

Economic Impact Analysis Virginia Department of Planning and Budget

8 VAC 20-400 – Rules Governing Division Superintendent Salary and Expenses Department of Education September 10, 2004

The Department of Planning and Budget (DPB) has analyzed the economic impact of this proposed regulation in accordance with Section 2.2-4007.G of the Administrative Process Act and Executive Order Number 21 (02). Section 2.2-4007.G requires that such economic impact analyses include, but need not be limited to, the projected number of businesses or other entities to whom the regulation would apply, the identity of any localities and types of businesses or other entities particularly affected, the projected number of persons and employment positions to be affected, the projected costs to affected businesses or entities to implement or comply with the regulation, and the impact on the use and value of private property. The analysis presented below represents DPB's best estimate of these economic impacts.

Summary of the Proposed Regulation

The Board of Education (board) proposes to repeal these regulations.

Estimated Economic Impact

The Standards of Quality, § 22.1-253.13:2 E. of the Code of Virginia, provide that pursuant to the appropriation act, support services shall be funded from basic school aid on the basis of prevailing statewide costs. The term "support services" includes those services provided by the superintendent.

These regulations pertained to superintendents' salary and expenses during the 1980-1981 and 1981-1982 academic years. The regulations are obsolete. Thus, their repeal will have no impact.

Businesses and Entities Affected

The repeal of these regulations will not affect any business or other entity. There are 131 school divisions in the Commonwealth.

Localities Particularly Affected

The repeal of these regulations will not affect any locality.

Projected Impact on Employment

The repeal of these regulations will not affect employment.

Effects on the Use and Value of Private Property

The repeal of these regulations will not affect the use and value of private property.
