Purpose

The Board intends to amend existing regulation to update and provide for consistency of regulations relating to "Standards of Practices," "Disciplinary Actions," and "Reinstatement" governing the three professions licensed by this Board.

§ 54.1-2400. General powers and duties of health regulatory boards.

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The general powers and duties of health regulatory boards shall be:

1. To establish the qualifications for registration, certification or licensure in accordance with the applicable law which are necessary to ensure competence and integrity to engage in the regulated professions.

2. To examine or cause to be examined applicants for certification or licensure. Unless otherwise required by law, examinations shall be administered in writing or shall be a demonstration of manual skills.

3. To register, certify or license qualified applicants as practitioners of the particular profession or professions regulated by such board.

4. To establish schedules for renewals of registration, certification and licensure.

5. To levy and collect fees for application processing, examination, registration, certification or licensure and renewal that are sufficient to cover all expenses for the administration and operation of the Department of Health Professions, the Board of Health Professions and the health regulatory boards.

6. To promulgate regulations in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) which are reasonable and necessary to administer effectively the regulatory system. Such regulations shall not conflict with the purposes and intent of this chapter or of Chapter 1 (§ <u>54.1-100</u> et seq.) and Chapter 25 (§ <u>54.1-2500</u> et seq.) of this title.

7. To revoke, suspend, restrict, or refuse to issue or renew a registration, certificate or license which such board has authority to issue for causes enumerated in applicable law and regulations.

8. To appoint designees from their membership or immediate staff to coordinate with the Intervention Program Committee and to implement, as is necessary, the provisions of Chapter 25.1 (§ <u>54.1-2515</u> et seq.) of this title. Each health regulatory board shall appoint one such designee.

9. To take appropriate disciplinary action for violations of applicable law and regulations.

10. To appoint a special conference committee, composed of not less than two members of a health regulatory board, to act in accordance with § 2.2-4019 upon receipt of information that a practitioner of the appropriate board may be subject to disciplinary action. The special conference committee may (i) exonerate the practitioner; (ii) reinstate the practitioner; (iii) place the practitioner on probation with such terms as it may deem appropriate; (iv) reprimand the practitioner; (v) modify a previous order; and (vi) impose a monetary penalty pursuant to § 54.1-2401. The order of the special conference committee shall become final thirty days after service of the order unless a written request to the board for a hearing is received within such time. If service of the decision to a party is accomplished by mail, three days shall be added to the thirty-day period. Upon receiving a timely written request for a hearing, the board or a panel of the board shall then proceed with a hearing as provided in § 2.2-4020, and the action of the committee shall be vacated. This subdivision shall not be construed to affect the authority or procedures of the Boards of Medicine and Nursing pursuant to § 54.1-2919 and 54.1-3010.

11. To convene, at their discretion, a panel consisting of at least five board members or, if a quorum of the board is less than five members, consisting of a quorum of the members to conduct formal proceedings pursuant to § 2.2-4020, decide the case, and issue a final agency case decision. Any decision rendered by majority vote of such panel shall have the same effect as if made by the full board and shall be subject to court review in accordance with the Administrative Process Act. No member who participates in an informal proceeding conducted in accordance with § 2.2-4019 shall serve on a panel conducting formal proceedings pursuant to § 2.2-4020 to consider the same matter.

12. To issue inactive licenses or certificates and promulgate regulations to carry out such purpose. Such regulations shall include, but not be limited to, the qualifications, renewal fees, and conditions for reactivation of licenses or certificates.

Section 54.1-3503 establishes the Board.

§ 54.1-3503. Board of Counseling.

The Board of Counseling shall regulate the practice of counseling, substance abuse treatment, and marriage and family therapy.

The Board shall consist of fourteen members. Twelve shall be professionals licensed in Virginia, who shall represent the various specialties recognized in the profession, and two shall be citizen members. Of the twelve professional members, eight shall be professional counselors, two shall be marriage and family therapists, and two shall be licensed substance abuse treatment practitioners. The professional members of the Board shall include two full-time faculty members engaged in teaching counseling, substance abuse treatment or marriage and family therapy in an accredited college or university in this Commonwealth, and two professional counselors engaged in full-time private practice. However, the marriage and family therapists initially appointed to the Board shall not be required to be licensed, shall not be licensed by another board in the Department of Health Professions, and shall be clinical members of the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy. The licensed substance abuse treatment practitioners initially appointed to the Board shall not be licensed, shall not be licensed by another board in the Department of Health Professions, and shall not be licensed by another board and family therapy. The licensed substance abuse treatment practitioners initially appointed to the Board shall not be licensed, shall not be licensed by another board in the Department of Health Professions, and shall not be licensed by another board in the Board shall not be required to be licensed, shall not be licensed by another board in the Board shall not be required to be licensed, shall not be licensed by another board and professions, shall be active members of the Virginia Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors and shall have a master's degree in substance abuse or a substantially equivalent master's degree.

The terms of the members of the Board shall be four years.

Section 54.1-3505 authorizes the Board to regulate the practice of counseling, substance abuse treatment, and marriage and family therapy.

§ 54.1-3505. Specific powers and duties of the Board.

In addition to the powers granted in § <u>54.1-2400</u>, the Board shall have the following specific powers and duties:

1. To cooperate with and maintain a close liaison with other professional boards and the community to ensure that regulatory systems stay abreast of community and professional needs.

2. To conduct inspections to ensure that licensees conduct their practices in a competent manner and in conformance with the relevant regulations.

3. To designate specialties within the profession.

4. To administer the certification of rehabilitation providers pursuant to Article 2 (§ <u>54.1-3510</u> et seq.) of this chapter, including prescribing fees for application processing, examinations, certification and certification renewal.

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6. To promulgate regulations for the qualifications, education, and experience for licensure of marriage and family therapists. The requirements for clinical membership in the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy (AAMFT), and the professional examination service's national marriage and family therapy examination may be considered by the Board in the promulgation of these regulations. The educational credit hour, clinical experience hour, and clinical supervision hour requirements for marriage and family therapists shall not be less than the educational credit hour, clinical experience hour, and clinical supervision hour requirements for professional counselors.

7. To promulgate, subject to the requirements of Article 1.1 (§ <u>54.1-3507</u> et seq.) of this chapter, regulations for the qualifications, education, and experience for licensure of licensed substance abuse treatment practitioners and certification of certified substance abuse counselors and certified substance abuse counseling assistants. The requirements for membership in NAADAC: the Association for Addiction Professionals and its national examination may be considered by the Board in the promulgation of these regulations. The Board also may provide for the consideration and use of the accreditation and examination services offered by the Substance Abuse Certification Alliance of Virginia. The educational credit hour, clinical experience hour, and clinical supervision hour requirements for licensed substance abuse treatment practitioners shall not be less than the educational credit hour, clinical supervision hour requirements for licensed professional counselors. Such regulations also shall establish standards and protocols for the clinical supervision of certified substance abuse counselors and the supervision or direction of certified substance abuse counseling assistants, and reasonable access to the persons providing that supervision or direction in settings other than a licensed facility.

Section 54.1-3506 mandates licensure for the practice of Counseling.

§ 54.1-3506. License required.

In order to engage in the practice of counseling or marriage and family therapy or in the independent practice of substance abuse treatment, as defined in this chapter, it shall be necessary to hold a license; however, no license shall be required for the practice of marriage and family therapy or the independent practice of substance abuse treatment until six months after the effective date of regulations governing marriage and family therapy and substance abuse treatment, respectively, promulgated by the Board under subdivisions 6 and 7 of § <u>54.1-3505</u>. The Board may issue a license, without examination, for the practice of marriage and family therapy or the independent practice of substance abuse treatment to persons who hold a current and unrestricted license as a professional counselor within the Commonwealth and who meet the clinical and academic requirements for licensure as a marriage and family therapist or licensed substance abuse treatment practitioner, respectively. The applicant for such licensure as marriage and family therapists or licensed substance of qualifications equal to those required of applicants for licensure as marriage and family therapists or licensed substance of publications equal to those required of applicants for licensure, respectively, by examination in the Commonwealth.

Any person who renders substance abuse treatment services as defined in this chapter and who is not licensed to do so, other than a person who is exempt pursuant to § <u>54.1-3501</u>, shall render such services only when he is (i) under the supervision and direction of a person licensed under this chapter who shall be responsible for the services performed by such unlicensed person, or (ii) in compliance with the regulations governing an organization or a facility licensed by the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services.

Substance

The Board Counseling provides separate regulations for Licensed Professional Counselors, Licensed Marriage and Family Therapy, and Licensed Substance Abuse Treatment Practitioners. Currently regulations Governing the Practice of Professional Counselors contain 18 specific standards to which counselors shall abide. Likewise, Regulations Governing the Practice of Marriage & Family Therapy contain 12 standards, and Regulations Governing the Practice of Substance Abuse Treatment Practitioners contain 23 standards.

The Board has always attempted to mirror established regulations for a licensed profession in the development of new regulations for another licensed profession where possible; however regulatory processes progress along at different timelines. Improvements identified during one review might not meet the initial purpose of another review and therefore the inconsistencies have been perpetuated. To address these inconsistencies among its regulations, the Board has compared all of its chapters section by section and identified areas that could be made uniform. This proposed regulatory action will provide a more consistent basis for disciplinary action across all categories of licensure which will better protect the public health, safety, and welfare.

Although the existing standards of practice cover many of the same areas of professional conduct in all chapters, the Board determined that greater standardization was needed to provide more fair and consistent bases for disciplinary action. In cases where the respondent is dually licensed under this Board the regulations can be problematic when there are discrepancies. Likewise, the Board would like to establish conformities among its regulations in the grounds for disciplinary action and rules for reinstatement following disciplinary action.

Alternatives

As an alternative, the Board considered retaining existing language and continuing to apply the criteria of each chapter to that specific profession. This alternative was not accepted because inconsistencies standards of practice may not adequately protect the consumer against unprofessional practices of the professionals regulated by this Board. For the most part the standards of practice relate to business related aspects of the practice, not the clinical treatment aspect of the practice. Therefore, these standards should be uniform for the professional

regardless of whether a Professional Counselor, Marriage and Family Therapist, or a Substance Abuse Treatment Practitioner.

Once approval to publish the Notice of Intended Regulatory Action is granted, the Board will consider any comment received during its meetings and public comment periods on any proposed regulations.

Family Impact Statement
