Ch. 170 of the 2022 Acts of Assembly amended continuing education requirements for licensees of the Board. Previously, licensees were required to obtain one hour of continuing education per year in preneed funeral arrangements and one hour per year of compliance with state and federal laws and regulations governing the profession. Under the 2022 legislation, licensees now must obtain one hour per year of continuing education in compliance with state and federal laws or preneed funeral arrangements, provided that a licensee completes one hour of continuing education in preneed funeral arrangements every three years.

The current regulation governing retention of documents requires licensees to maintain documentation of completion of continuing education for two years. Given the new statutory requirement that a licensee must complete continuing education regarding preneed funeral planning at least once every three years,

the Board has amended 18VAC65-20-153 to require licensees to retain evidence of compliance with continuing education requirements for three years.

On July 15, 2022, the Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers voted to amend the Regulations Governing the Practice of Funeral Services by fast-track action.

There is no mandate for this action. The impetus was the passage of HB99 in the 2022 General Assembly, which required licensees only complete CE related to preneed funeral arrangements once every three years.

Regulations of the Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers are promulgated under the general authority of Chapter 24 of Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia. Virginia Code § 54.1-2400(6) specifically states that the general powers and duties of health regulatory boards shall be "[t]o promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) that are reasonable and necessary to administer effectively the regulatory system."

Additionally, Virginia Code § 54.1-2816.1(A) requires the Board to "promulgate regulations governing continuing education requirements for" licensees of the Board.

Purpose

The purpose of this action is to ensure licensees retain appropriate documentation of continuing education compliance for audit and investigation purposes. Because 2022 legislation changed the requirement for preneed funeral arrangement CE to at least once every three years, a two year retention requirement is no longer sufficient.

Substance

18VAC65-20-153 currently requires licensees to retain evidence of compliance with CE requirements for two years. The word "two" is removed and replaced by "three."

Issues

- 1) The primary advantage to private citizens and licensees is clear guidance regarding how long a licensee must maintain documentation of compliance with continuing education and an assurance that, if audited, the Board will be able to confirm the licensee is compliant with requirements. There are no disadvantages to the public.
- 2) There are no primary advantages or disadvantages to the agency or the Commonwealth.
- 3) The Director of the Department of Health Professions has reviewed the proposal and performed a competitive impact analysis. Any restraint on competition as a result of amending this regulation is a foreseeable, inherent, and ordinary result of the statutory obligation of the Board to protect the safety and health of citizens of the Commonwealth and of the legislative change to permit licensees to take only one particular type of CE every three years. The Board is authorized under § 54.1-2400 "[t]o promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) which are reasonable and necessary to administer effectively the regulatory system . . . Such regulations shall not conflict with the purposes and intent of this chapter or of Chapter 1 (§ 54.1-100 et seq.) and Chapter 25 (§ 54.1-2500 et seq.) of this title." The promulgated regulations do not conflict with the purpose or intent of Chapters 1 or 25 of Title 54.1.

The current requirement to maintain documentation of continuing education is in regulation, and the Board is required to promulgate regulations related to continuing education. Therefore there are no alternatives to amending this regulation.

The amendments are necessary to ensure practitioners maintain evidence of compliance with continuing education requirements set forth in statute. 1) The compliance requirement of maintaining evidence of compliance with continuing education, which is already in the regulation, cannot be less stringent without being absent completely. 2) There are no reporting requirements. 3) The requirement is already extremely simple. 4) There are no design or operational standards in the regulation, and the regulation does not apply to businesses of any kind. 5) The regulation does not apply to businesses of any kind.
