the Department from revenues collected;
- establish fees adequate to provide sufficient revenue to pay expenses;
- account for the revenues collected and expenses charges to each board; and
- revise fees as necessary to ensure that revenue is sufficient but not excessive to cover all expenses.

To comply with these requirements, the Department:

- accounts for the revenue collected for each board distinctly;
- accounts for direct board expenses for each board, and allocates a proportionate share of agency operating expenses to each board;
- reviews the actual and projected financial position of each board biennially to determine whether revenues are adequate, but not excessive, to cover reasonable and authorized expenses for upcoming operating cycles; and
- recommends adjustments to fees to respond to changes and projections in revenue trends and operating expenses.

Fee adjustments are mandatory in accordance with these code sections. The Board exercises discretion on how the fees are adjusted by determining the amount of adjustment for each fee type. If projected revenue collections are expected to be more than sufficient to cover expenses for upcoming operating cycles, decreases in fees are recommended. If projected revenue collections are expected to be inadequate to cover operating expenses for upcoming operating cycles, increases in fees are recommended.

On May 12, 2025, the Board reviewed its current and projected financial position and authorized an adjustment to license application, renewal, reinstatement, and other miscellaneous fees so that fees are sufficient, but not excessive, to cover expenses.

This action is expected to be non-controversial. Fee adjustment actions for DPOR regulatory boards seldom receive negative comment from the regulated community and the public.

The promulgating agency is the Board for Barbers and Cosmetology. Chapter 7 of Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia enumerates the legal authority for the Board to administer licensure to barbers, cosmetologists, nail technicians, wax technicians, tattooers, body-piercers and estheticians.

In addition, § 54.1-201 of the Code of Virginia provides, in part:

A. The powers and duties of regulatory boards shall be as follows:

1. To establish the qualifications of applicants for certification or licensure by any such board, provided that all qualifications shall be necessary to ensure either competence or integrity to engage in such profession or occupation.
4. To levy and collect fees for certification or licensure and renewal that are sufficient to cover all expenses for the administration and operation of the regulatory board and a proportionate share of the expenses of the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation and the Board for Professional and Occupational Regulation.
5. To promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) necessary to assure continued competency, to prevent deceptive or misleading practices by practitioners and to effectively administer the regulatory system administered by the regulatory board. The regulations shall not be in conflict with the purposes and intent of this chapter or of Chapters 1 (§ 54.1-100 et seq.) and 3 (§ 54.1-300 et seq.) of this title.

Purpose

The General Assembly has charged the Board with the responsibility for regulating those who engage, or offer to engage, in barbering, cosmetology, nail care, waxing, tattooing, body-piercing, or esthetics services in Virginia by requiring that such persons obtain a license from the Board.

The goal of this regulatory change is to adjust the Board's fees. The Board must establish fees adequate to support the costs of the Board operations and a proportionate share of DPOR's operations. Current fees do not provide adequate revenue for those costs.

DPOR is funded almost entirely from revenue collected for fees associated with applications for licensure, renewal, examination, and other miscellaneous fees. DPOR does not receive general fund money. DPOR is self-supporting and must collect adequate revenue to support its mandated and approved activities and operations. Fee revenue collected on behalf of the various boards is used to fund DPOR's authorized special revenue appropriation.

The Board has no other source of revenue from which to fund its operations. As detailed in the “Issues” section, failure to adjust fees may result in several disadvantages to the public, the regulated community, and the Commonwealth.

The Board reviewed the fees listed in 18VAC41-20-140, 18VAC41-50-130, 18VAC41-60-90, and 18VAC41-70-120 and based on projected revenues and expenses, developed a fee schedule that meets the requirements of the applicable statutes while being the least burdensome to the licensee population.

The proposed fee adjustments are outlined below:

Issues

The Code of Virginia establishes the Board as the state agency that oversees licensure of barbers, cosmetologists, nail technicians, wax technicians, tattooers, body-piercers, and estheticians providing

services in Virginia. The Board's primary mission is to protect the citizens of the Commonwealth by prescribing requirements for minimal competencies; by prescribing standards of conduct and practice; and by imposing penalties for not complying with the regulations. Further, the Code of Virginia establishes through statute, the Board's authority to levy and collect fees adequate to cover the Board's associated expenses.

DPOR's finance staff analyzed the Board's financial position and determined that additional funds are needed to ensure the Board has sufficient revenue to cover expenses. The Board's costs have increased by 26% overall in the last five (5) years and by 47% since the last fee change in 2011. Other major drivers of increased costs are associated with staffing, facility, and information technology related costs, which have all increased.

The following primary advantages of the regulatory change are:

- Continued services. With the change, there will be no delays in processing applications and issuing licenses to applicants who are required to obtain credentials to engage in barbering, cosmetology, nail services, waxing services, tattooing, body-piercing and esthetics.
- Maintained public protection. DPOR will be effective in ensuring that barbering, cosmetology, nail, waxing, tattooing, body-piercing and esthetics services are performed in a manner that protects the public health, safety, and welfare of citizens of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

There are no disadvantages to the public or the Commonwealth in adjusting the Board's fees as detailed. The adjusted fees allow the Board to meet the requirements of applicable statutes, while being the least burdensome to the Board's regulant population.

Disadvantages of not allowing this regulatory change are as follows:

- Reduction of services. Reduction in services will result in delays in issuing licenses, creating barriers to applicants' and licensees' ability to work, and will decrease DPOR's effectiveness in ensuring that licensees conduct their activities in a manner adequate to protect the public health, safety, and welfare. Because the regulatory activities conducted by the Board are mandated by statute, this is not considered a viable alternative.
- Obtain a Treasury loan to fund operations. Without increased revenue, DPOR may have to request a loan from the general fund to cover the Board's deficit and supplement its ongoing operations. Obtaining a loan will only provide a short-term solution and will only delay the need for fee increases. When eventually implemented, fee increases will need to be even greater to provide for loan repayment.
- Supplement Board activities with general funds. DPOR does not currently receive general fund revenue and doing so will require a change in the Code of Virginia and the Appropriation Act. DPOR's Boards are intended to be self-funding pursuant to §§ 54.1-113, 54.1-201, 54.1-304(3), and 54.1-308 of the Code of Virginia. Use of general funds to support Board operations does not appear to be an appropriate use of taxpayer dollars.

Summary:

This regulatory change amends the Board for Barbers and Cosmetology ("the Board") regulations to increase fees for 18VAC41-20 (Barbering and Cosmetology Regulations), 18VAC41-70 (Esthetics Regulations), and 18VAC41-50 (Tattooing Regulations), and 18VAC41-60 (Body Piercing Regulations).

The Code of Virginia establishes the Board as the state agency that oversees licensure of barbers, master barbers, cosmetologist, nail technicians, wax technicians, estheticians, master estheticians, tattooers, permanent cosmetic tattooers, master permanent cosmetic tattooers, and body piercers providing services in Virginia.

The Board's primary mission is to protect the citizens of the Commonwealth by prescribing requirements for minimal competencies; by prescribing standards of conduct and practice; and by imposing penalties for not complying with the regulations. Further, the Code of Virginia requires the Department to comply with the Callahan Act. The proposed fee adjustments will ensure that the Board has sufficient revenues to fund its operating expenses.

Currently, there are 724 barbers, 45 barber instructors, 1,889 master barbers, 317 master barber instructors, 775 barber shops, 61 barber schools, 193 body piercers, 121 body piercing salons, 388 body piercers ear only, 107 body piercing ear only salons, 39,858 cosmetologists, 4,673 cosmetology salons,

2,411 cosmetology instructors, 136 cosmetology schools, 5,453 estheticians, 132 esthetics instructors, 73 esthetics schools, 2,380 master estheticians, 333 master esthetics instructors, 977 esthetic spas, 9,654 nail technicians, 311 nail technician instructors, 750 nail technician salons, 51 nail technician schools, 1,144tattoosers, 838 guest tattoosers, 363 tattoo parlors, 37 event tattoo parlors, 22 tattoo instructors, 10 tattoo schools, 1,175 permanent cosmetic tattoosers, 255 permanent cosmetic tattoo salons, 32 master permanent cosmetic tattoosers, 75 permanent cosmetic tattoo instructors, 31 permanent cosmetic tattoo schools, 1,506 wax technicians, 42 wax technician instructors, 163 waxing salons, and 27 waxing schools licensed within the Commonwealth.

The individuals affected by this regulatory change include both regulants, in the form of licensees, and non-regulants in the form of applicants or individuals seeking to enter the profession. The regulants will be impacted by the increase in their renewal and reinstatement fees, and the non-regulants or applicants will be impacted by a higher licensing fee when entering the profession.

The fee would increase to \$120 for individual initial licensure, \$120 for individual license renewal, \$240 for individual reinstatement for licensure, \$140 for individual instructor application, \$165 for individual instructor license renewal, \$330 for individual instructor reinstatement, \$220 for business/facility initial licensure, \$220 for business/facility initial renewal, \$440 for business/facility reinstatement, \$250 for school initial licensure, \$120 to add a new program, \$250 for school renewal, and \$500 for school reinstatement.
